

# Union Faces AFL-CIO Action Over Failure To Clean House

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Bakery Workers Union, with President James G. Cross refusing to bow out of the picture, today stood on the brink of suspension from the AFL-CIO.

Ordered to clean house or get out of the labor federation, the union's executive board yesterday agreed to call a special election for international officers.

But the board turned down AFL-CIO Executive Council instructions to reinstate Curtis R. Sims, an antagonist of Cross, as secretary-treasurer.

Cross himself, contrary to the AFL-CIO directive, said he would seek reelection as head of the 142,000-member union.

Although the Bakery Workers' board contended its action met terms of the AFL-CIO edict, a well-placed source in the labor federation said, "This certainly is not compliance."

The federation was expected to issue a statement on the subject today—deadline date for the union to make amends or be suspended. All signs were the AFL-CIO would reject the board's effort as inadequate.

The Bakery Workers are on a spot also occupied recently by the giant Teamsters Union and the United Textile Workers after encountering charges of corruption before the Senate Rackets Committee. The Teamsters already have been suspended. The Textile Workers have moved to comply

with AFL-CIO reform decrees. Four of the 17 board members at yesterday's closed meeting voted against the convention arrangement and for Sims, who initiated charges of misconduct against Cross and was later tossed out of office.

Sims told reporters he would run for election to his old post as secretary-treasurer.

Cross, accused before the Senate committee of spending union money on himself and of collusion with employers, said the convention would be held regardless of what the AFL-CIO does.

# Colleges Get Funds Grant

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Public Health Service announced 43 grants to 39 institutions for expansion of health research facilities Friday. They total \$3,698,432.

Surgeon General Leroy E. Burney said all of 60 million dollars appropriated by Congress for the first two years of a three-year program to expand the nation's health facilities has been allocated.

A total of 150 hospitals, universities, research institutes, and schools of medicine, osteopathy, dentistry and public health are participating in the program. They are required to match the federal contribution on an equal basis.

Grants announced Friday included: Oregon—Reed College, Portland, research in new biology building, \$133,165.

Washington—University of Washington, Seattle, remodeling dental research area of the Health Science Building, \$50,000.

# B&O Asks Discontinuance Of NY Passenger Service

BALTIMORE (AP)—The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, yielding to the auto and the airplane, wants to quit the passenger business on the highly competitive Baltimore-New York line.

In an announcement yesterday, the B&O said it was requesting permission to discontinue 14 passenger trains northeast of Baltimore. The road said it was losing about five million dollars a year on them.

Thus the Baltimore and Ohio, one of the four major east-west trunk lines, joined a general re-

trenchment movement among railroads.

Less than two weeks ago, the New York Central and the Pennsylvania announced they were considering a merger. The Erie, the Lackawanna and the Delaware & Hudson are doing the same.

Other mergers are in the wind. Transportation experts said B&O's proposal obviously stemmed from competition with the private automobile and the airlines.

President Howard E. Simpson acknowledged this was so. "We regret the necessity for this action, but declining patronage of this service and its increased wages, materials and other costs have resulted in a very substantial loss," he said.

"In recent years large sums of money have been spent by state and federal bodies for the construction of highways, bridges and tunnels which have improved travel conditions for motorists. During the same period a large segment of the traveling public also has substituted air travel for train travel."

The Baltimore and Ohio filed its petitions with the Maryland Public Service Commission and similar authorities in Delaware and Pennsylvania.

Of the 14 trains scheduled for abandonment, 12 of them—six in each direction—operate daily between Baltimore, Wilmington, Philadelphia and Jersey City. The other two operate between Washington, Baltimore and Philadelphia.

"For every dollar of revenue received from their operation, over \$2.40 is paid out in direct expenses," the B&O petition said.

Simpson emphasized that passenger service between Baltimore and Washington and the West will be continued. No change whatever will be made in the line's freight service, he said.

# Big Election Battle Seen

RENO, Nev. (AP)—Wellington D. Rankin of Helena, Republican national committeeman from Montana, said Friday his party faces a "very terrific fight" in trying to recoup its 1956 Western congressional losses in the 1958 elections.

His statement summed up a prevailing opinion in an informal survey among GOP party leaders from 11 Far Western states as well as Hawaii and Alaska who are here for a GOP regional conference pointed toward next year's campaign.

The Democrats scored their biggest single congressional gain in the West in 1956 with a net pickup of six districts. The present House lineup for the West is 31 Republicans, 26 Democrats. In addition, the Democrats won six of seven Senate elections.

Rankin, chairman of the Western conference, predicted victories for Republican senatorial candidates in California, Wyoming, Nevada and Utah. He listed Washington, Montana and New Mexico, all with Democratic incumbents, as questionable.

Asked if he attributed Republican congressional prospects to any loss of President Eisenhower's popularity, Rankin said he felt it was "not due to anything in particular."

"The Democrats are ward workers," he said, "and it's always more difficult for us in off years."

Meade Alcorn, Republican national chairman, told a reporter, "We have a reasonable prospect" of taking control of the House next year. He said, however, he didn't believe chances were as bright for the Senate.

Alcorn declined to give any breakdown on Western possibilities.

The GOP chairman, in a banquet speech Thursday night, said that if his party should fail in forthcoming elections, it would not fall into the hands of Democrats like Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon and Walter Reuther, president of the United Automobile Workers Union.

He credited a "thriving and throbbing economy" to the Republican administration.
