Six Perish In Collision

RUBY, S.C. — A milk tanker truck sheared off the top of a sedan Sunday and killed six members of a family.

The collision of the milk tanker driven by 17-year-old Joe Lee Mills of Mount Croghan and the car driven by Robert Hazel Miles, 31, of Heath Springs, killed Miles and five members of his family.

The crash occurred on a small hillcrest on a paved rural road about 12 miles south of here. The cause was undetermined.

Ruby is 50 miles southeast of Charlotte, N.C.

The dead were Miles, a textile worker; his wife, Christine, 25; sister, Betty Jean Miles, 16; mother, Mrs. Mary Miles, 50, of Jefferson, and his two children, Judy, 3, and Jewel, 1.

Mills was seriously hurt.

Quiz Experts In Deadlock

NEW YORK (UP)—Quiz champion Teddy Nadler and two challengers remained deadlocked at \$16,000 Sunday night on the CBS TV program "The \$64,000 Challenge."

Nadler, who has already won \$152,000 on quiz programs, drew the first challenge in the general knowledge classification Sunday night and correctly answered an \$8,000 series of questions on world treaties, mythology, colonial America and modern art.

His challengers, Norman Fruman, a comic book writer, and Barry Simmons, a public relations counselor, accepted the correct answers as correct, deadlocking the contest.

Simmons then answered another \$8,000 series of questions on the same subjects correctly, and Nadler and Fruman correctly accepted them as correct, continuing the deadlock.

Senator Backs U.S. Buildup

CHICAGO (AP)—Sen. Styles Bridges (R-NH) Monday expressed belief that there would be a buildup in military security for Americans without sacrificing economic stability.

Speaking at the closing general session of the United States Savings and Loan League's 65th annual convention, Bridges reasserted his willingness to support increased government spending, "between one and two billion dollars for a stepped-up research and development program for rocketry and satellites."

"I am acutely aware of the need to strike a balance between economic stability and military superiority based on a matchless technology," said Bridges. "I believe we can have both; indeed, it is vital that we do have both."

Bridges said he expected President Eisenhower to submit a balanced budget next January, "despite what increase for missile and satellite development may be necessary."

Plane Crash Fatal To Men

SAN LUIS OBISPO (UP)—Two Van Nuys men were killed Sunday when their single-engine Cessna aircraft crashed on take-off at a private landing strip in ranch country, about 30 miles from here.

Sheriff's deputies identified the victims as Vincent L. Meier, 35, Los Angeles city fireman and Richard Martin Magaro, 29, an aircraft worker.

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Mate Greeted With Bullets

SAN BRUNO (UP)—A blonde housewife had an out of the ordinary greeting for her husband when he arrived home early Sunday.

Mrs. Barbara Cattaneo, 24, fired four shots through the door as her husband, Richard, 25, stood on the other side trying to get in.

She told police she was afraid of a beating. She had locked him out and Cattaneo tried to cut his way in with a knife. He is a butcher.

Cattaneo said the trouble had its beginning many hours earlier when his wife left the house at 8 p.m., saying she would be home in an hour. He said it was three hours before she returned.

She told him she had been at the home of friends.

An argument ensued. Cattaneo went out. When he tried to get back in at 4 a.m., his wife fired at him.

Mrs. Cattaneo, the mother of three, was booked on charges of assault with a deadly weapon, disturbing the peace and illegally discharging a firearm in the city limits.

British Enjoy U.S. Breakfast

MANCHESTER, England (AP)—Forty Englishmen sat down to their first all-American breakfast Monday.

They found the coffee "superb," the pork sausage, "a bit hot for the tongue," the paper plates, "flimsy" and the apple juice, "smashing."

The over-all verdict was that American breakfasts were just a bit too much for light-eating Englishmen.

The meal, even down to the paper cups, was flown all the way from Kalamazoo to Manchester. One diner called the feat "the most amazing thing of the lot."

The breakfast introduced Kalamazoo, Mich., and marked the opening of a U.S. government exhibition showing how American small city dwellers get along.

The menu of sausage, eggs, buckwheat cakes, maple syrup, apple juice, coffee and vitamin pills was called by a Manchester alderman "delicious, but a bit much. I won't be wanting anything else to eat for some time."

Kalamazoo was selected as most typically American from among three other finalists—Topeka, Toledo, and Evanston.

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
