Findings Of Recent Study On Common Cold Related

NEW YORK (UP)—After the temperature changes suddenly, people are more likely to catch colds than at other times. And people who live in close quarters with children are more likely to catch colds than people who don't.

Both these statements were more or less proved in one of the most thorough efforts to date to find out how the germs of the common cold and of similar respiratory infections get about and why some people are more susceptible to them than others.

It was shown again that we acquire some kind of immunity to the common cold as we progress from babyhood into adulthood. But it is an extremely tricky, unreliable immunity. For example, the demonstrable immunity bestowed by just one cold hardly lasts any time at all.

Yet, the new study found, children under five—who have never been out in the world, really, to pick up all kinds of germs—are the most susceptible to the common cold and similar germs. Children over five—those who are going to school and acquiring immunities by acquiring and conquering germs—are less susceptible and become even less as they age. Adults are the least susceptible.

The new study was somewhat similar to the classic one conducted in Cleveland some five years ago, in that family units were studied rather than individuals as individuals. After all, the family is the unit of intimacy—and intimacy helps all germs to get around. But the Cleveland study was of definitely sizeable class people, who lived in sizeable houses set apart in sizeable grounds.

The new one was made in a "working class" district of London where apartments range all the way from the rather spacious to the "inadequate," meaning too many people living in too few rooms. The "unit" studied was in every case, a father and mother plus three children, one of whom was under five. The units were watched by the scientists for two years. Every two weeks throat and nose swabs were taken of every individual in every unit and, of course, the appearance of a cold or a respiratory infection of any kind was a scientific five-alarm.

The scientific team was headed by Dr. F. S. W. Brimblecombe who has an international reputation in this public health field—epidemiology. At all times there were 45 to 50 family units under study and the idea was to find out who introduced the cold into the family group, who in the group was most likely to catch it once it was introduced and what living conditions encouraged its spread within the group.

Only over-crowding was definitely pinned down as a condition which helped the germs to spread. There was some indication that the young children who were poorly clad were more susceptible than the children who weren't, but that wasn't a definite conclusion.

"We both hope everyone will be as happy as we are," she said. "The baldish millionaire singer and Miss Grant were wed in a surprise ceremony last Oct. 24 in Las Vegas, Nev., after going together for about two years."

Crosby's first wife, Dixie Lee, died Nov. 1, 1952. They had four sons, Gary, Lindsay, Dennis and Philip, during 22 years of marriage.

Informed Wednesday night by United Press that he was to become an uncle again, brother Bob Crosby said:

"I'm delighted to hear about it and the whole family will be. I know it will mean a great deal to Bing's happiness."

Miss Grant said whether or not she would continue her career was up to Bing. He replied that she could do anything she wanted to do.

Just Wednesday the actress, now under contract to Columbia Studios, enrolled at Los Angeles City College for courses in sociology and psychology.

Miss Grant, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Every Grandstaff of West Columbia, Tex., was born in Houston, Tex., and attended the University of Texas.

Cold Weather In Florida Cuts Tourist Price Rates

MIAMI, Fla. (UP)—Plush vacations in Florida dropped within range of the average tourist this winter as resort hotel operators scraped for business made scarce by bad weather.

Three freezes, wind storms and torrential rains added up to the worst season for tourists within recollection of the Miami Weather Bureau. Business was off 20 per cent.

The bottom was reached yesterday when the mercury plunged to 28.

Swank hotels which formerly charged \$53 a day per room and turned away takers have offered rates of \$11 to \$15 per person, sometimes including breakfast and dinner.

Hotels placed ads in Northern newspapers offering the rate low prices, with extras. One promised that the hotel would pay for the wife's round trip by airplane if a couple would make a reservation for 10 days longer.

The weather, which brings Florida a billion dollar a year tourist business, is blamed almost exclusively for the slowdown. Few think the national business slump has very much to do with it. Some, however, think the opening of swank gambling clubs in Havana, Cuba, only 200 miles south of here, are partly responsible.

The most recent blow from the weather came early this week when temperatures dropped below freezing virtually throughout the Florida resort areas.

But by yesterday afternoon the sun was burning away the cold and wary sunbathers were trickling back to the water.

Soviets Tell H-Power Gain

MOSCOW (UP)—The Soviet Union's top atomic scientist said today Soviet work toward harnessing the H-bomb to give electric power is "very close to the achievements recently reported in England."

But like his counterparts in the West, Igor V. Kurchatov added: "A number of years of intensive research by scientists of all countries will still be needed to obtain the knowledge required for the design of an industrial (thermo) nuclear reaction."

Britain and the United States announced Jan. 24 that their scientists had achieved what were believed to be brief test fusion reactions in gas-filled, electrified tubes.

Kurchatov, director of the Atomic Energy Institute of the Soviet Academy of Sciences, said Soviet physicists will report on their work in the fusion field at the second International Conference on Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy. The meeting will be held in Geneva next September.

The scientist gave no details on Soviet work beyond saying that it was following "basic ideas laid out in 1950 by Soviet Academicians A. D. Sakharov and I. E. Tamm" and that it was developing "in several directions."

Kurchatov asserted that the Soviet Union conceived the idea of international cooperation in the use of nuclear and thermonuclear energy for peaceful purposes. Commenting on President Eisenhower's call for international cooperation in this field, Kurchatov said he was happy to have American support.

French Admit Halting Ship

PARIS (UP)—France today admitted her warships halted a Polish merchant ship in the Atlantic and searched her for arms bound for the Algerian rebels. However, the ship carried no arms.

A government spokesman declared that France is exercising a "right of legitimate defense" in halting any ship suspected of carrying arms to the rebels.

This in effect rejected a protest made by Poland over the halting of the 10,000-ton freighter Wisla three days ago as she sailed between Gibraltar and Casablanca. Stanislaw Gajewski, Polish ambassador in Paris, called at the Foreign Ministry and claimed that the French had "violated the freedom of the seas."

After inspecting the Wisla, the French naval units let her continue.

The Polish merchantman was the second Communist ship the French are known to have stopped in less than a month. On Jan. 18, navy units stopped the Casablanca bound 5,000-ton Yugoslav freighter Slovenika off the Algerian coast. She was forced into the port of Oran, where 150 tons of arms and ammunition were confiscated.

Man Takes Hard Way Into House

ALTMORE, Northern Ireland (UP)—Harry McVeigh, 44, locked himself out of his new house yesterday.

Unwilling to break a window or force a door, he got a ladder, climbed to the roof and started down a chimney.

Some 13 hours and many plaintive calls for help later, McVeigh attracted the attention of a passing hiker. Rescuers hauled him out at the end of a rope, sooty but unharmed.

Then they helped him force a door.
