

Orange Nip Indians 24-14

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 17.—The bouncing, bobbing runs of Joe Francis and his unerring passes carried Oregon State to a 24-14 upset over Stanford, eliminating Stanford from the Rose Bowl race Saturday.

Francis completed nine of ten passes including one for a touchdown and repeatedly swept end for needed yardage. All told, he accounted for 289 yards gained for the Staters.

The victory kept alive the Staters' hopes of earning at least a share of the Pacific Coast Conference title they won last year. They get their chance next week conference leading University of Oregon team.

Francis shook off the effects of an influenza attack that had him in the infirmary earlier this week, in leading the Staters to the win.

Besides passing to one touchdown, Francis' passing set up two other scores. He raced around end for two touchdowns himself. Fullback Nub Beamer made a one yard dive over the line for another Stater score and end Bob Degrant hauled in the touchdown pass from Francis. It was a nine-yarder.

Stanford never scored until the final period when long passes finally brought two touchdowns, the last one coming just 13 seconds before the final gun.

Quarterback John Douglas accounted for the first Stanford score. He completed three passes in a 64-yard drive with a 34-yarder going to end Joel Fries and the scoring pass going 19 yards to halfback Rick McMillen.

Another Stanford quarterback provided the final score just before the gun. It was an 11-yard toss from Bob Nicolet to end Irv Nicolai.

The Staters got off to a 12-0 halftime lead. After a scoreless first quarter, Francis led the home team on a 90-yard march, climaxed by his scoring pass to DeGrant.

Moments later, Oregon State was back again. An offside penalty cost Stanford that touchdown. Stanford had stopped the Staters on the one-yard line as time ran out in the first half, but the offside infraction gave the Staters one more chance.

They sent Beamer diving over the center of the line for the touchdown, climaxing a 74-yard march.

Francis opened the second half by throwing three passes to DeGrant to put Oregon State on the Stanford five. From there he circled right end for an 18-0 lead.

Midway through the final quarter, Douglas passed Stanford to its first score, cutting the margin to 18-7, but Francis responded by leading the Staters on an 81-yard drive. Once again Francis rounded end for the final five yards.

It was the biggest day Francis ever had. A crowd of 20,000 watched.

Francis accounted for 138 yards rushing and 136 passing. That gave him a season total of 1,007 yards, cracking the school record set by Ken Carpenter in 1949. Carpenter accounted for 1,003 yards that year.

The nine of 10 passes that Francis completed also was the best percentage mark for any Oregon State passer. The best previous was 8 of 9 by Dick Gray in 1947.

Solons Study High Finance

SACRAMENTO (UP)—Stockholders of the Sacramento Solon Baseball Club met Saturday to discuss how much money it may cost the Solons to have a major league baseball club only 90 miles away.

The owners were frankly worried.

President Fred David said it is certain that moving of the New York Giants to San Francisco "will hurt us."

The big question, he said, was "to what extent." He added that "San Francisco will be in the same type of business as we are, so it's certain to take away part of our gate."

This latest difficulty came atop other financial ills. David was reluctant to guess the amount of loss suffered by the Solon Corporation during the 1957 season, but it had previously been estimated as much as \$50,000.

The club president said he did not anticipate any changes in personnel of the seven-man board. All but one already have agreed to serve again.

Rice Edges Aggies 7-6

HOUSTON, Tex., Nov. 17.—Rice's Owls combined a mighty defense with the fancy work of two senior quarterbacks, Frank Ryan and King Hill, to upset Texas A&M, the nation's No. 1 team, 7-6 Saturday before a crowd of over 72,000.

The Owls, seven-point underdogs, drove 79 yards in the second period for a touchdown and then stopped three A&M threats inside the 20-yard line before yielding the Aggies a score on the second play of the final period.

The difference in the score was the extra point kicked by Hill. The conversion attempt by Lloyd Taylor, Aggie halfback, was wide.

It was the first defeat for Texas A&M in 15 games and the loss deprived the Aggies of at least immediate claim to the Southwest Conference championship. Rice and Texas now join the Aggies in a showdown race in the final two weeks of the title campaign.

The defeat also knocked A&M out of an immediate invitation to be host team at the Cotton Bowl.

Texas Clubs TCU 14-2

AUSTIN, Tex., Nov. 17.—University of Texas sophomores Saturday edged the Longhorns to a 14-2 victory over Texas Christian in what turned out to be a crucial Southwest Conference football game.

It was Texas' first win over TCU since 1954 when the Longhorns won a slim one point victory. TCU humiliated Texas the past two years with lopsided wins of 47-20 and 46-0.

Big Political Battle Still Hot In LA Over Dodgers

LOS ANGELES (UP)—Backers of big league baseball for Los Angeles Saturday held little hope that an all-out political fight could be avoided over a city ordinance to turn over a stadium site in Chavez Ravine to the Dodgers.

Opponents of a deal between the city and the Dodgers filed petitions Thursday calling for a vote on the ordinance embodying terms of the agreement.

The city clerk Friday cut 11-261 names from the petitions because precincts were not listed with the voters' names. However, observers were certain enough names — 51,767 — would be salvaged to force a vote.

