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Manhunt For Cop-Killer Ends When Inmate Admits Identity

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. — "I'm the burglar of a Batavia, N. Y., in shop. He had been sent to the mental institution for observation."

A dozen words spoken by a man serving 30 days in jail for vagrancy. But they spelled the end of a weeklong nationwide manhunt for Frank Edward Wetzel, mental institution escapee sought in the killing of two North Carolina state patrolmen.

Wetzel confessed his identity after fingerprints on file with the FBI were matched with those taken from a stolen car parked near an alley where he was arrested here Tuesday night. Wetzel had been the object of an intense manhunt since Nov. 14, when his prints were taken from another stolen car—one of several found along a trail leading from the scene of the double slaying in North Carolina.

The governor of Mississippi called out the National Guard after Wetzel, 36, escaped from the Willard, N. Y., mental institution Oct. 21. Wetzel had announced that he intended to free his brother, William, 27, who is under a death sentence in the Mississippi State Penitentiary at Parchman. Wetzel originally had been arrested Sept. 25 and charged with

Scholarship Set By Footprinters

DUNSMUIR — Provision for a \$250 scholarship for the study of law enforcement for some Siskiyou County student was planned at the Footprinters meeting in Yreka on Tuesday evening. Lee Clark, president, reported.

George Banich, Siskiyou County undersheriff, was appointed chairman of the scholarship committee.

A decision was made to reactivate Chapter 6 of Footprinters, the Dunsmuir club. The purpose of the Footprinters organization is to enable police officers and business men to meet informally and to promote mutual understanding.

The 20 x 36-foot steel structure has a capacity of 4,000 bushels. Buick has already stored more than 40 tons of grain from this year's crop, including the rye produced on the townsite.

Thirty-two lots were platted prior to the energizing of Midstate Electric lines throughout the area two years ago by Buick who owns 1,030 acres in this area.

This year Buick irrigated 200 acres with 43 acres in new alfalfa. He cleared 100 acres last year. Two pumps of 25 and 30 horsepower furnish water from wells 182 and 199 feet in depth, respectively. Both were drilled by Edwin Eskelin of Fort Rock with the homemade drilling outfit he built in 1935.

Held in a maximum security cell in Kern County jail, Wetzel was arraigned last night before U. S. Commissioner William Hulse on three counts: unlawful flight to avoid prosecution for murder, transporting a stolen car over a state boundary, and violation of the Federal Firearms Act. The FBI recommended \$150,000 bond.

Two Bakersfield patrolmen arrested Wetzel Tuesday night when they caught him loitering in an alley next to a sporting goods store that sells firearms.

He put up quite a battle, the officers reported, and was taken to the police station in handcuffs. Once there, however, he calmed down and became quite polite.

Wetzel gave his name as Paul Cameron and the next day was sentenced to 30 days in county jail as a vagrant.

After Wetzel was sentenced, police discovered a car bearing Missouri license plates parked near the sporting goods store in this inland city, 110 miles north of Los Angeles.

Wetzel's fingerprints, found inside the car, were turned over to the FBI for a check.

The two North Carolina officers—Walter Lee Reece and James Thomas Brown—were shot down Nov. 5 when they stopped a speeding 1957 sedan. The FBI said a trail of stolen cars led into Kentucky, where a car bearing Wetzel's prints was found.

Wetzel said he had been in Bakersfield just three hours before he was arrested.

"I went to a movie, had something to eat and then they picked me up in an alley," he said.

Wetzel refused to talk to police about the North Carolina slayings. "I've got nothing to gain and too much to lose," he said. "I have nothing to say."

"I will say this, though," he added. "I got the urge to kill when

Bakersfield Detective Henry Lottmann said Wetzel gave this account of his travels:

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On Nov. 3 he left Buffalo, N. Y., and went to Louisville, Ky. In Shively, Ky., he stole a car in front of a supermarket.

He then went to Vincennes, Ind., Columbia, Mo., Denver, Colo., Kingman, Ariz., and Los Angeles.



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
