California Weather

San Francisco Bay Region: Occasional light rain today, cloudy tonight and Wednesday with chance of rain again Wednesday afternoon; little change in temperature; high today about 60; low tonight 52-54; westerly winds 10-20 m.p.h.; chances of rain 70 per cent today, 40 per cent tonight and 50 per cent Wednesday.

Northern California: Occasional light rain from about San Francisco and Sacramento northward and intermittent snow over high mountains from Yosemite northward and variable cloudiness elsewhere today; cloudy tonight with occasional rain from Ukiah and Red Bluff northward and occasional snow Lake Tahoe northward; Wednesday cloudy with rain likely as far south as San Francisco and Sacramento by afternoon and partly cloudy elsewhere; little change in temperature; coastal winds south or southwest 15-30 m.p.h. from Farallons northward and west or northwest 10-18 m.p.h. elsewhere.

Sierra Nevada: Occasional rain from about Yosemite northward except occasional snow above 6,000 feet today and tonight and again late Wednesday; little change in temperature.

Sacramento Valley: Occasional light rain today and in extreme northern portion tonight, otherwise cloudy through Wednesday; chance of rain again late Wednesday; little change in temperature; high both days 55-60; low tonight 50-55; variable winds 5-15 m.p.h.

Northwestern California: Occasional rain today and from Ukiah northward tonight; Wednesday cloudy with occasional rain extreme northern portion probably spreading to entire area by late Wednesday; little change in temperature; high today and low tonight 55-60; westerly winds 10-20 m.p.h. from Farallons northward and west or southwest 15-30 m.p.h.

More Foreign Aid Proposed

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. — The United States is proposing an expansion of the U.N. technical assistance program from about 30 million dollars to 100 million dollars.

Rep. Walter Judd (R-Minn.), a U.S. delegate to the current U.N. Assembly, said yesterday a U.S. proposal will be made next week to the 22-nation Economic Committee for a special U.N. project fund to aid underdeveloped nations.

About 50 million from the expanded program would be used for surveys to determine what work is possible in underdeveloped nations, to set up training institutes and to conduct research on expanding economies, Judd said.

About 14 million, or 45 per cent, of the present technical budget is contributed by the United States. Congress has ordered this cut to 33-1-3 per cent by 1960, but Judd said he is prepared to argue in Congress for a U.S. contribution of at least 40 per cent.

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Job Opening List Available

A nationwide list of more than 6,900 job openings for professional and managerial personnel now is available at the Portland office of the Oregon State Employment Service, it was announced today by Earl R. Lovell, state director. The openings include not only Oregon job orders but those filed by employers in other states.

"We are taking part with other states in a nationwide expanded and specialized service to place professional and managerial workers," explained Director Lovell. "Portland has been designated as one of 78 special centers to speed up the matching of men and jobs all over the country."

Largest number of job openings listed currently are 1,119 for mechanical engineers and 993 for electrical engineers. More than 300 different occupations are on the list, which indicates a strong demand for nurses with 730 openings and draftsman with 542. Other engineers, scientists, technicians and retail managers also are needed. Salaries range from \$3,600 up to \$15,000 a year with transportation and housing guaranteed in some cases.

"All qualified persons interested in these openings should apply at the nearest of our 26 employment offices," declared Director Lovell. "Applications then will be forwarded to the Portland office, which will cooperate in making the necessary arrangements for interviews with the prospective employer."

Employers interested in recruiting professional or managerial help were urged by the director to take advantage of the new service. This expansion of the placement service was arranged in cooperation between the state employment security agencies affiliated with the U.S. Department of Labor, it was brought out.

Board Names 1958 Heads

L. L. Simpson was reelected chairman and B. L. Nutting reelected vice chairman for the forthcoming year at the 15-man O&C Advisory Board for the Medford Forestry District at a meeting in Medford on November 1. The board met with District Forester E. K. Peterson, who is transferring to the Portland Area Office next month, and with Ross Youngblood, now district forester at Coos Bay, who will be the new Medford district forester.

The board approved the plan for a sale of an estimated 100 million board feet of Bureau of Land Management timber in calendar year 1958. This includes approximately 10 million feet of timber which was advertised for sale in 1957 but not sold. It represents a net increase of approximately 10 million board feet over the amount that was offered in 1957. The plan will include 75 million board feet in the Jackson master unit, 71 million board feet in the Josephine master unit, and 14 million board feet in the Klamath master unit.

The board heard a report on the progress of the district forest inventory program from Forester Bill Jensen, and reviewed the current reforestation program with Staff Forester Bill Donovan. Also the current progress on a series of road projects and plans for construction of future roads were discussed by Staff Forester Dick Schlachter.
