Swinging Effigy At Cal Tilt Could Mean End For Elliott

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—Is California about to resume wearing its ghostly shroud as "the graveyard of coaches?"

The Bears often went by that chilling name until Lynn (Pappy) Waldorf revived their football empire in 1947 and got them into the Rose Bowl three times.

But then his own fortunes

waned. His last two seasons were losing ones and he announced on the eve of last season's final game with Stanford that he was stepping out. Alumni pressure generally is regarded as having had a lot to do with Waldorf's decision.

Now another nice guy there is finishing last—and only in his initial season. Pete Elliott, the hero of Michigan's 49-0 victory over Southern California in the Rose Bowl, can't find the winning number. To date he has a record of one victory and seven defeats.

Fans entering California's Memorial Stadium last Saturday to watch the Bears lose another to Oregon State also saw something else — a faceless effigy swinging over one of the gates.

The dummy bore no name either. But it dangled apparently in silent protest launched by the militant crowd of Bear rooters who stand for a losing era only so long.

Cal's rooting section, a white block of explosive cheering in the good times, was noticeably quiet Saturday as the Bears lost, 21-19, despite a tremendous second half comeback.

And numerous empty spots showed up in the rooters' department, indicating that many had

either decided to go to the movies, or study, or have a beer.

Other California coaches have walked the plank despite more successful seasons than Elliott is having. Nibs Price was dropped after the 1930 campaign when his Bears had been walloped by Southern California, 74-0.

Navy Bill Ingram left after having a 50-50 season in 1934. This was followed by the bright era of the "thunder team" under Stubby Allison. Then came Frank Wickhorst in 1946. He lasted one season, winning two out of nine, and

gave way to Waldorf.

Now the cycle is complete. Waldorf is happy in his new job as chief scout for the San Francisco Forty Niners. And the personable Elliott, immaculately dressed in a brown gabardine suit, vainly walks up and down the sidelines as the Bears lose and the rooters grow sullen.

Elliott, a former assistant to Bud Wilkinson, is strong for two things... the split-T and loyalty to his charges.

"I'll never be prouder of a team than this," Elliott said in his quiet way after Saturday's heart-breaker. "They really could have come apart in the second half but instead they came out and tried to win it."

He and the Bears will try again, under the eyes of a critical rooting section, when they host Washington next Saturday. In the meantime, more effigies may swing from various gates for Pete Elliott — a nice guy — is finishing last.

Jeffs Praise Stiff Blocking And Tackling

AMHERST, Mass. (UP)—A "dedicated" group of lads who "love to block and tackle" is the key to unbeaten, untied Amherst's success this season.

The back-to-the-fundamentals campaign has carried the Lord Jeffs to seven straight victories and the title of New England's top small college team.

Amherst, which ends its season against "Little Three" opponent Williams Saturday, reigns as the area's sole entry boasting a perfect record. Williams, also undefeated, shows a tie with unbeaten Tufts.

"There are two reasons why we've been able to do so well this year," said Amherst coach John McLaughry. "One is that we had a pretty fair team last year composed largely of sophomores and juniors. They've come along this season with that extra year of experience."

"But, more important, they seem to love to block and tackle. The boys do both better than any other team I've had. And they are the most dedicated group I've had. They really get out and work."

The hard work with the emphasis on the basic components has paid off handsomely for Amherst. It has rolled up 264 points against only 40 by the opposition. Its hard-hitting line has held the opponents to an average of 150 yards gained per game while its fleet backs have piled up 415 yards per game.

"We're not a spectacular team, with long runs and such," said McLaughry, who quarterbacked and captained Brown in 1939. "But we concentrate on ball possession. This has allowed us to control most of the games."

NORMAN, Okla. (UP)—Oklahoma will put a number of records on the line when it meets Notre Dame in a nationally televised battle here Saturday — and one of them may be broken at the outset of the intersectional battle.

Coach Bud Wilkinson is rumored to have controlled the weather almost as well as he has the scores of Oklahoma's home games.

During his 10-year tenure as head coach, the Sooners have never played a home game in the rain. That's one record which may be snapped this weekend. Rain has fallen for three days and more showers are forecast through Friday.

For two days this week, the Sooners practiced in the mud, then were driven inside yesterday by rain and water on the practice field.

Coach Bud Wilkinson says the muddyfield practice may come in handy this weekend.

He admits that rain and mud hamper his team's fast-break offense, which is based largely on speed.

After the Kansas State game Nov. 2 Wilkinson pointed out the field was slippery, and indicated this may have been a factor in comparatively low score.

Oklahoma won the game 13-0 and has since thrashed the Missouri Tigers 39-14 to run its victory string to 47 straight games—longest in collegiate history.

Shea, Newman Maintain PCC Statistics Lead

LOS ANGELES — Stanford's Charles Shea and Bob Newman of Washington State continue to lead the Pacific Coast Conference in rushing and passing, respectively, with Newman also the total offense leader, according to statistics released today by the PCC Commissioner's office.

Shea, who took over the rushing lead two weeks ago, has gained 641 yards in 127 carries for an average of 5.1 yards. Nub Beamer, Oregon State, has 589 yards and Jim Shanley of Oregon 581.

Newman has completed 75 passes in 140 attempts for 53.6 per cent and 971 yards. Nine have gone for touchdowns. Jack Douglas, Stanford, has 62 completions while Howard Willis, Idaho, and Jack Crabtree, Oregon, have 41 each. Newman also has a total offense figure of 1,045 yards. He has run and passed for 12 touchdowns. Willis has 233 total yards and Douglas, 850.

Newman's favorite targets, Don Ellingsen and Jack Fanning, head other departments. Ellingsen has 34 pass receptions for 440 yards, and a big margin over Ron Stover, Oregon, who has 19 catches, and Larry Aldrich, Idaho, who has 18.

Fanning has caught 17, seven of which have been for touchdowns to give him a share in the scoring lead with 42 points. Beamer, Shanley, Shea and Oregon State's Earnest Durden also have seven touchdowns each.

Kirk Wilson of UCLA is the top punter with a 41.1 yard average, replacing Idaho's Ken Hall who has dropped from the rankings due to an insufficient number of punts. Jim Conroy, Southern California, has a 38.9 yard average and Ted Searle, Oregon State, 38.1. Wilson and teammate Dick Wallen lead in interceptions, each having picked off four.

Stirling Hammack has the most yards on punt returns, 253, to 111 for Shanley, who is also the kick-off runback leader with 290 yards. Jim Jones, Washington, has 230 kickoff return yards.

CHENEY, Wash. (UP)—The superintendent of the Turnbull Wildlife Refuge south of Cheney said Wednesday the big southbound flights of ducks and geese from the northern prairies already have passed Eastern Washington.

"This is the slowest I've seen things since everything was frozen tight two years ago," W. A. Rodgers said. "There aren't as many ducks on our ponds now as there were at the beginning of the waterfowl season."
