Dr. James Miller, Portland, director and lecturer for the Good Citizenship Foundation, will fill the pulpit of the First Presbyterian Church here at the morning worship hour on Sunday, February 9. He will be in Klamath Falls en route to a conference on youth problems at the invitation of Gov. Goodwin J. Knight of California to be held in Sacramento.

Dr. Miller, regarded as an outstanding speaker, has had wide experience with youths, adults and community organizations in the field of parental guidance, parent responsibility, citizen responsibility and world responsibility.

During the last year he has lectured throughout the United States and Canada before numerous university and college groups, conventions of civic groups and high school assemblies.

He received his education at Cambridge and Oxford in England as well as at Colorado State University, Denver University and the University of Chicago in this country. He has furthered the international contacts of his student days by visits to 10 European countries and to the Orient.

He is a member of the overall committee and the executive committee of the Oregon Governor's State Committee on Children and Youth. He was a delegate to the mid-century White House conference on children and youth and in 1953 was delegate to the 100th Centennial Convention in Paris.
