Former Basin Resident Dies

Word has been received here of the death of Richard Duncan Wagner, 61, who has resided in Calgary, Canada, for the past 45 years. He died November 1 after a brief illness in the Calgary General Hospital. He was born at Sidney, Nova Scotia, Canada.

Before moving to Calgary he was employed by the Klamath Telephone Company and was construction boss in Poe Valley when the first line was being built there. It was there that he met his wife, Bertha Freuer. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary April 14 of this year.

In 1912 they returned to Calgary where he was employed by the electric light company of that city. Mr. Wagner retired in 1942 with the rank of chief electrical inspector of the province of Alberta.

New School Bid Awarded

The California Department of Finance has approved acceptance of the low bid of Duncan Construction Company, Klamath Falls, and a contract has been awarded Duncan to build an addition to the Butte Valley High School at Dorris.

Howard R. Perrin of Klamath Falls, architect for the project, returned Sunday from the allocation board meeting at Sacramento. A change order has been put through, he said, reducing Duncan's total bid of \$358,453.32 by \$6,927 to bring it within allocated funds. The changes have been negotiated with the contractor, Perrin added.

Dr. Jere E. Hurley, superintendent of the Siskiyou Joint Union High School, Yreka, also attended the meeting to recommend the acceptance of the contract.

New construction at Dorris will include a science suite, a three-room homemaker unit, shop, cafeteria and music room combination. The plans specify location of the cafeteria and music room on the street side so that there can be joint use of these facilities by the elementary school when need arises.

Work will start as soon as there is a break in the weather.

Dr. Hurley said that plans are now being readied in Perrin's office for advertising for new units at McCloud, Weed and Mount Shasta.

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Czechs Elect New Leader

VIENNA (AP) — The Communist-controlled Czechoslovak Parliament today elected Communist party chief Antonin Novotny Czechoslovakia's new president.

Novotny, 53 on Dec. 10, succeeds Antonin Zapotocky, who died last Wednesday and was buried yesterday.

Others who had been mentioned for the presidency were Premier Vilem Siroky and Deputy Premier Jaromir Dolansky. It was believed Siroky lost out because he is a member of the Slovak minority.

Novotny has been first secretary of the Czechoslovak party's Central Committee since Sept. 14, 1953.

Novotny will continue to hold the party reins. Siroky, in nominating him for the presidency, said the party "considers it necessary to combine the post of first party secretary with that of the nation's president."

Siroky made the nomination on behalf of the Communist party and the Red-dominated national front organization.

There were no other nominations. All 353 Parliament members promptly raised their hands in affirmation when the vote was called.

Probers Still At Loss For Plane Crash Cause

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Investigators say they have found evidence of fire in debris from the Pan American Stratocruiser that went down in the Pacific 10 days ago with 44 persons aboard.

But they have not determined so far whether the fire occurred while the plane was still in the air or after it hit the water.

A Civil Aeronautics Board representative announced the discovery yesterday after the aircraft carrier Philippine Sea returned here with the remains of 19 of the victims and 14 cartons of wreckage.

The carefully packaged debris was loaded on trucks for removal to San Francisco, where an official examination will be conducted by the CAB.

The bodies of the victims also will be examined by pathologists, chemists, dentists and others in an effort to uncover anything possible about the nature of the crash.

SPECIAL TRAIN

Each body will be X-rayed for the purpose of learning precise effects of the impact. The examiners also hope to get some idea of what angle the plane was traveling at when it hit the sea.

An honor guard of six Marines stood at attention at the foot of the gangplank as the bodies were removed from the carrier.
