

Baylor Manhandles Page 24 In Seattle's Basketball Book

SEATTLE (UP)— They might as well rip page 24 out of Seattle University's basketball press book because the way big Elgin Baylor is manhandling it is something fearful.

That's the page that lists the school's individual marks but Baylor's basket-bombing has made it as obsolete as high button shoes.

The 6-6 Negro star had the greatest night of his career Thursday night with a 60-point explosion

that carried the Chieftains from the depths of a 19-point deficit to a tingling 94-91 victory over Portland University.

Baylor gave page 24 another beating as he cashed in 24 of 34 field goal attempts and 12 of 13 charity tosses to set two new school records and move to within a whisker of the nation's leading scorers.

His 24 field goals broke the school mark of 22 which he set earlier in the month against Montana State College. His 60 points also was a new school high washing out the 53 he established against Montana State.

Baylor was the only sane person in the house when he stepped to the free throw line with 11 seconds left and casually dropped in two free throws to snap a 91 to 91 tie.

Baylor's 60-point burst raised his game average to 31.7 and leaves him breathing on the necks of Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati and Wilt (The Stilt) Chamberlain of Kansas.

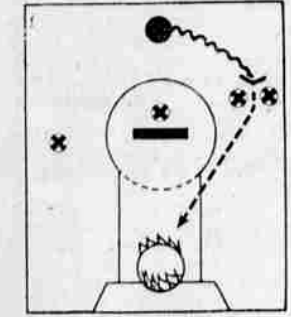
Robertson got 30 markers Thursday night in Cincinnati's 79-59 verdict over Miami of Ohio and his 32.6 game mark leaves him just a notch ahead of Chamberlain at 32.4.

A junior who transferred from College of Idaho, Baylor has put in four years of college and will be eligible for pro ball when school is out this June. The line is forming on the right.

Whether he makes the jump to pro ranks or finishes up his college career next year is something that has Coach John Chamberlain keeping his fingers crossed.

The consensus is Baylor will make an outstanding pro player. Bob Feerick, Santa Clara coach and a former pro star himself, sums up Baylor's chances in the play-for-pay ranks with a few well-chosen words: "He's a cinch."

Seattle U Star Threat To Top Point Scorers

Elgin Baylor of Seattle threatened the pace setting Oscar Robertson and Wilt Chamberlain of Kansas for individual basketball scoring honors among major colleges Friday following a 60-point spree.

Baylor upped his average to 31.7 points a game Thursday night in leading Seattle to a 94-91 victory over Portland. The Seattle flash tallied 24 field goals and 12 free throws for the highest individual point production of the year.

Robertson, whose 56 points against Seton Hall at New York's Madison Square Garden was the previous high, held to first place but his average slipped to 32.7 when he tallied only 30 points in Cincinnati's 59-59 triumph over Miami of Ohio. Chamberlain, idle, remained in second place with 32.4.

Pitt's Don Hennon, only other member of the troop 10 in action Thursday night, scored 26 points as the Panthers beat St. John's of Brooklyn, 86-73. His average fell off a percentage point to 26.5.

League Leaders Face Stiff Tests

Oregon Tech and Southern Oregon, tied for first place in the Oregon Collegiate Conference, will stay at home Friday night to open two-game basketball series. OTU, with a 7-1 record, will open a series in Klamath Falls with Portland State, which has won three of its seven conference games.

Southern Oregon, also with a 7-1 mark, will meet Eastern Oregon (2-6) in Ashland.

The conference's other team, Oregon College of Education, will meet Linfield of the Northwest Conference at McMinnville.

Carousel Has Yacht Honor

ACAPULCO, Mex. (UP)— Carousel, a 40-foot sloop owned by Ashley Bowen, San Diego, walked off with top honors in the San Diego to Acapulco yacht race, according to overall standings announced today.

The handicap of 2 days, 9 hours enabled the smaller craft to win the championship from Windward, the 82-foot sloop of E. R. and Don Chidcott, Los Angeles, which finished Tuesday, setting a new record for elapsed time.

Second in the overall point standings was another Class C boat, Lady Bountiful, a 41-foot sloop owned by Waldo Waterman and Steven Newmark, San Diego. The Windward, a Class A craft took third.

Handicaps are awarded on the basis of size of boats, amount of sail and other factors.

In Class C, Carousel was first, followed by Mistral, 36-foot sloop owned by Bud Desenberg, Balboa, Calif., with Lady Bountiful third.

Class B honors went to Rocking Chair III, a 45-foot yawl owned by Earl C. Corbett, Newport Harbor, Calif., followed by Balerina, 48-foot sloop owned by Carlz Gould, San Diego, and Nahu II, another 46-footer, which Peter Grant, Newport Harbor, Calif., owns.

5 Collegiate Champs Slate Ring Contests

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UP)— Five of the nation's eight collegiate boxing champions will see action tonight when Idaho State tangles with Sacramento State—and still another couldn't make the trip.

Four titleholders will compete for Idaho State, defending NCAA champions, and one will see action for Sacramento State, which finished third in the NCAA tourney last year.

The Bengal champions include heavyweight Hal Espy, 147-pound Bill Hanes, 139-pound Ron Hall and 132-pound Dave Abeyta. Sacramento State will counter with 156-pound champ Jim Flood, who has moved up to the 165-pound class this year.

Idaho State's other NCAA champion, light heavyweight Dale Leatham, could not make the trip.

Tonight's winner will probably establish itself as the favorite for this year's NCAA tourney, which will be held here in March.

Lefty From 'Down Under' Whirls Along Tourney Trail

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UP)— The world's greatest left-handed golfer, a 21-year-old amateur from Christ Church, New Zealand, is giving the U.S. tournament trail a whirl.

His name is R. J. (Bob) Charles. New Zealand amateur champion and one of the few southpaw shotmakers ever to hit the circuit who can clout a long, straight ball.

Charles is a skinny, 6-3 youngster who says he weighs "about

11 stone" which figures out to about 154 pounds (U.S.).

Since he was a youngster, Charles has dreamed about touring the world with a golf club—and he finally has his ambition coming true.

He qualified for the Phoenix Open by shooting a shaky 74 and on his first round he still was a bit nervous. But he isn't always that way.

He won the New Zealand Open championship three years ago at the age of 18. And guess who finished second, none other than the great Peter Thomson. Australian and British Open champion and a top winner on the U.S. circuit when he competes here.

"I've been saving money for this trip ever since I finished school and went to work," says Bob, who works in a bank in Christ Church. "I put aside 1,200 pounds (\$3,336 U.S.) with some help from my family."

"My dad is headmaster in a school—and he also is a southpaw golfer."

From here young Charles and his traveling companion, Ian Cromb, will go to Las Vegas.

Finsterwald, Mosel Enter Round Tied

PHOENIX, Ariz. (UP)— Dow Finsterwald, who makes \$40,000 per year playing "conservative golf," and Stan Mosel, an unknown who makes \$15,000 per year as a club pro, went into the second round of the Phoenix Open golf tournament today deadlocked for first place and holding comfortable two-stroke leads over the rest of the field.

Finsterwald, a notorious slow starter in tournament play, who has finished second 13 times in the last two years while winning only two tourneys, had a steady 33-33 in the opening round, while Mosel had 32-34.

"I'm a conservative player," said Finsterwald. "Why not? The hours are good and it's hard to beat the money. Why gamble?"

"There are so many good players in contention that this tournament will go right down to the wire with a dozen men having a chance to win it," said E. J. (Dutch) Harrison, recent winner of the Tijuana Open, who was slightly off the pace with a 72. Defending champion Billy Casper of Apple Valley, Calif., had the same score.
