

OTI Owls Face Vikings In Two-Game Home Series

Williams, Winters, Shoot For SOC Scoring Honors

In their two-game series against the Portland State Vikings this Friday and Saturday on Mile High Court, Oregon Tech's smooth working Owls meet a squad grimly determined to move up on the league leaders.

Tangling with the Owls, of course, is not the best way to gain a position in the conference standings since the Owls are presently in a tie for the No. 1 spot with SOC Red Raiders. The Vikings, however, fresh from their third straight win in league play, are figured to be a strong contender.

The OTI cagers are two games up on the Viks, since they dropped them two straight in league openers.

A scoring duel is in progress between Owl high-pointers, Truman Williams and eagle-eyed Viking,

any scorer all he wants in the way of competition.

Forward John McCutcheon, who won all conference honors in the 56-57 season, is presently running third in the Owl score column behind big center, Charlie Bogle. McCutcheon, who is the overall floor commander of the OTI five, probably can be called the most awe-inspiring player in the Oregon Collegiate Conference because of his unerring ability beneath the bucket and his consistency from the outside.

Center Bogle, is without a doubt one of the most improved players in the league and certainly is a threat in any scoring race. Bogle is also listed in the top 20 north-west scorers.

John Winters, Winters, the sensational all-around performer from Portland, is averaging about 12.5 points per conference game to be presently ahead of all conference scorers.

Williams, although he got a late start in the basketball wars, is waging a nip and tuck battle with the agile Winters for the top honors. At one time Williams was out front but the Viking caught and passed him just recently. The Owl forward is determined to recapture the No. 1 spot in this weekend's activity.

Such an occurrence is a great possibility, since Williams' eye has been steadily improving and his work beneath the boards, aided by rebounding John McCutcheon, indicates he has the stuff.

In facing either John Rhine or Jerry Fasten at the guard slots, the Viking shotmaker has his work cut out for him in trying to maintain his scoring pace. Both Rhine and Fasten have enviable reputations as spoilers and can give

Friday and Saturday evenings. Both games will be broadcast directly from the OTI floor.

According to Oregon Tech spokesman, Tex Hunsaker, the hill approach to the school will be kept free of snow and ice, in case of inclement weather.

In a preliminary contest Friday night, the Owl JV will face the National Guards, from the city league. On Saturday night a crack team of ex-college ball players representing Brooks - Scanlon from Bend will challenge the Jayvees. Both preliminary games will start at 6:15.

Brooklyn Cagers May See Unbeaten Record Crumble

What had figured to be the beginning of a chance at prestige could tonight be the beginning of the end for St. John's of Brooklyn, last of the unbeaten in major college basketball.

St. John's (9-0) took over the undefeated list when West Virginia, top-ranked for six weeks in The Associated Press poll, was knocked off Monday at Duke.

But now the Redmen, rated 13th, have lost big man (6-6) Lou Rothel to injury for tonight's road game against Pittsburgh. He'll still be missing Saturday at Philadelphia against 11th-rated Temple.

After that, it's West Virginia at Madison Square Garden a week from tonight.

Only one of the top 10 was busy last night. Eight-ranked Kentucky reclaimed Georgia 74-55 and retained full share of the Southeastern Conference lead. The Wildcats (13-4), in the midst of a three-game road schedule, fell in a tie for the top with Georgia Tech when the Engineers upset 'em Monday.

Vern Hatton led Kentucky scoring with 29 points against Georgia, but it was the second half sharpshooting of reserve Earl Adkins

Ram Switches To Mat Career

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Professional football player Frank Fuller of the Los Angeles Rams announced Thursday that he is starting a new career as a wrestler and one antagonist he hopes to meet is big Leo Nomellini of the rival San Francisco 49ers.

The 6-foot-4, 245-pound defensive tackle for the Rams learned to wrestle in high school in Du Bois, Pa., his home town, and in 1955, after football season, he worked the mat game in Kentucky and the Midwest.

Fuller used the name of "Kentucky Colonel," a title bestowed on him during his great years with the University of Kentucky.

He'll be billed now as "The Battering Ram."

"Leo Nomellini and I used to kld about who could handle who if we ever got on the mat together. I hope we'll be able to settle this matter soon," said Fuller.

Bears' Marshall Gets \$150 Fine

Willie Marshall of the Hershey Bears may lose his temper now and then, but it's a cinch he can add and subtract.

The 26-year-old wing was fined \$150 by American Hockey League President Richard Canning Tuesday for a series of penalties against the Cleveland Barons on Jan. 15. A few hours later he went out and scored a goal and an assist to lead the Bears to a 5-2 win over the Barons.

Stan Musial, Ted Williams Always Bettering Records

Ever since they have been in the major leagues, Stan Musial and Ted Williams have bettered one baseball record or another.

Now Musial has added another one to his long list. Put it under "highest annual salary, National League"—\$100,000. The St. Louis slugger signed for that figure yesterday.

Stan's salary is not a major league mark only because Williams is expected to hit \$125,000 when he comes to terms with the Boston Red Sox.

Musial's contract represented a \$20,000 boost over 1957. The 37-year-old veteran earned it with his league-leading .351 average coupled with 29 homers and 102 runs batted in.

Williams, 30, who is more concerned with fishing than baseball at the moment, should have no trouble reaching a salary agreement with the Red Sox. Ted's 339 batting performance of last season is a good "line" and \$125,000 is excellent "bait."

Almost from the start of Musial's career in 1941 baseball fans have been arguing whether he or Williams is the better hitter.

At the moment, Williams leads in lifetime batting average—.350 to .349; home runs—456 to 381; and runs batted in—1,639 to 1,572. Musial shows the way, however, in batting titles with seven to Williams' five and in Most Valuable Player awards, three to two.

Right-handed pitcher Murry Dickson, 41, who was Musial's teammate for many seasons until he was unconditionally re-

Opponents Can't Stop Bob Cousy

The opposition still hasn't found a way to stop "little" Bob Cousy and as a result, the Boston Celtics are shoo-in favorites to win their second straight Eastern Division title in the National Basketball Assn.

The six-one Cousy, only one of four players ever to score more than 10,000 points in the NBA, tossed in 39 Wednesday night as the Celtics rolled to a 111-101 win over the St. Louis Hawks, whom they'll probably meet in the playoffs at the end of the season. The win widened Boston's lead over second-place Syracuse to six and one-half games.

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
