

Baylor Takes Cage Scoring Lead

Two kids who might as well be named Joe as far as national recognition is concerned have really scrambled the individual scoring race in major college basketball. Because of John Powell, who plays for Miami of Ohio, and Jack Sauer of Duquesne, Elgin Baylor of Seattle is No. 1 with 1,000 points, the Kansas All America, second and Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati third. Actually, less than a 10th of a point separates the trio now that Powell and Sauer have limited Robertson to 50 points in his last two games. Baylor scored 103 in his last two. Baylor has a 32.43-point average, Chamberlain has a 32.42 mark. Robertson is 32.35.

Baylor is idle until a Friday-Saturday date against Gonzaga. SAUER FOULS OUT
Robertson, who had a top-ranked 32.7 average until Powell hit him to 30 points Thursday, scored only 27 against Duquesne Saturday in a 72-61 Cincinnati victory. He didn't get rolling until Sauer fouled out with 9:10 left. Cincinnati ranked third behind West Virginia and Kansas in the Associated Press poll plays next at Philadelphia Saturday against St. Joseph's. Chamberlain, the early pacesetter, could regain the lead with 34 points tonight as Kansas and Kansas State meet in the second match of their three-game showdown for Big Eight honors. Will counted 37 when Kansas beat K-State 72-61 for the Big Eight Tournament title at Christmas time. That's the only game fourth-ranked Kansas State has lost. The Wildcats won No. 14 Saturday with an 83-54 win against Colorado for a 4-0 conference record.

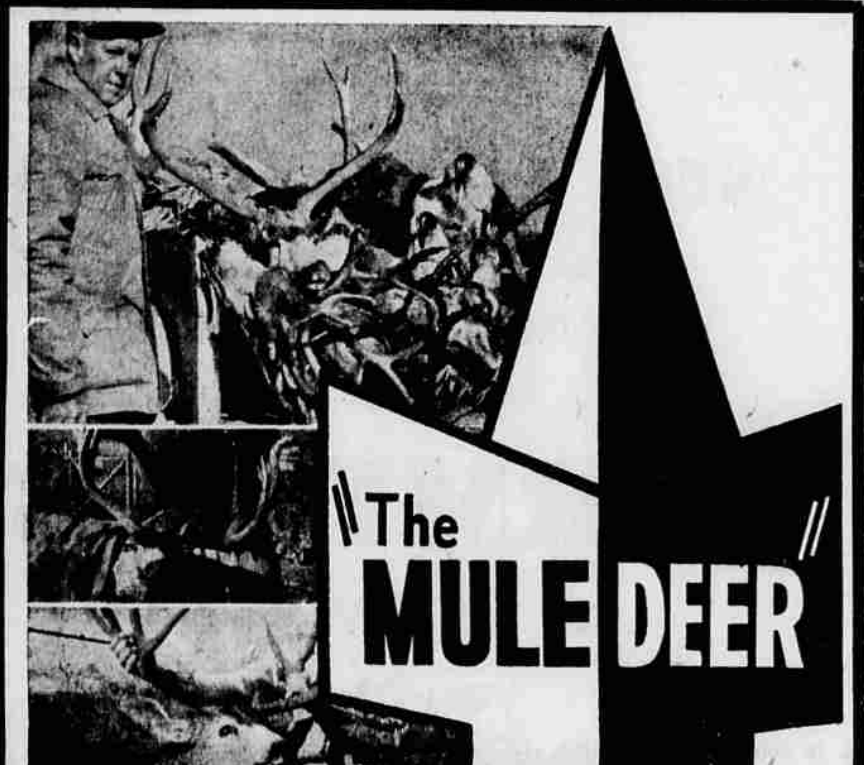

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167 Kings-X Games Face Big Leaguers
NEW YORK (UP) — American and National League teams will play each other in a total of 167 exhibition games during spring training, which officially opens less than four weeks from today. American League teams will play a total of 221 exhibition games and National League teams will play 217, it has been announced. Two traditional spring rivalries will be missing this year — one between the Dodgers and Yankees and the other between the White Sox and Cubs. Instead of the Dodgers, the Philadelphia Phillies will wind up as the Yankees' home-and-home rivals on the last day of the exhibition season. The San Francisco Giants, who will continue to train at Phoenix, Ariz., also will continue their spring series with the Cleveland Indians. The Los Angeles Dodgers also are remaining at Vero Beach, Fla., for this year's training chores. Players may not be ordered to report for spring training until Feb. 28, but any of them wishing to report earlier may do so. As a result, the Phillies will be the first team to start gathering when their first contingent reports at Clearwater, Fla., next Friday.

