Agricultural Group Calls Conference

LAKEVIEW—Wednesday, November 20, has been set as the kickoff day for the first county planning conference this winter of the Lake County Agricultural Planning Council, according to announcement by Oris Rudd, extension agent. All committee chairmen have been invited to attend, and as many committee members as possible are urged to take part. Oris M. Shallenberger is chairman of the council.

The opening meeting, one of a series to be held between November 20 and February 15, will be held at 1:30 p.m. in the memorial hall at Lakeview. Clifford Smith, Betty Sedgwick and Bill Fowler of the Oregon State Extension staff will present a panel discussion on "Outlook," national, state and county levels.

Every 10 years the planning council holds a 10-year look ahead conference to strengthen its planning. This serves as a means of developing long-time objectives to meet the ever-changing needs of the people of Lake County. The first was held in 1936 and the second in 1947. The various standing committees of the council are reorganized to insure representation from all the county. These committees then give some thought to what the next 10 years will bring by way of change, and what the changes will mean to the particular interest represented by the committee. This will develop the recommendations for action by the extension service and other interested groups.

Heading the various committees are Raymond Johnson, land use; L. A. Withers, beef; George Manning, sheep; Margaret Kaley, youth; Grace Williams, home and community; Homer Baldwin, dairy, hogs and poultry; and J. W. Ogle, crops.

Because of the distance from Lakeview residents in the north end of the county have been asked to hold their own meetings and outline the problems of their communities. Extension agents will meet with them for their first meeting on Tuesday, November 19. Their recommendations will be incorporated later into the full Lake County report.

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Matinee Idol Eyes Grandson As Last Hope For Big Star

HOLLYWOOD (UP)—Francis X. Bushman looked proudly up to his towering grandson today and hoped the 26-year-old fledgling actor will someday reach the heights he himself scaled 50 years ago.

Bushman was lunching with Pat Conway—his daughter Virginia's 6-foot, 3-inch son—who stars in the television series "Tombstone."

"He's my last hope for family stardom," Bushman said. "All the others have dropped out of show business."

Young Pat was anxious to talk about his career, but Grandpa Bushman took the spotlight. The enormous difference between the flamboyant oldtimer and today's spoon-fed newcomers was reflected in their relationship. Bushman had "show biz" written all over him. Pat looked like a businessman.

Bushman played it large, with gestures and stentorian pronouncements.

"At the height of my career I had a dozen secretaries and lived in a mansion on 288 acres," the grizzled veteran said. "My home

cost a quarter of a million to keep up. I had 28 servants and drove a \$20,000 Marmon car. It was royal purple trimmed with gold."

"Bushman really lived it up," Pat put in.

"I earned six million bucks in one five-year period," his 72-year-old grandparent continued, "and I spent it faster than it came in. But I have no regrets. I would spend it even faster today."

"I pray that Pat achieves the same things, but it's not possible. Young actors don't have the authority or distinction they did when I was a star."

"The halcyon days are over for movie stars," Pat agreed. "No star lives the way Bushman did."

Flashily dressed in sports coat, slacks and weskit, Bushman still is ruggedly good-looking, more handsome, in fact, than young Conway. He lives modestly in a small bungalow overlooking the

Pacific, spending his spare time surf fishing.

"I've studied all of Bushy's old pictures," said Pat. "Most young actors do. And I've learned a lot from them, even though he made his last big picture more than 30 years ago."

Pat maneuvered the conversation toward his ABC-TV program, then winced when Grandpa interrupted. "I don't think he should work in horse operas. I never played in one in my life. He's worthy of greater things."

"But no matter how good Pat gets he'll never live the life of a movie star the way I did. Those days are lost forever."

Pat nodded mute agreement.

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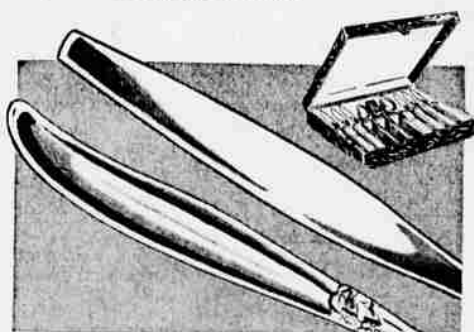
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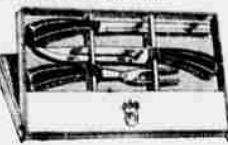
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
