

Revenue Service Changes Mind On New Tax Forms

WASHINGTON (AP) — Switching signals again, the Internal Revenue Service now says taxpayers may ignore the line on their 1957 income tax returns which calls for their business expense accounts.

But the announcement yesterday by Commissioner Russell C. Harrington emphasized that the decision "does not change the long-standing rules which the revenue service has been following with respect to substantiation of deductions when a taxpayer's return is audited."

The law has required since 1921 that the money an employee draws on his expense account be listed as income. He then is allowed to deduct his actual expenses. But the law has been regularly ignored, especially by small taxpayers whose reimbursement only equals their expenses.

These expenses and deductions were supposed to have been listed on a separate sheet. Then last month the service disclosed that the 1957 forms—which taxpayers will get early next year—call for the totals on the returns themselves. This was done to make it easier to check on big expense accounts in which there may be some tax fraud, but the law made it applicable to expenses of any amount.

U.S., British Plot Charged

LONDON (AP)—Moscow radio today reiterated charges that the United States and Britain are trying "to shoulder France out of North Africa" so they can take over the Sahara Desert's rich oil deposits.

The English-language broadcast based on an article in the Soviet army newspaper Red Star, clearly was intended to increase the present French dissatisfaction with Washington and London.

It said the desire of American and British oil interests to control the Sahara explained the U.S.-British decision to send arms to Tunisia. Moscow first made the charge immediately after the arms agreement.

Washington and London have denied any such motivation. The arms were sent to newly independent Tunisia, they said, to prevent the Russians from supplying the weapons and thus gaining a North African foothold.

British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd denied in a speech Saturday that the Tunisian arms move resulted from economic considerations.

Moscow's new attempt to increase the strain between France and her two English-speaking allies came while Prime Minister Macmillan and Lloyd were in Paris for reconciliation talks.

"Businessmen from both shores of the Atlantic are feverishly estimating the profit they can make out of the mineral resources of the desert," the broadcast said.

Oregon Points Sight Rocket

PORTLAND (AP) — A "Reddish-white ball of fire" was reported seen over Western Oregon early Tuesday and the chief of this city's moonwatchers said there was a possibility it was the burning rocket of Sputnik I.

Ed Merrill, a farmer at Philomath, 90 miles south of here, said he noted a bright light about 5:30 a.m. as he went to his chores and looked up to see "A reddish-white ball of fire brighter than any star" going across the sky toward the northwest.

He said it was practically overhead and had a small tail.

Paul South, a Portland bus driver, reported seeing something similar at about the same time. South said it was a bright light, but not like any meteor he had ever seen before.

Don Wilkinson of radio station KLOO at Corvallis, who got the call from Merrill, said he also received calls from two other persons who had seen the light in the sky.

Robert Boardwell, head of the Portland moonwatch group, was not observing at the time, but said from the description it could be the rocket of the Russian satellite Sputnik I.

Experts have predicted an early end to the rocket which is expected to burn up as it falls.

The rocket was seen over the San Francisco Bay Area about 6 p.m. Monday.

But Boardwell said its orbit is contracting so rapidly there was a possibility it could be in a morning orbit by this time traveling in a northwesterly direction. The burning rocket likely would have a trailing tail, he said.

RATIFIY TREATIES

ROME (UP)—France has become the second nation to deposit instruments of ratification of the six-nation European Common Market and Atomic Pool Treaties, it was announced today. French Ambassador to Rome Gaston Deleury deposited the instruments at the Italian Foreign Ministry Monday, following the lead of Italy.
