

Nurse Makes Fatal Mistake

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—A 46-year-old laboratory technician last night sobbed that she mistakenly fed a woman patient two ounces of deadly sodium cyanide thinking it was a solution for a diabetes test. The patient fell dead.

Mrs. Emily Nash said she administered the solution to Mrs. Margaret Van Alstine, 67.

Mrs. Van Alstine had called on Mrs. Nash's employer Dr. Joseph E. West Jr. Wednesday and returned for the tests at his direction.

Detective H. W. Rodgers said no charge would be filed but the case would be referred to a grand jury.

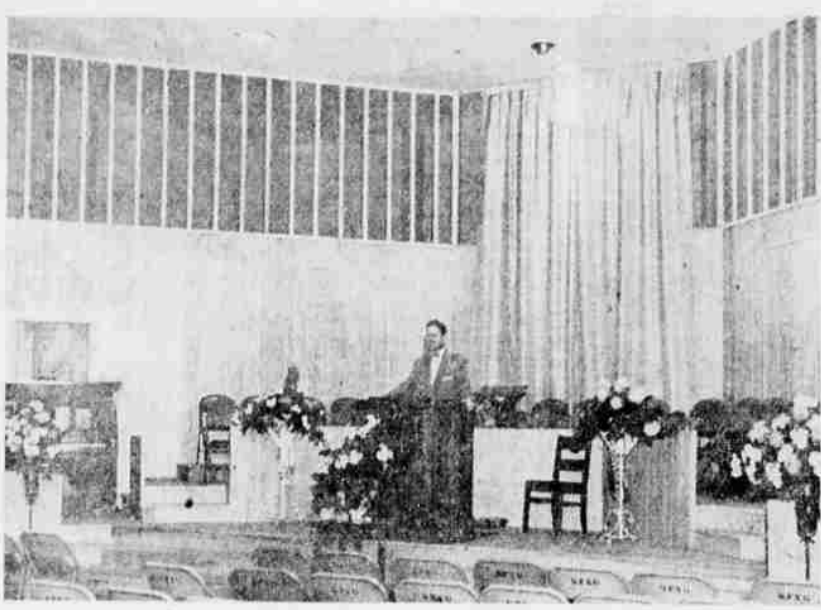
Rodgers said Mrs. Nash told him she prepared what she thought was a dextrose solution Wednesday with crystals from a bottle which she discarded in a waste basket. The bottle was recovered and found to be labeled sodium cyanide.

He said Mrs. Nash told him she took a blood sample from Mrs. Van Alstine and then poured two ounces of the solution into a glass for her to drink.

She quoted Mrs. Van Alstine as saying, "Oh, that tastes horrible." The patient then drank the rest of the solution and fell from her chair, Mrs. Nash told detectives. "It dawned on me that I might have given her the wrong solution," she wept.

Dr. West arrived a few minutes later and administered an adrenalin injection. "But she was already dead," he said.

Mrs. Van Alstine made her summer home near Big Rapids, Mich., but spent the winters with relatives here. She was a widow.

Air Currents Shake Plane

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A Western Air Lines plane carrying 33 persons bounced crazily through the air east of here last night after hitting a downdraft over Ontario. Fourteen passengers and two stewardesses were injured.

The stewardesses and some of the passengers were thrown against the roof of the DC6B when it was sucked downward by the draft, then pitched up by a reverse draft, and almost immediately jerked down again by still another draft.

The cabin was filled with flying luggage as passengers were hurled from their seats.

The stewardesses, Diane Hallock, 22, Los Angeles, and Sue

Elzel, 21, San Diego, were knocked unconscious, along with a number of the passengers. Four of the passengers were still unconscious when the plane landed safely at Los Angeles International Airport. The flight started at Las Vegas, Nev.

None of the injured were believed in serious condition. Most of them suffered facial cuts or injuries to their heads, backs or necks.

