

Norris, TV Company Test Pay-As-You-See

NEW YORK (AP)—A hint of things to come can be seen in the new agreement between Jim Norris, president of Madison Square Garden, and the International Telemeter Corp. for experimental pay-as-you-see TV.

At the present, this is strictly an experiment. A group of men in a Chicago hotel room will watch a fight from the Midwest Gym in Chicago on Tuesday night. The Telemeter or coin-in-the-slot system will be used.

The agreement between Norris and the TV system is supposed to cover "important programs not now shown on free TV such as amateur basketball games, ice shows, the circus and others" according to the announcement.

Norris stated the experiments would not interfere in any manner with the regularly scheduled Wednesday and Friday fights seen on free home television.

But Champion, publicity director for Paramount Pictures of which Telemeter is a subsidiary, said a "sample town," probably in the Midwest, would be set up "very soon, perhaps by June" to test the system. Movies and local sports programs would be used, he said.

Champion said the system transmitted its pictures by wire and claimed approval by the Federal Communications Commission was not necessary. The FCC and Congress currently are considering the entire pay-as-you-see TV field.

"It probably will cost about \$100 a home to install the system," said Champion.

"It would work something like this," said Champion. "You would turn a knob to some channel not used by regular TV. You would see a trailer of coming attractions. If you wanted to see the fight at 10 o'clock, then you'd put a dollar or whatever the price called for into the slot, of the box attached to your set."

Upsets Rip Prep Cage Play

Grant of Portland hammered Madison 89-45 Friday night to protect its No. 1 ranking in the Associated Press poll of Oregon prep basketball teams.

The No. 2 team, Klamath Falls, also triumphed Friday, clipping Medford 59-54 behind the 28-point torrent of Glenn Moore.

An upset occurred Friday as seventh-ranked Springfield, behind the 21 points of Wally Knecht, dropped No. 4 South Eugene, 51-42.

South Eugene had a cool .171 shooting percentage from the field.

In still another upset, Roseburg upended eighth-ranked Marshfield, 47-40.

No. 5 North Bend drove away from a 26-25 halftime tie to submerge unranked Cottage Grove, 60-47.

The poll's 10th place team also was upset Friday. Unranked Franklin romped to its sixth consecutive triumph with an easy 72-54 victory over No. 10 Rosevelt in a Portland League clash.

The No. 9 team, Pendleton, barely edged Baker 49-48 Friday.

Pendleton got its victory when field goals by Bob Brande and Herman Mize brought the Buckaroos behind in the game's last minute.

Another upset almost was forged when Lebanon dropped a close 35-31 game to third-ranked North Salem. Lebanon used ball-control tactics and outscored North Salem 12-4 in the final quarter.

Sixth-ranked Astoria, however, had little trouble in pounding Beaverton, 55-36. The Fishermen were led by Gordon Scott's 15 points.

Lopes Wins First TV Bout

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP)—Joey Lopes was a happy little boxer today, not necessarily on the basis of his 10-round performance against Cuba's Damaso Collazo Friday night, but because he scored his first television triumph.

"It was the happiest moment of my life," the lightweight said after scoring a unanimous decision over Collazo.

"That was my eighth television bout and it was the first I ever won."

The 5-foot 5 slinger said he was hopeful a match could be arranged in March with Paolo Rossi, ex-Italian lightweight champion, who was to have been Lopes' opponent Friday night. Rossi was scratched because of an injury.

The defeat was the first in the last 16 outings for the Cuban. He has a record of 42 victories, 10 defeats and two draws. Lopes' record stands at 43-14-3.

The smallest fight crowd in the War Memorial's history, 784, paid \$1.376 to watch the dull affair.

Judge Harold McGrath scored it 6-3-1. Judge Dick Albino saw it 7-3 for the Sacramento, Calif., resident. Referee Joe Palmer scored it 6-2-2 and The Associated Press had Lopes winning, 8-1-1.

Baylor, SU Top Gonzaga

SEATTLE (AP)—Elgin Baylor and the fast breaking offense of Seattle University were too much again Friday night for Gonzaga of Spokane and the Chieftains hung an 83-67 defeat on the visitors.

The game was featured by the 42-point performance by Baylor, which ran his season total to 561 points in 17 games, and the fine ball handling by Gonzaga's 7-foot 4-inch Jean Claude Lefebvre, who accounted for 26 points.

Seattle started fast for a quick lead, holding an intermission margin of 39-33. It picked up on its shooting and rebounds in the second half and won going away.

Lefebvre, an import from Paris, France, started on defense, breaking up many a well-set Seattle play. No one could stop Baylor, however, as he contributed 10 points from the foul line, 32 from the field and picked off 19 rebounds.

George Maderos Gets Chico Post

CHICO, Calif. (AP)—At 24, Chico State's George Maderos is one of the nation's youngest four-year college football coaches.

Maderos, former San Francisco 49er star, was named head coach at Chico Friday, succeeding Gus Manolis, who died ten days ago following a heart attack.

Maderos had been serving as Manolis' assistant.

Aussie Sets Record

ADELAIDE (AP)—John Bradman, 15-year-old son of former Australian cricket captain Sir Donald Bradman, set an Australian record Saturday of 14.6 seconds for the 120 yard six hurdles. John recently spent six months in a hospital with polio.

