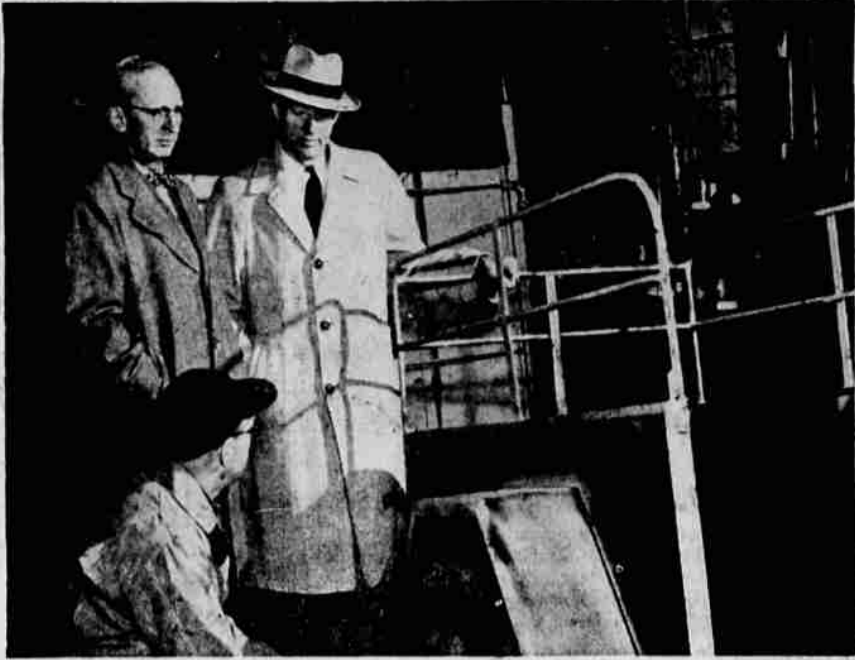

Home Extension

Thirty five project leaders from the 18 homemakers units in Klamath County were trained in the lesson on "Freezing Combination Main Dishes," January 28, 29 and 30. The training meetings were held in Joan's Kitchen at the fairgrounds. . . . The project leaders participated in making chicken a la king, ham-burger loaf, broiled mushrooms, potato puffs, garlic buttered French bread, and freezer meat sauce. The products were packaged and frozen for use in the following days' training.

County extension agent, Ruth Gustavson, emphasized that when freezing combination main dishes, the food should be slightly undercooked to provide the best eating quality and that packaging is important to eliminate leakers and saves on freezer space. She also brought to their attention, that foods to be frozen, should be chilled quickly to assure best results and to avoid spoilage. . . . Project leaders will be giving this lesson to some 500 homemakers in Klamath County during February. Anyone wishing to receive this lesson may contact the county extension office or the chairman of a unit. The county extension office is located in the Post Office Building in Klamath Falls. The telephone number is TU 4-8151.

Man Arrested On Dope Count

YREKA - It was announced Tuesday, January 29, that after a two months undercover investigation with the cooperation of the state narcotics agents, Billie Jack Lessman, 30, was apprehended in Yreka charged with the possession of narcotics. . . . Lessman was employed by a plumbing concern and was working at the Siskiyou County General Hospital at the time of his arrest. . . . A search of Lessman's room at a local hotel turned up several small cans of marijuana. There was no indication that any marijuana had been distributed. . . . Lessman admitted readily to the charge. He is now being held in the Siskiyou County Jail, and will be arraigned in the Yreka District Court.

Ski Insignia Contest Set

DUNSMUIR - Prizes for \$25 each in three different categories are being offered by the Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl for emblems and insignia according to George Schrader, executive secretary. KANSAS CITY - Winston Churchill's paintings have drawn more visitors than any comparable showing in the history of the Nelson Art Gallery. . . . The British statesman's first one-man art show has been seen by 15,000 persons in nine days. . . . Laurence C. Sicksman, gallery director, expects the total to reach 20,000 by the time the exhibit is closed Sunday.

Reenlistment In USN Gains

Lieutenant Commander C. Helm, officer in charge of Navy recruiting in Oregon and Southern Washington said in Portland recently that reenlistments for the area in December show a gain of 135 per cent over December 1956. A total of 184 men reenlisted through the Portland office in 1957. . . . Helm attributes the increase partially to the economic condition of the area, but principally to the Navy's stepped-up program to attract trained ex-servicemen to a career in the Navy. Career inducements for qualified ex-servicemen include assignment to trade schools upon reenlistment with leave, and travel pay paid in advance. . . . Ex-Navy personnel considering reenlistment are urged to contact their local recruiters to determine their present status for reentry into the Navy.

Pedestrian Deaths Down

Pedestrian traffic deaths in Oregon have dropped 42 per cent since 1940 despite substantial increases in the state's population, motor vehicle usage and vehicle registrations, the Oregon State Motor Association announced recently. . . . Pedestrian fatalities in 1957 numbered 78 according to preliminary figures reported by the State Motor Vehicle Department. This is a drop of 42 per cent from the figure of 134 pedestrian fatalities recorded in 1940. . . . During the same period, total traffic fatalities show an increase of 18 per cent while non-pedestrian fatalities are up 72 per cent. Motor vehicle registration for the same period is up more than 100 per cent. . . . The substantial improvement shown in the pedestrian accident picture is a tribute to the pedestrian safety campaign carried on by most cities and the state of Oregon since 1940. . . . The Oregon AAA Club declared, "Since that year, the state of Oregon and more than 20 Oregon cities have participated in the national AAA Pedestrian Protection campaign which are held as a stimulation for official pedestrian safety activities. . . . The state of Oregon and the cities in the state have won more than a hundred awards during the period since the contests started in this state. . . . The saving in pedestrian lives, despite the increased exposure to accidents, as shown by population increases, greater vehicle registrations and ever-increasing motor vehicle use, is the big payoff for the pedestrian safety campaign." . . . On the national level, the improvement in pedestrian safety is the same, the motor association said. Pedestrian deaths have decreased 33 per cent since 1940, while motor vehicle registrations rose 104 per cent and the U.S. population jumped 29 per cent.

Lake County Ring Broken

LAKEVIEW - A roundup of teen-age youths and one adult during the past week has resulted in confessions concerning various cases of larceny throughout the county during the past several months. . . . Five youths who are in the custody of the sheriff appeared before Judge Charles H. Foster Thursday who is deliberating on the cases. . . . The boys, in 16 and 17 year age groups, have confessed break and entries back to October to Sheriff Tom Elliott and Youth Counselor Howard Hopper. Articles were stolen from the E. G. Favell cabin at Fish Lake, the Ralph Benner ranch on the Westside, the Choc Shelton cabin at Drews Reservoir, and several other instances where theft of gasoline was involved. . . . Vernon Francis Story, 20, entered a plea of guilty on a charge of petty larceny on January 28, when he appeared before Justice of the Peace O. C. Gibbs. He was sentenced to 120 days in the county jail. After 60 days he may apply to the court for suspension of the remainder of the sentence if good cause is shown.
