Search On For Missing Lads

City police report three missing boys in the aftermath of a grade school basketball jamboree at KUHIS Friday night.

At 3:22 a.m. Saturday they were informed by parents that two boys, Jess Williams, 14, 909 Alameda and Lonnie Polk, 14, 1826 Manzanita, had not returned home after leaving about 7:30 Friday night for the jamboree.

The two boys had previously been reported by city police as having run away from home.

Early Saturday morning another call informed city police that a third boy, John Arthur Harper, 12, 1740 Johnson, was also presumed to be with the missing boys as they all left for the game together.

City police described the boys as follows: Williams, 5 feet 4 inches tall, weighing 110 pounds, brown hair and eyes, wearing a red and black reversible coat and blue jeans; Polk, 5 feet, 2 inches tall, weighing 90 pounds, light complexioned, blond hair and blue eyes, wearing a navy blue coat and grey hood with blue jeans; Harper, weight 100 pounds, fair complexioned, brown hair and blue eyes, wearing a red jacket and blue jeans.

Police have put out an all point bulletin for the boys. Anyone knowing their whereabouts or having seen any of the three boys is asked to contact the city police, TU 4-3111 immediately.

Snow Depth Reported Up

KLAMATH AGENCY — Agency Foresters Billy Crawford, Sam VanWyke and Virgil Wilson made the annual trek to the snow course on Sun Mountain on January 29 and reported the snow depth and water content just double that of a year ago.

The snow depth averaged 88.87 inches on the course, the water content 27.87 per cent. A check of last year's survey showed 44.4 inch snow depth and 13.4 per cent water content.

The foresters reported that the snow was wet and sticky making the 12-mile snowshoe hike very difficult. Crawford, a veteran snow surveyor remarked, "That was the toughest trip I have ever made."

Earlier in the week, the Klamath County Chamber of Commerce dispatched the following telegram to Sen. Neuberger: "In reply to your telegram of January 16, it is our opinion that any, repeat, any bill which will prevent the destruction of the Klamath forest, is infinitely preferable to the present law."

"It would be tragic if public law 587 is allowed to remain unamended solely because of differences of opinion among those favoring amendment as to the form it should take."
