The bride's gown was of white flannel sheer nylon. The bodice, designed with a low off-the-shoulder effect with sheer pleated nylon over the shoulder, was made with short sleeves of the flannel sheer. The floor-length skirt flared from the fitted bodice to the wide hemline over a full foundation topped with fine permanent pleats of nylon tulle.

The matron of honor, bridesmaids and candlelighters all wore ballerina length frocks of net over taffeta. The honor attendants wore light green; and the others, light blue. Their half-halo headpieces

and bouquets were identical, of satin feathered carnations and bronze pompons. The flower girl wore a floor-length dress of white nylon. Her half-halo was of yellow carnations and she carried a white, yellow trimmed basket filled with bronze and yellow petals.