The pilot, Capt. W. C. Steen, said he blinked on seat belt warning lights as the plane approached Ontario. But several of the passengers apparently were still moving about the cabin, watching a roaring forest fire north of Azusa, when the plane hit the downdraft.

A REAL SURPRISE

Treasure Collection Sale Ends Dream Of Fine Home

DALLAS (AP)—Treasures of a wealthy Dallas woman who always dreamed of having a fine home but lived almost 50 years in a downtown hotel will be sold to settle her estate.

None of the treasures—including her wedding presents—were ever used. They were sent directly to a Dallas warehouse for storage.

The wedding gifts were being unwrapped from their original tissue paper wrappings under the watchful eyes of Pinkerton

guards. They will be evaluated by experts from Neiman-Marcus Co., Dallas specialty store.

The estate is that of Mrs. T. J. Carmody, who died in 1955. Her husband, a Corsicana, Tex., banker and investor, died in 1940.

J. N. Garrity, vice president of the Corsicana First National Bank and executor of the estate, said he could not estimate the value of the collection.

He indicated it would be sold at a private sale after its appraisal. One antique silver urn bears the original bill of sale showing that Mrs. Carmody paid \$2,640 for it.

Another item—a brass clock and pair of candelabra "from the collection of J. P. Morgan"—shows a price of \$1,250.

Four large wardrobe trunks bought and sent directly into storage, still in their original packing cases, cost \$2,200.

A sizable group of large antique silver sets and urns were willed by Mrs. Carmody to the Dallas Museum of Fine Arts and are set aside for the museum.

Garrity estimated that the silver going to the museum may be worth \$75,000.

"But that's strictly a wild guess," he added.

There are other less valuable treasures too. Bottles of French perfume by the dozen, unopened. Set after set of ivory dominoes, obviously never played with.

And, in a tiny box, a little silver tumbler and a lock of hair.

Fare Increase Plea Studied

PORTLAND (AP)—The City Council is confronted with a request to raise again fares on Portland's mass transportation system.

The Rose City Transit Co., which operates the system, applied Thursday for an increase of adult fares from the present 20 cents to 25 cents per ride, or two rides for 45 cents.

It asked that high school student fares be jumped from 10 to 15 cents. Grade school students' fares would be the same—20 rides for \$2. But the company wants elimination of the \$3 weekly pass.

Raymond Perkins, general manager of the company, said that unless the increases are granted, the firm stands to lose \$81,007 this year.

The company has been granted eight fare increases since the end of World War II.

Rose City also asked the council to approve a new five-year permit to replace one which will expire next July.

Disabled Ship Reported Safe

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP)—The wind-lashed power yacht Gosling was reported safely anchored off Santa Rosa Island today after having spent an uneasy night in violent Pacific waters.

The Coast Guard said a rescue vessel was alongside and a Navy ship probably would tow the disabled craft and its 12 passengers to Port Hueneme sometime today. The yacht shipped water badly.

The 75-foot yacht radioed a distress call yesterday after strong winds opened recently refastened seams, the Coast Guard said.

The yacht is owned by Lazard Lippman, Redlands, Calif., rancher.

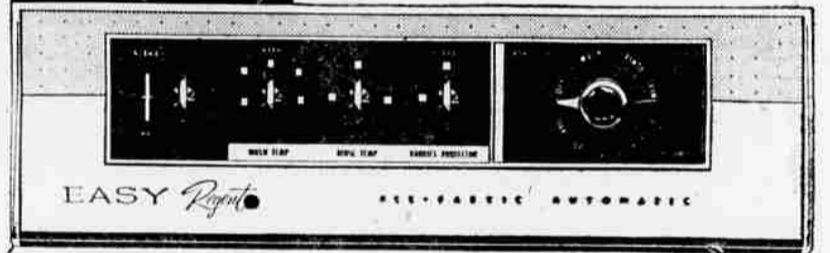
