

NY Garbage 'King' Jailed

MINEOLA, N. Y. — Garbage truck king Vincent Squillante was jailed today on an indictment charging extortion.

Squillante, self-styled godson of the murdered mobster Albert Anastasia, was held in a cell pending arraignment later in the day along with an indicted brother and an associate.

Squillante, 40, is accused of extortion and attempted extortion in the garbage collection industry in Nassau County, a Long Island commuting suburb of New York City.

Allegedly the racket boss of the 50-million-dollar-a-year garbage and rubbish pickup business in the New York metropolitan area, he took the Fifth Amendment last Friday in Washington. He refused to answer questions before the Senate committee investigating rackets in the fields of labor and management.

The county grand jury meeting in an extraordinary night session, handed up indictments shortly before midnight against Squillante, his brother, Nunzio, and Carmine de Cabaia, president of the Nassau Suffolk County Cartmen's Assn., an employer group.

All three were charged with attempted extortion, and Vincent Squillante and De Cabaia with extortion also, in connection with garbage carting contracts at Mitchell Air Force Base and its nearby barracks area.

The indictment charges that Angelo Recchia, who formerly had a contract to haul the Air Force base garbage, gave up the contract to the Squillante group and paid \$3,900 to Vincent Squillante after being threatened with being forced out of business.

Immediately after the grand jury returned the indictments, County Judge Paul Widitz issued bench warrants to police, who picked up the defendants at their homes.
