

TV Censors Modify Dress

HOLLYWOOD (UP) — Jittery television censors Tuesday night ordered a last-minute remodeling of a \$6,000, flesh-colored chiffon dress blonde Zsa Zsa Gabor planned to wear on George Gobel's coast to coast program.

The fiery Zsa Zsa objected but submitted as busy seamstresses sewed a hip-toe slit so that it was discreet knee-toe opening and added a ruffle to de-emphasize the actress' décolletage.

"It is a beautiful gown," Zsa Zsa pouted in the wings of the NBC television stage. "I think it's a very ladylike gown and it's just perfect for a television appearance."

Censor John Bushnell didn't agree. He took one look in an on camera test before going on the air and decided that the near to nothing gown with Zsa Zsa in it was too much for the nation's living rooms.

Before the show, Bushnell said that there are no rules about how much or little a performer may wear on television.

"A lot depends on how well-endowed the girl is. And Zsa Zsa is blessed with all the charms any girl could hope for. I'll be right there to see that the dress isn't too hot to handle."

In case Zsa Zsa decided to be stubborn about modeling the creation, the station planned to switch to a deft-fingered organist who had warmed up in the pits for a musical emergency.

Oregon Weather

Officials Eye Plane Debris

SAN FRANCISCO (UP)—A team of civil aeronautics experts studied today debris recovered from the sea after the crash of the Pan American Stratocruiser, "Rance of the Skies."

The debris arrived at San Francisco International Airport Tuesday night from Long Beach, Calif., where it was brought by the carrier Philippine Sea. The carrier spearheaded a week-long search for the plane.

The plane disappeared Nov. 8 while flying from San Francisco to Honolulu with 44 persons aboard. The bodies of 19 were recovered and brought to Long Beach aboard the Philippine Sea. The debris was contained in 23 boxes. It ranged from luggage to seat cushions and floor material from the plane. The only parts of the plane itself found were a small emergency door, a heavy piece of steel from an engine cowling and a partially charred kitchen cabinet.

Leon Cuddeback, head of the CAB team, said the debris was "flotsam, not real wreckage." "It may require from 10 days to two weeks to reach even a preliminary conclusion," he said. "There are many facets to the investigation. We don't know what it will show."

Cuddeback said the CAB has invited representatives of the FBI, Pan American and Boeing Aircraft Company, manufacturers of the Stratocruiser, to join in the investigation.

RIVERSIDE SCHOOL

Marjorie Curteman, county health nurse, explained "The Public Health Program in Your Community" to members of the Riverside PTA on Tuesday, November 19, in the school cafeteria.

Some of the many services in the public health program are with communicable diseases where free services are rendered such as X-rays for tuberculosis, a health education service which is a teaching service for mothers and fathers, and a home nursing service taught in the home, and a maternity program for expectant mothers.

Other public health services are the well child clinic to keep the child well, an immunization service which supplies shots for all ages, a home visiting service to show how to help the mother, and a school health program to assist teachers in checking the health of students.

Miss Curteman explained the public health program has a child guidance clinic twice a month and a crippled children service which is a national service handled through the University of Oregon in our state.

Don Golding, Riverside principal, said that under the school health service, Miss Curteman visits Riverside School every Wednesday morning. He pointed out that Klamath County has almost 6,000 square miles and there are only six health nurses to cover the entire territory.
