

Jays Beaten; Grant Holds

Kansas Dumped By 'Cats

Wilt Chamberlain? Who he? The big guy in major college basketball today is Bob Boozer, a 6-8 junior who did a virtual one-man wrecking job on Kansas and The Stilt in Kansas State's big bid for a crack at the national title.

Boozer scored 32 points and carried the Wildcats in the clutch for a 79-75 double overtime victory at Kansas last night. Chamberlain was held to 25 points.

Now 15-1 Kansas State is ranked No. 4 again in today's Associated Press poll, based on games through last Saturday. West Virginia (15-1), Kansas (12-3) and Cincinnati (15-2) retained the top three spots.

The two midland powers were the only top 10 teams active last night.

Boozer, who played only a few minutes because of an upset stomach when Kansas defeated K-State 79-65 for the Big Eight Tournament title at Christmas time, was a whirlwind. He counted 14 of the Wildcats' 29 field goals and after they had blown a 13-point half-time lead, scored the basket that tied it 60-all at end of regulation play.

It was Boozer, again, whose field goal brought K-State from behind for a 65-63 deadlock at the end of the first overtime.

Then he hit two field goals before fouling out that gave the Wildcats the lead for keeps in the second five-minute session.

Chamberlain, who had a 32.4 average, fell from second to third in the scoring race at 31.8. Seattle's Elgin Baylor still tops with 32.43, while Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson took over as the runner-up at 32.35. Neither Baylor nor Robertson played last night.

Minnesota junked its losing streak at six with a 69-66 victory over Indiana. George Kline hauled the last-place Gophers from behind with five points in the last 2½ minutes.

Purdue scored on 26 of 29 free throw chances and came from eight points back for an 84-72 victory over Northwestern. Ohio State defeated Illinois 78-70.

Arkansas retained the Southwest Conference lead with a 56-46 victory at Texas Christian.

Oklahoma replaced Kansas in second place in the Big Eight, with a 68-53 breeze against Colorado. St. Louis hung on in the Missouri Valley, shooting 48 percent from the field for a 90-67 decision at North Texas State.

Duke, which upset West Virginia a week ago, won its fifth straight and gained third place in the Atlantic Coast Conference with a 61-49 victory over South Carolina.

There was only one change among the top 10 in today's AP poll. After K-State, it's San Francisco, Oklahoma State, North Carolina, Maryland, North Carolina State and Temple, with the Owls moving up while Kentucky dropped to 12th, behind Bradley.

PORTLAND (UP) — Two more giant outside basketball stars will be performing for the University of Portland next season.

They are Tony Buhowski, 6-10 transfer from Duke University who began attending classes Monday and Bjarne Jensen, 6-9 former Portland high school star who is transferring from the University of Oregon.

Buhowski enrolled Monday and started attending classes. Jensen announced plans to register.

Both will be eligible for the 1958-59 season. Jensen dropped out of Oregon, reporting financial difficulties.

Buhowski starred on the Duke freshman team two years ago and played on the Duke varsity last season. Before that he was a New Jersey all-star while playing for Roselle Park, near Newark.

Jensen was one of the highest scorers in Portland league history while playing at Franklin High School.

Owls, Pelicans Face Vital League Games

Oregon Tech's Owls seek to take an undisputed lead in the Oregon Collegiate Conference race this week while the Klamath Union High School Pelicans await a trip to Medford in a Southern Oregon Conference District 6-A-1 series Friday and Saturday.

Coach Wally Palmberg's Owls face a three-game week starting with a crucial tie Wednesday evening on their home floor with the Southern Oregon College Red Raiders. The Owls and Raiders are currently tied for the top spot.

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Pelicans Second In Voting

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Undeclared Grant High School of Portland held onto top spot in the weekly Associated Press Oregon high school basketball poll. Two teams, though, fell from the top 10.

It was the second straight week Grant was atop the standings, and once again Klamath Falls was not far behind.

Grant got first-place votes from eight of the 15 sports writers and broadcasters voting. Klamath Falls had four votes for top spot, and North Salem three.

North Salem wound up as No. 3, South Eugene down a notch to No. 4.

Grant chalked up two more victories last week. Klamath Falls was idle. North Salem scored one win, and South Eugene split a pair.

After these four teams at the top of this week's poll came North Bend, Astoria, Springfield, Marshfield, Pendleton and Roosevelt of Portland.

It was the first appearance in the top 10 for Springfield, the No. 7 team, which has a 9-6 record. Roosevelt, after a week's absence, climbed back into the top 10, although just barely.

The two teams dropping out were Jefferson, which suffered a loss to Roosevelt last week, and Hermiston, which was downed by Pendleton.

In three of the top 10 teams will be in action Tuesday. Grant will play Jefferson and Roosevelt will face Lincoln in the Portland League. In the other game Milwaukee will challenge North Salem.

The St. Louis Cardinals, perennial leaders in the "salary league," now have 38 players under contract for the 1958 campaign.

Outfielder Wally Moon came to terms Monday night, leaving only catcher Hobie Landrith unsigned. The Boston Red Sox, meanwhile, received signed contracts from outfielder Jim Piersall and southpaw pitcher Frank Baumann. Piersall led the Sox in runs scored (103) and stolen bases (14) last season, while Baumann, a former bonus baby, was recalled from Oklahoma City late in the season.

The Yankees signed their 12th player, infielder Jerry Lumpe, while Joe DeMaestri, the American League's top defensive shortstop last year, came to terms with the Kansas City Athletics.

Athletic Director Rex Hunsaker told Owl Hoot members the school has been approached by several outstanding junior college athletes who will be enrolling at the Mile High Campus later this year and next fall in time to help the OTI athletic program.

Hunsaker also informed the group the Owls have completed their nine-game football schedule for 1958, including three games against service teams boasting former college and pro stars.
