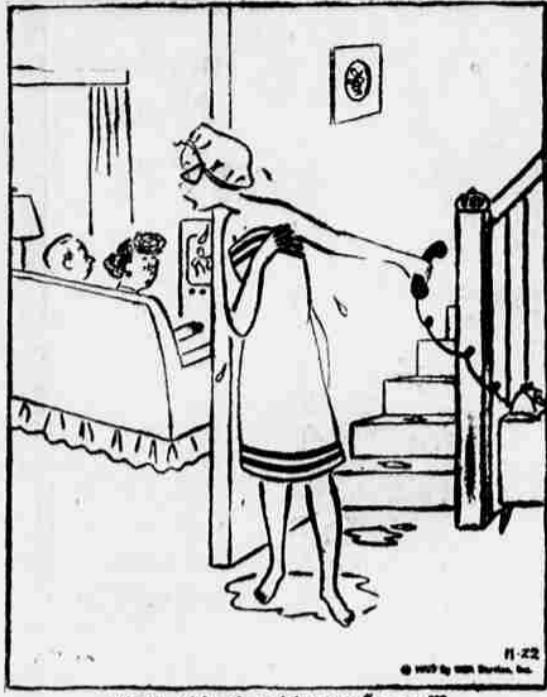

Death Takes Ex-Resident

John (Jack Malatch) Migliaccio, 59, former Klamath Falls resident and businessman, died of a heart attack on Friday, November 15, while on a hunting trip in the Black Creek region of Elmore County in Idaho.

Mr. Migliaccio, owner of the Kanteen Cafe in Boise at the time of his death, was accompanied by a son, Jim, 14, and two friends. Officers said he reportedly had the attack while at the wheel of a jeep.

He was born in Cleveland, Utah, June 17, 1898 and came to Klamath Falls in 1929 to establish and operate a wine distributing business and later the first Pepsi Cola Bottling Works, then in Mills addition. He left here in 1944 to go into business in Boise. He was a member of St. Michael's Episcopal Church.

Mr. Migliaccio is survived by his widow, Ruby, Boise, to whom he was married in 1942 in this city; three sons, Raymond, Klamath Falls; Arnold, Roseburg, Oregon, and Jimmy, Boise; two daughters, Mrs. Edith Baker, Medford, and Rose Mary, Boise; his mother, Mrs. Tony Migliaccio, Price, Utah; five brothers, Dominic, Palisade, Colorado; Thomas, Helper, Utah; Lawrence, and Frank, Price, Utah, and Ralph, Spanish Fork, Utah; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Krissman, Green, Utah, and Mrs. Elizabeth Bonza, Helper, Utah; also six grandchildren.

Funeral services were held in Boise, November 18, with final rites and burial in Morris Hill Cemetery.

Algerian War Talks Urged

RABAT, Morocco (AP)—Leaders of the Arab states flanking Algeria today addressed an urgent appeal to France and Algerian rebels to negotiate an end of their three-year conflict. King Mohammed V of Morocco and President Habib Bourguiba of Tunisia offered their good offices in peace negotiations. There was no immediate reaction from French officials or from leaders of the Algerian National Liberation Front (NLF), the chief rebel group fighting for independence from France's North African province. Sources at the United Nations, where the Algerian rebellion is scheduled for debate next week, predicted that nothing would come of the appeal. The appeal was made at the end of a two-day meeting between Mohammed and Bourguiba, who led their countries from French protectorates to independence last year. Their communique called for "negotiations which will lead to a just solution, taking into consideration the materialization of the sovereignty of the Algerian people conforming to the principles of the United Nations and safeguarding the legitimate interests of France and of its citizens living in Algeria." France has refused to recognize any Algerian rebel claim to sovereignty. Frenchmen living in Algeria fear that their interests would not be safeguarded in an independent Arab state. The French have insisted that the rebels agree to a cease-fire before negotiations on independence can begin. The NLF Executive Committee demands that France first recognize Algeria's right to independence. The King and Bourguiba, who tacitly support the rebels while seeking not to give open offense to France, apparently hoped for American support of their offer. Mohammed will fly to Washington next week for a 15-day state visit.