Ryff Vies In Video Ring Tiff

The strange story of the career of Frankie Ryff, lightweight boxer, continues Monday when he faces Tony de Cola, another New Yorker, at St. Nicholas Arena in New York in a 10-rounder. Ryff, always susceptible to cuts around the eyes, won 20 of his first 21 fights and was high ranked in the division before he was knocked out by Larry Boardman. When eye cuts contributed to later technical knockouts by Kenny Lane and Gene Butler, Ryff appeared to be finished. Manager Charlie Black arranged for a plastic surgeon to do a job on Frankie's face during an eight-month layoff. In two winning fights against Frank Ippolito and Kid Centella, Ryff hasn't been cut. De Cola, who will have a nine-pound weight pull, is his third "comeback" opponent. Within a year, Ryff expects to be fighting for the title.

Ralph Dupas invades the welterweight ranks for a Wednesday bout at Norfolk, Va., with Gaspar Ortega, the Mexican who recently was eliminated from the welter title tournament by Isaac Logart. Although Dupas still has his eye on a lightweight match with champion Joe Brown, the New Orleans boxer also is staking out a claim among the welters. He holds a decision over Vince Martinez, one of the three survivors in the tournament to crown a successor to Carmen Basilio. This is the fourth year the Wednesday night fights (ABC-TV) have participated in the March of Dimes drive in Norfolk.

Paolo Rosi of New York and Italy and Joey Lopes of Sacramento, Calif., both ranked among the top 10 lightweights, meet Friday at Syracuse, N.Y. Rosi defeated Lopes in 1956 and was unbeaten in four starts last year. He outpointed Johnny Busso Jan. 3 in his first appearance of 1958. Lopes was an 11th round TKO victim of Brown in a December title match at Chicago. However, he outpointed Jimmy Carter, the former champ, Jan. 14. Rosi probably will be a solid favorite in the bout to be carried on network (NBC) radio 4-1 TV.

Floyd Patterson boxes a three-round exhibition Tuesday at Houston where promoters hope to arrange for the world heavyweight champion to make a 1958 defense against Roy Harris of Cut and a Shoot, Tex. Pat McMurtry, the Tacoma, Wash. heavyweight who has lost only one fight in his career, takes on Willi Besmanoff of Germany on Tuesday at Seattle.

Downey, Lindsay Whip Golf 'Jinx'
HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (UP)—The defending champions' "jinx" in the Hollywood Women's Amateur Four-Ball golf tournament was buried today under the congratulations received by veterans Mary Ann Downey of Baltimore and Marge Lindsay of Decatur, Ill. The pair beat the cold winds, descending darkness and the formidable team of Marlene Stewart Street of Toronto, Ont., and Anne Casey Johnson in a tense 36-hole match Sunday. In the 13 years of the tournament, it was the first time the defending champions had repeated and the first time the 36-hole finals went into a "sudden death" playoff. On two other playoff occasions, the extra holes were played the next day.

The poll's third-place team, however, was upended for the second time this season. The upset came when North Bend, No. 5, tripped third-place South Eugene, 49-38.

Only four other teams in the Top 10 played Saturday night. Three of them won. Marshfield, ranked sixth, pushed its season record to 12-2 by edging Springfield, 49-45. Seventh-placed Pendleton was pressed throughout the game, but emerged with a narrow 51-46 triumph over Hermiston, tied for 10th place in the poll. The other team that saw action Saturday night was eighth-place Astoria, and the Fishermen swept past Gresham with ease, 70-35.

Out Of Doors

Entries in America's most important dog show, which is holding its 82nd renewal this year, are set at 2,500 due to space. How is the cut-off point determined? The last entries accepted are those in the mail in which the 2,500th entry arrives, so the total number in the show, which will be held at Madison Square Garden, February 10-11, is 2,573. There will be 107 breeds and varieties topped by poodles with 189, dachshunds with 148, collies with 114 and boxers with 109.

Among the less often seen breeds will be the Old English Mastiffs, Bouviers de Flanders, Clumber spaniels, Scottish deerhounds and Australian silkies. Excepting puppies, all dogs have won a blue ribbon in an American Kennel Club show. It is not surprising, therefore, that a best-of-breed victory at the Garden has considerable significance and a best-in-show places the winner at the very pinnacle. Of late years, the Westminster Kennel Club has come to recognize the tremendous interest of its attending audiences in the sporting dog exhibitions. Though working under artificial circumstances, retrievers and spaniels retrieve marked balls and work to hand and whistle signals to locate and retrieve planted birds.

Of late, we have seen black and yellow Labradors, Chesapeake Bay retrievers, golden retrievers, springer and cocker spaniels demonstrate the activities for which they were bred and trained, in these demonstrations. If the dog is undependable, the carrier usually ends up that way, anyhow. If these operators wish to challenge the mailman's courage, why not after hours when he has his hands empty and his sack off his back?

Real and responsible dog lovers will back the postmaster to the limit.
