Low-Budget Teen-Age Knitters Can Still Make Thrifty Yule Gifts

Teen-agers who are handy with the knitting needles can hold down Christmas-gift budgets if they start clicking away right now.

The trick in knitting up wearables for your friends is to make sure that you're creating something the friend will really wear. Stay away from the too covers. Toe covers are the things that people shudder at, hide away at the back of the closet and eventually either give to someone they dislike or donate to a white elephant sale.

Size can be a problem. But the problem is eliminated if you knit

a striped stocking cap, a chili-chaser hood or a half cap which ties under the chin. These are all done in one size which will fit any head.

Other possibilities include a sleeveless white sweater blouse with velvet trim, a waistlength jacket made of bulky yarn, and a striped stole. The stole is also made of bulky quick-knit yarn. It's

made in one size only.

The cost to make for the stocking cap, chili-chaser hood and half cap is approximately \$1 each. Cost for the sweater, jacket and stole will vary with the quality of the yarn used.

Stocking cap, hood and half cap can all be bought in pre-packaged packs which include yarn, needles and instructions.

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
