

Oregon Weather

Eastern Oregon—Mostly cloudy Friday night with a few showers or snow flurries, becoming partly cloudy Saturday afternoon; continued cool. Low Friday night 25-35; high Saturday 28-48.

Western Oregon—Mostly cloudy with frequent showers Friday night, decreasing Saturday; continued cool. Low Friday night 34-44; high Saturday 46-56. Southerly to southwesterly coastal winds, 10-20 m.p.h., near coast.

Grants Pass and vicinity—Occasional showers and sunny periods Saturday. Low Friday night 32-37; high Saturday 46-52.

Baker and vicinity—Partly cloudy through Saturday with scattered showers and snow flurries, mostly in the mountains. Low Friday night 22-29; high Saturday 40-45.

Northern Oregon beaches—Occasional showers and brief sunny periods Saturday; continued cool. Temperature range 40-55. Southwesterly beach winds, 8-13 m.p.h.

Western Area—Cool with showery periods. Temperatures averaging below normal and precipitation moderate. High 45 to 52. Minimums 32 to 42. Total precipitation .50 to 1.50 inch on coast and .25 to .75 inch in interior valleys.

Eastern Area—Cool with temperatures averaging below normal. Periods of rain or snow showers probably Saturday and early next week. Precipitation moderate with total generally .55 to .40 inch. High temperatures 38 to 48. Minimums 22 to 32.

MONTAGUE — Melanie Dudley of the Etna 4-H Club, and Dick Kreutzer of the Table Rock 4-H Club were acclaimed as the All-Star 4-H girl and boy of the year, while the Big Springs 4-H Club was named as the outstanding club of the year at the annual county-wide achievement day dinner held Saturday afternoon, November 9, at the Montague auditorium.

Approximately 250 4-H members, parents, leaders and guests were present to enjoy the pollock dinner which was followed by the award presentations to many individual 4-H members, leaders and clubs.

Mrs. Virginia Zedker, chairman of the County 4-H Club Council, announced the All-Star Girl and boy selection and awarded each with a felt star and pin. The All-Stars are considered the outstanding 4-H girl and boy of the year, and the only higher award available is the Diamond Star, given to only two boys and two girls in the entire state.

Warren Tormey, representing the Yreka Lions Club, presented the Big Springs 4-H Club with the perpetual trophy as the outstanding club in the county. This is the second year in succession that this club has received the trophy.

Among the other presentations was a Herdsmanship Trophy awarded by the Yreka Eagles Lodge to the Grenada 4-H. E. H. Marlowe of Yreka made the presentation. Melvin Lean, secretary of the Siskiyou Farm Loan Association, presented a large 4-H flag to be used by all the county clubs for any county-wide occasion and special events.

Navy Nurse Plan Outlined

The Navy has established a new Nurse Corps Candidate Program to give selected senior college nursing students an opportunity to join the Navy while continuing their education, and on completion be commissioned an ensign.

The Navy plans to enroll a number of nursing students annually who are in a fully approved basic collegiate school of nursing, when they begin their senior year. These selectees will be placed in pay grade E-3 and will receive the pay of that grade plus tuition, fees, books, room and board throughout their senior year.

Upon receipt of their baccalaureate degree in nursing, they will be commissioned ensigns, Nurse Corps, Naval Reserve, with a two-year active duty obligation.

Applicants must be between the ages of 20-33½ at time of graduation.

Burglary Suspect Waives Hearing

A Merrill man waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury on charges of burglary not in a dwelling. District Judge D. E. Van Vactor announced Thursday.

John Shaddock, 26, has been remanded to the custody of the sheriff and bond set at \$3,000.

Sheriff Murray Britton said that Shaddock is charged with the recent burglary of the Merrill Southern Pacific Warehouse. His companion in the alleged burglary is Lee Taggart, 22, Klamath Falls. Britton said Taggart is in police custody in Los Angeles and said he will probably be extradited.

C Of C To Seek Bird Protection

The Agriculture and Natural Resources Division of the chamber of commerce will shortly formulate a resolution asking that predatory birds, such as hawks and owls, be removed from the unprotected list of the Oregon game code.

Subcommittee Chairman Jim O'Donahue said this resolution will be sent to the Oregon Game Commission, and added that he feels these birds should not be killed. He said if hunters would let them alone, perhaps the mice problem, now plaguing farmers could have been averted.

Land Inventory Progress Told

The first complete inventory of public property in Klamath County is now under way and first results have revealed five buildings on which taxes have never been paid, County Assessor Clyde (Hap) Caldwell said today.

"Percentage wise," Caldwell said, "we expect to find 95 more buildings or a total of 100 pieces of property which have never been on our tax rolls."

The assessor interpreted this to be a big "find" for the county and estimated that the inventory should be completed early next year.

Court Rules Against Plea

DUNSMUIR — A judgment against Carlos Silva of Dunsmuir was upheld by the California Appellate Court last week, according to Louis Lorenzen, Dunsmuir's city attorney, requiring Silva to restore an alleyway adjoining his property to a full 12 feet.

The city of Dunsmuir and property owners being served by the alley brought suit against Silva in 1953 after he constructed a garage jutting into the alleyway in question and reducing its width to nine and a half feet.

Silva appealed following a judgment from Siskiyou County Superior Court. Complainants in the case included the city, Reno Cesaratto, Eleanora Cesaratto, George McLaughlin, Ed Cripps, Mr. and Mrs. M. Guay, Mr. and Mrs. Perry Cooper, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Bland and Lydia Brown.
