The Bears go against the University of Washington Huskies Saturday, and hopes to come up with their second win of the long, long season.

STOCKTON, Calif. (UP)—The College of Pacific Tigers are all set for their game against the Bruins of UCLA Saturday, according to Coach Jack Myers. "If the Bruins win, it will allow it."

"UCLA is possibly the best on the coast," Myers said. "It has been able to come from behind without any senior leadership, and has the necessary poise without fourth year men."

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UP)—Despite several cases of mild flu, Coach Tommy Prothro thinks his Oregon State Beavers will be at full strength for Saturday's crucial game against the Stanford Indians—and full strength means the return of halfback Joe Francis.

Both Oregon State and Stanford hold Pacific Coast Conference title hopes as each has two defeats to one leading Oregon. All have two PCC games remaining.

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STANFORD, Calif. (UP)—Al Harrington, Stanford's right halfback and place kicker, suffered a broken jaw in the game against Southern California last weekend.

LOS ANGELES (UP)—The Southern California injury picture appeared bright today as Mike Henry, Frank Fiorentino and Rex Johnston all have returned to workouts.

Coach Don Clark sent the Trojans through a hard drill Monday, reversing his usual procedure of scheduling a light workout the first day of the week. The drill wound up in a scrimmage with the first backfield composed of Willie Wood at quarterback, Tony Ortega and Johnston at halfbacks and Jim Conroy at fullback.

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Pro Grid Gates Now At All Time Record

NEW YORK (UP)—The increasing popularity of professional football was again demonstrated this past weekend when an all-time record for attendance was set at Los Angeles, and a new high was set in the overall picture for the entire National Football League.

More than 102,000 saw the Rams take the Forty-Niners at the Coliseum, and more than 311,000 saw the six games on Sunday for a new high for a single day's attendance for the league.

There were three sellouts, in Washington, Chicago and Los Angeles. That's proof positive, that pro football has gripped the fans in more convincing fashion than any other professional sport.

Still on the pro front, we see that things are lightening up in the Western Division. By the time next Monday rolls around three teams could be tied for first place. San Francisco, Detroit and Baltimore, and right now every team but Green Bay still has a chance to win. The Rams' victory over the Forty-Niners really tightened things up and only two games separate the first five elevens.

In the East, things have boiled down to the Cleveland Browns and the New York Giants. Paul Brown's club and the 1956 champions have a good edge on the others and will battle it out.

We had five winners in our pro selections this week, only the Forty-Niners crossed us up. Van Brocklin's passing was better than Y. A. Tittle's.

MARSHALL FAVORS SERIES
WASHINGTON (UP)—Washington owner George Preston Marshall said Monday he would like to arrange a home-and-home series each season with the Redskins and the Baltimore Colts. The clubs meet only once each season because they are in different divisions of the National Football League. They drew a capacity crowd of 33,149 Sunday to Griffith Stadium.

Everything went pretty well according to form in intercollegiate ranks Saturday. 111,111 is again humbled Michigan, Duke's tie of Navy was a mild upheaval, and North Carolina State got a major setback by William and Mary. Nothing disturbed the three leaders in the nation, Oklahoma, Texas A&M and Auburn, and apparently nothing is going to.

On the bowl front we have two important games this coming weekend. In the Big Ten, where upsets are frequent Ohio State goes all out for the Rose Bowl bid in their game with Iowa at Columbus. If the Bucks win, they're Pasadena bound. However, a defeat by Iowa would make the Ohio State-Michigan game the following week the clincher. Michigan State in the meantime, plays Minnesota and hopes Woody Hayes' crew drops two.

The other big one is in the Southeastern Conference. Mississippi and Tennessee at Memphis. The winner of that one will go to the Sugar Bowl for sure.

On the West Coast Oregon still has an edge for the right to go to the Rose Bowl. Oregon still has to play Southern Cal and Oregon State and a win in either game will do it. Stanford is the only other team with a chance.

Marshall Keeps 7 Point Margin In AHL Scoring

NEW YORK (UP)—Willie Marshall of Hershey, although held to one goal and an assist last week, maintained his seven-point lead in the American Hockey League scoring race.

Marshall, according to official league statistics, also led in goals scored and assists for the fourth consecutive week. The 25-year-old center has compiled 27 points on 13 goals and 14 assists.

Dino Fisher, right wing on Marshall's high-scoring line, is second in total points with 20. Bill Sweeney of Providence gained six points in last week's action to boost his total to 19, good for third place. Tied for fourth place with 17 points each are Gerry Egan of Springfield, Jimmy Moore of Cleveland and Bruce Carmichael of Providence.

Eddie Shack, a rookie with Providence, upped his penalty minutes to 58 to retain his league lead in this department.

Hershey's Gil Mayer, out with the flu all week, remains the leading goaltender with a 2.00 average. He has yielded 14 goals in seven games. However, Johnny Bowen of Cleveland leads in shutouts with two.