Judge Denies Mistrial Move

Attorney Richard B. Maxwell Friday moved for a dismissal of the \$175,000 damage suit filed against Weyerhaeuser Timber Company by Clinton D. Edwards, 39. The motion, requesting the dismissal on the grounds of misconduct by the plaintiff's attorney, James A. Meyers of Oakland, was denied by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

French Kill Rebel Troops

ALGIERS (AP)—French parachute troops have encircled a group of camel corps deserters and killed 40 of them in a battle deep in the Sahara, military sources said Friday. The camel troops quit French ranks nearly a month ago. Later they attacked a French oil drilling team near Timimoun, 600 miles south of Algiers. Acting on information received from captured Algerians, a heavy contingent of parachute troops was flown to the area of the Hassi-Rhambou oil wells, 35 miles from Timimoun. The area was quickly encircled Thursday and after heavy fighting the French reported 40 rebels killed and 6 taken prisoner. The prisoners were all camel corps deserters. The French placed their losses at six dead and a dozen wounded. The fight was continuing Friday.

Judge Denies Mistrial Move

Maxwell objected on the grounds that the doctor was not the attending physician and then moved for the mistrial on the grounds of Meyers' misconduct. Under further examination, the doctor said that Edwards' amputation, four inches below the right knee, was not ideal for an artificial limb. He stated that the ideal spot would be six inches, but that the attending physician must be governed where the best spot would be at the time of amputation. Dr. Compton added that he believed further surgery would be necessary and said that it is possible that someone, someday might recommend amputation above the knee. "But, I'm not ready to say that yet," Compton stated. Shortly before the Herald and News went to press, the prosecution called the complaining witness Edwards to the stand.

Former Basin Resident Dies

James H. Burkhard, former resident of Klamath Falls, died in a Dallas, Oregon hospital two hours following an automobile collision on November 15 in which one woman was killed. He was the brother of Howard A. Burkhard, Klamath Falls contractor with whom James came to this city in 1927. According to reports of the accident, Mr. Burkhard had been employed as a carpenter foreman on construction work at Hermiton and was en route home when the car in which he was a passenger was involved in an accident as another car attempted to pass two cars in the slow lane of traffic. The woman was killed in the passing car which struck the flatbed truck carrying the construction crew. Funeral services were held November 19 in Oregon City, the family home. Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Ariel Burkhard and one daughter, Diane, 17, Oregon City; five brothers, Howard, Klamath Falls; Bernard, Bly, William, Olympia, Washington, Raymond, Walls, Washington and Charles in California; two sisters, Mrs. Mary Gale, Klamath Falls and Edna of Burlingame, California; also his father, William G. Burkhard of this city.

These prizes were furnished by the Klamath, Langell Valley and Poe Valley Soil Conservation districts. Annual 'M' Campaign Set

"It's time to mobilize for kingdom service," according to Dale Harvey, Associational Training Union director for the Klamath Baptist Association. December 2 has been set as "M" Night, or Mobilization Night, for 30,834 Southern Baptist churches in 1,071 associations, as announced by R. Maines Rawls, director of associational work in the Training Union Department, Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, Tennessee. Klamath Baptist Association will observe "M" Night on December 2, at the Calvary Baptist Church, 7:30 p.m., East Main and Garden, when five churches in the Klamath Basin will participate. Local Baptists who will assist in program plans are Dale Harvey, 2118 Home, associational training union director; Lloyd Samson, associate director; and Troy Hall, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Tulelake. The biggest meeting of its kind in the Southern Baptist Convention, this year's attendance goal is set at 450,000. Klamath Association's goal is 200, Harvey said. This special night was begun in 1945 with the promotion of a large simultaneous Baptist associational mass meeting on April 23, 1946. It was decided to designate December for "M" Night observance and to make it the regular mass meeting for the quarter for launching the training union program for the coming year.
