### Garcia Backs U.S.A. Policy

MANILA (AP)—President Carlos P. Garcia declared today that he will continue the strongly pro-American Philippine foreign policy stressed by the late President Ramon Magsaysay.

The 61-year-old political veteran was relaxed and confident in his first news conference since election to a full four-year term a week ago.

He made these major points: There will be no changes in Philippine support for the United States, active participation in the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization and the United Nations and backing for Nationalist China.

He still is uncertain about whether his new vice president, Diosdado Macapagal of the opposition Liberal party, will give the vice president's traditional post of foreign minister. It depends on Macapagal's attitude and what arrangements can be made between Garcia's Nationalista party and the Liberals, the President said.

Garcia said economic problems are his immediate concern. He added that the country needs more loans from the United States and the World Bank to finance industrial development.

Efforts will be made to attract more foreign capital, the President said, and the Philippines will try to expand its trade with Europe and other parts of the world.

### Basin Resident Completes Training As Health Aide

Clarence V. Courtney, Klamath Falls, graduated November 17 from a six-week course in Phoenix, Arizona, to qualify for employment as a sanitarian aide by the U.S. Public Health Service and will be assigned to the Umatilla Reservation. Courtney was one of the 11 Indians representing 13 tribes in 11 states who were selected for this training by the Public Health Service.

Upon reporting for duty on the Umatilla Reservation, the new sanitarian aide will work among the people demonstrating practical sanitation and hygiene methods. The sanitarian program in the area is under Arthur L. Dopmeyer, area sanitary engineer, stationed at Portland.

Dr. Ruth E. Dunham, Public Health Service officer in charge of the Portland Indian Health Area office, said that expansion of services to the Indians by sanitarian aides is part of the service's efforts to reduce the excessive incidence of preventable diseases that take a heavy toll in the Indian population. As examples, she said that dysentery and tuberculosis are

nine times more prevalent among Indians than the general population, and the incidence of infectious hepatitis is three times as great.

Dr. Dunham pointed out the causes of this poor health picture. These include lack of sufficient water by many Indians, and the necessity for their hauling water as far as a mile or more to their homes. Improper practices in handling food resulting from inadequate knowledge, and overcrowded housing which is conducive to respiratory infections.

To date, six sanitarian aide courses have been conducted in Phoenix in connection with the Indian health program, and a total of 96 Indians have received this training.

### State To Drop Fong Charges

PORTLAND (AP)—The state intends to drop its last charges against Sherry and Wayne Fong, the Portland couple acquitted of charges they killed a 16-year-old baby sitter in 1954.

Mrs. Fong was acquitted last week in her fourth trial. Previously there had been a mistrial and two convictions that were overturned on appeal. Her husband was freed in a separate trial earlier.

Dist. Atty. Leo Smith said he will move for dismissal of the remaining charges. One against Fong of contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and two against Sherry—one of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and another of removing a body without permission of the coroner.

### COLLEGE GRADS EARN MORE

MIAMI BEACH (UP)—Paul Gurske, director of the Bureau of Labor Standards of the U.S. Department of Labor, told the Florida Federation of Labor convention Monday that the average college graduate earns a total of \$289,000 in his lifetime. Gurske said bureau statistics showed the college graduate's lifetime earnings average \$113,000 more than those of a high school graduate and \$152,000 more than those of a grade school graduate.

### Photographer Sues Actor

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—A newspaper photographer has sued actor Jack Palance for \$15,116 battery damages.

George O'Day, of the Los Angeles Herald-Express, charged in the suit filed yesterday that Palance attacked him without provocation when O'Day attempted to take the actor's picture last Sept. 6.

The incident took place outside a courtroom where Palance had appeared in connection with a separate maintenance suit brought by his wife, Mrs. Virginia Baker Palance.

O'Day, 45, asked \$7,500 actual and \$7,500 punitive damages, in addition to \$116 medical expenses.
