

Safety Film To Be Shown

Films stressing the dangers of handling blasting caps and other forms of explosives are now being shown to students within the city school system. The program is under sponsorship of the Klamath Falls Police Junior Rifle Club, and the film material was obtained through courtesy of the DuPont Company.

The film will also be shown during rifle club and gun safety courses sponsored by the Klamath Falls Police Beneficiary Association.

Chief of Detectives Bud Adkins explains that several cases of children playing with dynamite caps have been handled during recent years, and that an all-out effort is being made to familiarize both the young persons and adults with the explosive quality and dangerousness associated with the blasting caps.

"Don't fool with the caps," advise the police officials. "If you find any of them at abandoned building sites or gravel pits, don't handle them... notify the police and they will be properly and safely disposed of."

Suit Filed On Accident

A \$79,000 damage action has been filed by Raymond G. Budden against Carl Clifford Dahlgren Jr.

The action stems from an August 15, 1957, accident at the intersection of Klamath Avenue and Ninth Street, during which the automobile driven by Dahlgren reportedly struck Budden while the latter was crossing Klamath Avenue within the designated crosswalk area.

The plaintiff states that his hip was fractured, and that he is still suffering from a nervous condition caused by the shock. The plaintiff further states that Dahlgren operated the vehicle in a careless and negligent manner, with such operation leading to the accident.

Dedication Set For New Hall

King Hall, named in honor of the late Fred C. King of Portland, will be dedicated on the Oregon Technical Institute campus beginning at 1 p.m. Friday, November 15.

OTI Director Winston Purvine adds that J. V. Owens will be the principal speaker, and that the benediction will be given by Rev. Dale Hewitt of the First Presbyterian Church.

King was a member of the first OTI Advisory Council when the institute was launched in 1947, established the first student loan fund at the school, and was constantly working for the betterment of the school.

In addition to other civic and school officials, members of the OTI Advisory Council will be on hand for the dedicatory ceremonies Friday.
