Early Science Training Urged

OXFORD, Ohio (AP) — The teaching of science, even in the kindergarten, is being proposed by the Ohio Science Education Assn.

An integration of science principles into all grades from kindergarten to high school is included in a six-point program proposed by the association here Friday.

A. F. Forance of Sharonville, chairman of the conference, suggested that college science may have to be put into the high schools and high school science into the elementary schools as a means of meeting future demands in science and technology.

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He said he fears, however, that the 1957 Legislature might have to increase taxes 10 per cent.

Sen. Warren Gill, Lebanon Republican Senate leader, said his party was responsible for bringing the special session to a successful conclusion. He pointed out that the Republicans, by insisting on a 30 per cent tax reduction, were able to come out with a cut more than three times as great as the governor originally proposed.

Other comment: Sens. Walter J. Pearson and Alfred H. Corbett, Portland Democrats — "Gov. Holmes is to be congratulated. For the first time in history . . . a governor has called a session for the express purpose of giving the taxpayers a break. Democrats are more interested in serving the citizens of Oregon than making foolish claims of victory out of joint actions."

Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D), Milwaukie — "Our action is imprudent and unsound, with inevitable tax increases a few months from now."

The final debates on the income tax bill were brief.

In the House, the four negative votes were cast by Reps. Carl Back, Sixes; Keith D. Skelton, Eugene; and Don Willner, Portland, all Democrats; and Graham Killam (R), Portland.

Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D), Milwaukie, cast the only Senate vote against the bill.

The Democrats who opposed it expressed fears that the tax cut would leave insufficient surplus.