Auburn Nips Georgia 6-0

COLUMBIA, Ga., Nov. 17.—Underdog Georgia scared mighty Auburn within an inch of its nationally ranked tie Saturday but the unbeaten Tigers dug in and squeaked to a 6-0 Southeastern Conference football victory.

A 15-yard penalty helped Auburn get its touchdown with less than a minute left in the first half. After that a fierce Bulldog defense stopped Auburn at every turn.

Late in the fourth period, Auburn drove 71 yards only to lose the ball at the Georgia 1 when the Bulldogs held Lloyd Nix for no gain on a fourth down quarterback sneak.

All-America end Candidate Jimmy Phillips got the touchdown that kept Auburn unbeaten and the leading candidate for the Southeastern Conference championship.

Although Auburn remained unbeaten, and stretched its winning streak to 12 games, the Tigers can't go to a bowl this year. They are on NCAA probation.

Irish Upset Oklahoma 7-0 To End Long Win Streak

NORMAN, Okla., Nov. 17.—Oklahoma's all-time record of 47 straight football victories was shattered Saturday by an underdog Notre Dame team that marched 80 yards in the closing minutes for the all-important touchdown and a 7-0 triumph.

Oklahoma, No. 2 ranked in the nation and an 18-point favorite, couldn't move against the rock-wall Notre Dame line and the Sooners saw another of its national records broken — scoring in 123 consecutive games.

The defeat was only the 9th for Oklahoma Coach Bud Wilkinson since he became head coach at Oklahoma in 1947 and virtually ended any chance for the Sooners getting a third straight national championship.

Although the partisan, sellout crowd of 62,000 came out for a Roman holiday, they were stunned into silence as the Sooners were unable to pull their usual last-quarter winning touchdowns — a Wilkinson team trademark.

As the game ended when Oklahoma's desperation passing drive was cutoff by an intercepted aerial, the crowd rose as one and

You see the same old faces—clutching Rocky Castellani, Orlando Zulueta, Jackie LaBua, Vaughn, Bobby Boyd, Kenny Lane, and Hurricane Tommy Jackson whom Floyd Patterson turned into a hospital case. These tigers don't even hold the free-lance television audience anymore.

Meanwhile Mike De John stiffened Alex Miteff, the young heavyweight chosen most likely to succeed, in 1 minute and 17 seconds at Syracuse. And promoters in Syracuse and Portland, Ore., not the IBC, are now trying to pair De John with Pat McMurry, a first rate Tacoma heavyweight who has never been off the Pacific Coast.

Ray Harris returns to the wars against Willi Besmanoff in Houston, Oct. 29, but a stablemate of the Cut and Shoot club has come on to such an extent that boxing men now rate him far ahead of the backwood school teacher who beat Willy Pastrano.

His name is Cleveland Williams and he is considered the most

dangerous heavyweight in the business. If Harris requires any protection, the hope is that Williams would be a policeman with considerable authority. The mere suggestion that they qualify by first beating Williams will keep any toughies away from Harris.

Williams is a 25-year-old Negro with reflexes as quick as a sneeze, the size and strength of a longshoreman, graceful movements of a panther and a hatred of every man's chin in pugilism except his own.

Several weeks ago in Houston, Williams drew a head on one belonging to Bob Albright, a California trial horse who heretofore had managed to remain as erect as a redwood tree. Albright collapsed. Several nights ago, he knocked Chicago's Johnny Holman dead.

Williams, who stands 6 feet 3 and weighs 196 pounds, has knocked out five since being discharged from the Army. Over-all he has won 37 of 39 fights, 33 by knockout, and there were extenuating circumstances attached to his two defeats.

And the record book doesn't contain evidence of his knockout of Bob Baker, for it was in a Miami gymnasium in 1954, three days before the peaceful Pittsburgher, who could fight a little better in those days, was to meet Archie Moore.

They were wearing headgear and 16-ounce gloves. Baker hit Williams, so Cleveland pitched a left hook that turned Big Bob's toes to the daisies.

Williams was 20, as his fistic career began in 1952, when he rode a bus from Griffin, Ga., to Tampa and looked up Lou Viscusi. They know about Williams in Texas and Florida. This new blaster has a TV date in Tampa, Dec. 11, against the best opponent Manager Viscusi can coax into the battle.

This show will be for the benefit of the Babe Zaharias Cancer Fund, and the fight guys say that when the last shot is fired the entire country will know about Cleveland Williams.

Miss Bumps Vols 14-7

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Nov. 17.—Mississippi coupled a 42-yard punt return and a recovered fumble for a 14-7 win over Tennessee Saturday. The victory meant an almost certain bowl bid for the once-beaten Rebels.

Tennessee, the nation's seventh ranked team, was a 6½ point favorite over eighth ranked Mississippi.

Both Mississippi touchdowns came after Tennessee had stopped Mississippi drives on its five yard line. Halfback Leroy Reed set up the first with a 42-yard rumbuck of a Tennessee end zone punt. He was tackled on the two.

Fullback Bill Hurst bulled across two plays later.

Guard Jackie Simpson triggered the second Rebel score when he recovered a Tennessee fumble on the Vols' five. Quarterback Raymond Brown made the touchdown on third down, sneaking the final foot.

Washington had a 17-12 advantage in first downs and a 219-99 margin in rushing yardage. Washington completed 5 of 11 passes to 10 of 35 for Oregon.
