Soviets Air Rocket Failure

LONDON (AP)—The Soviet government lost no time today passing the word at home and abroad that another American attempt to send up a satellite had failed. Moscow radio broadcast a Tass dispatch in its home and foreign services just 37 minutes after the news hit the wires in the United States. Tass quoted an American news agency and made no comment. The broadcast said the attempt was made with a Vanguard rocket and "the Defense Department announced that the rocket blew up in flight, shortly after it was launched."

Pro-Western Arab Nations Blast Baghdad Pact Meet

Once staunch Arab friends of the United States have bitterly denounced the recent Baghdad Pact meeting in Ankara, Turkey, as a victory for communism. The Beirut, Lebanon, newspaper An Nahas, published and edited by a Harvard-educated Arab noted for his pro-American leanings, suggests the meeting's results leave the Arabs no choice but to embrace the "positive neutrality" preached by President Nasser of Egypt. Another strongly pro-Western and pro-American paper in Beirut, the French-language L'Orient, says that Arabs, viewing the results of the Ankara meeting, now must face the West with this choice: "Solve the Palestine question, or the Arabs will go Communist."

stopping communism seems to have embittered even more than before those Arabs who considered themselves pro-Western and Friends of the United States. Among these is Ghassan Tuani, the publisher of An Nahas. A Christian Arab, he has been vice president of the Lebanese Chamber of Deputies and a prospective foreign minister. He supports the policy of the incumbent in the Foreign Ministry, pro-Western Charles Malik. Commenting on the Ankara meeting, his paper said editorially: "What has the Baghdad Pact done in Ankara? It established a combined military planning staff—as if communism has been penetrating and is continuing to penetrate the Middle East successfully by military operations, and as if the Soviet Union is an intention of invading or even has the plan of invading the Middle East in the near future."

Mouse Control

DAMAGE
Damage in Klamath County can be conservatively estimated at around two million dollars in 1957. Damage is continuing in alfalfa, clover, and pastures throughout the winter months. Several thousand acres of alfalfa were damaged so badly that it was necessary to plow it up last fall. When winter passes, there will be considerable evidence of additional damage to alfalfa and clover, as well as meadows, due to their winter residence. Amount of winter damage perhaps will be greater than the damage observed last fall. In addition to crop damage, much loss has been caused in burrowing into irrigation ditch banks, which may cause water breaks next year. It is hoped that the 1957 damage was the major effort of the microtus, but it is no surety as yet that this is the case.

Planes Hit; Flyers Okay

CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP)—An F86 jet fighter and a B47 bomber smashed together in flight above the Savannah River basin before dawn today. The fighter pilot parachuted to safety. The damaged bomber limped into Hunter Air Force Base at Savannah, Ga., with all hands safe. Lt. Clarence A. Stewart, the fighter pilot, floated to earth by parachute in bright moonlight near Estill, S.C. His plane struck in a frosty cornfield 10 miles east of Savannah, Ga., about 10 miles south of Stewart's Landing Point, and burned.

The three members of the bomber crew, based at Homestead, Fla., AFB, were reported "shaken up" but uninjured. The Hunter public information officer said the bomber made a normal landing despite a ripped-open tail. The crew, commanded by Maj. Howard Richardson of Homestead, was given routine hospital examinations, then went to sleep.

U.S., Koreans Sign Trade Pact

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—South Korea and the United States today signed a 50-million-dollar agreement for shipments of surplus American food grains to Korea.

Korea will take 765,000 tons of wheat and other grains during the current fiscal year. The Korean government will sell the grain locally and use about 41 million dollars of the proceeds for military expenditures. Most of the rest will pay for U.S. government expenses in Korea.
