Fire Tragedy Claims Two

A Klamath Falls woman, Mrs. Edwin Snider, 438 Washington, was recently called to Miami, Oklahoma, when tragedy struck the home of her daughter, Mrs. Harold Tunnell.

Fire swept the Tunnell home and claimed the lives of two of Mrs. Snider's grandchildren, Greg, 15 months, and Mark, 8.

Mrs. Snider said Mark died 10 hours after he had saved two of the other three children. A third child, Jerry, 16, was seriously burned in his efforts to rescue the younger children, and remains in serious condition.

The tragic trip was brightened by the fact Mrs. Snider managed to visit a sister and two brothers in Illinois whom she had not seen in 12 years.

Union Vice Speech Topic

"Thugs and gangsters depend on the closed shop for their existence," Joe Mercer told members of the Toastmasters recently while winning the semi-final round in the club's speech contest.

"There are ways that these hoodlums can be rooted out," Mercer said, citing six possible solutions to the problem.

"The first," Mercer said, "is that no man be required to join a union, abolishing the check-off system." The check-off system is an agreement between the employer and the union, in which the employer agrees to send in the employee's union dues to the union, deducting it from the worker's paycheck.

Mercer continued, "The second is to keep the unions out of politics. The next suggestions are to abolish the closed shop, allow no union member to handle or administer health or welfare funds, require unions to pay tax and require an audit of union books."

He added that "The right to work in our country is just as sacred as the right to vote or the right to jury trial."

"I don't believe," he concluded, "any organization should be vested with the right and the power to say to you, 'You shall not work unless you belong to my organization.'"

Whether or not to request bond issues as a means of financing school construction in the immediate future appears to be one of the major issues which will be wrestled with by the city school budget boards during the budget hearings which began Monday evening.

Ed Robinson, budget member of the board, said he would be opposed to the bonding programs even if it means that the school district has to request a serial levy far in excess of the current \$120,000 yearly to meet the school construction needs. It was Robinson's contention that the bonding measures cost too much in the long run.

LAKEVIEW — The annual meeting of the Lakeview Soil Conservation District has been set for February 5 at 1:30 p.m. in the Memorial Hall of the courthouse in Lakeview.

Speakers will be Bill Anderson, range specialist from Pendleton, who will talk on "Grasses and Grass Management," and Ray Johnson, woodland specialist from Bend, whose talk will be on "Farm Forestry and Christmas Trees."

Accomplishments of the district during 1957 were outlined in the annual report as follows: Coordinated with State Highway Department in planning a new bridge across Thomas Creek on Lakeview Highway; technicians worked with 129 district operators and 35 other farmers in conservation crop rotations, fertilization, improved water application, brush control, pasture planting and many other conservation practices.

The district also prepared application for watershed feasibility study, initiated a project to set aside Crane Creek for fishing by children under 12 and acquired a 1951 dump truck for use by co-operators within the district. The treasurer's report shows the trust fund to have amounted to \$246.
