Irrigation Rate Schedule Listed

TULELAKE — The Tulelake Irrigation District through its manager, Maurice K. Strantz, has announced the 1958 irrigation charges which have been set on the same scale as for the 1957 irrigation season.

Directors adopted the current budget as presented by Strantz, who reported that continuance of the replacement program will continue at about the same rate as in the last year.

Water rates will be collected on a toll charge basis at a rate of \$5 per acre for operation and maintenance, and \$1 per acre for construction charges in the private land areas. In the public land area the charge will be \$6.85, which is a reduction from \$7.70 per acre charged in the previous year.

TB Tests Slated For Livestock

TULELAKE — All livestock, both dairy and beef cattle will be bloodtested for tuberculosis and vaccinated with the assistance of a veterinarian from the California State Department of Agriculture, and Dr. Fred J. Wedam, Klamath Falls.

Animals should be vaccinated between 6 and 12 months of age. Farmers are urged to contact Ken Bagholt at the Tulelake farm advisers office if they have any livestock in the area.