Speedway Highlights

As most of you know April 30 signifies the opening of the Indianapolis Speedway—where both men and machine are tested for skill and stamina as the Memorial Day classic is run over the oval shaped track for a grueling distance of 500 miles.

Although not quite so famous as the classic of the brickyard, the Klamath Speedway also gets into action on the same day with the beginning of the 1958 hardtop racing season.

The Klamath Speedway, under the operation of the Klamath Racing Association, is a one-quarter mile, oval shaped, hard clay track. It is kept in shape by the members of the Klamath Racing Association which consists of the drivers and mechanics of the hardtops.

Since there are a lot of teenagers around town who are interested in hardtops and are particularly interested in driving and maintaining a racing machine, a new organization has been formed to instruct these young racing enthusiasts in just the thing they want to learn.

The teen-age organization is known as the Klamath Junior Racing Association which is patented after the Klamath Racing Association. The teen-agers will build their own cars and maintain them. Racing will be scheduled among the members on the same days as the regular hardtop races.

The Klamath Junior Racing Association has a meeting every two weeks which is presided over by Dave Blevins. Buff Rannels, president of the parent organization, is helping to get the club established.

Cars are limited to the makes between 1932 and 1948. The engine and running gear must also be between these years. The engine must be under 250 cubic inches in displacement and use the stock intake manifold and ignition with the method of exhaust being optional.

For safety, the bodies must be free of all upholstery and reinforced with pipe supports at least two inches in diameter. Two roll bars as well as a seat belt and shoulder harness are required.

Werner Bids For Alpine Title Sunday

BADGASTEIN, Austria (AP)—Freckle-faced Buddy Werner, considered among the world's best in the downhill, bids Sunday to become the first American male to win a championship race in the history of world Alpine ski competition.

Fourth in the slalom and fifth in the giant slalom, the first two of the three-event championships, Werner is considered the top challenger in the downhill to Austria's Tony Sailer, the world's greatest skier.

A record 60,000 persons are expected to watch the closing event of the 10-day competition matching the best racers from 24 nations.

Werner, from Steamboat Springs, Colo., will have two objectives in the downhill. First, of course, is to win that event itself, a blazing speed test over a 11,490-foot course that covers a drop of 3,001 feet. Second, is to try to win decisively enough to capitalize on his thin chance of parlaying the victory into the combination title, awarded to the skier who has the best overall record in all three events.

Neither will be easy and Sailer is the main obstacle to both of Werner's objectives. The handsome Tyrolean is rated No. 1 among downhill skiers. And with his victory in the giant slalom and close second in the slalom, Sailer has a clear lead in the combination competition.

Entering the race, Werner is fourth in the combined standings, behind Sailer, Austria's Josl Rieder (winner of the slalom), and former Dartmouth student Chick Igaya of Japan.

UCLA Victor, Bears Bow; OS Clubs UO

UCLA stood alone at the top of the Pacific Coast Conference basketball race Saturday after their crosstown rivals from Southern California upended California's Bears in Friday night's action. UCLA and Cal were to meet in a showdown game Saturday night.

Cal tumbled into second place Friday night by dropping a 58-48 decision to Southern California just after UCLA had dumped Washington State, 72-64. These developments left UCLA with a 6-1 record and Cal with a 5-2 mark.

Elsewhere, Washington dropped Idaho, 56-49, and Oregon State belted Oregon, 62-37.

At Los Angeles, UCLA started sluggishly against Washington State and trailed most of the first period. It was 31-31 at the half. In the second period, however, UCLA stepped away quickly and was in front by 10 points after five minutes. Walt Torrance led UCLA scorers with 15 points, but WSC's Kennedy was high man of the game with 17.

In a second game at Los Angeles, Jim White and Monte Gonzales carried most of the scoring load for USC. White, a reserve earlier this season, popped in 17 points and Gonzales scored 16, 10 of them in the second half. Don McIntosh led California with 16.

Cal's deliberate play held the score down, as it has in most of the Bears' games this season. The score at the half was only 23-23. USC leading, and neither team scored a point for nearly three minutes at the start of the second period.

USC's victory moved it into a fourth-place tie with Idaho. Both have 5-3 records.

Oregon State took over third place at Corvallis, running away from Oregon in the second half after a fairly close first period. Ken Nanson and Dave Gambee scored 19 points apiece for OSC.

At Seattle, Washington trailed Idaho 33-37 midway in the second period, but started moving when reserve George Grant got into the act. Grant scored only five points but his defensive work was a key factor in the Washington victory. Idaho's high-scoring Gary Simmons piled up 15 points in the first half, but could add only 4 in the second period. Doug Smart of Washington was high for the game with 20.

Temple's Streak Now At 15

Chances are Harry Litwack's Temple Owls, in the midst of college basketball's longest current winning streak, would like nothing better than another crack at Cincinnati's Bearcats, hotshot Oscar Robertson and all.

It has taken the streak, now standing at 15 after Friday night's 89-53 rout of Seton Hall, for the rating experts to warm up to a Temple team that has this bugaboo in its case history:

Dec. 9, 1957—Temple at Cincinnati. Score—Cincinnati 80, Temple 57.

That whumping from Oscar and Co. is the only serious blot on the Temple record, although two days before the Owls were nipped 85-83 in double overtime at Lexington by Kentucky.

Since then it has been nothing but success for Temple, triggered by Guy Rodgers, a backcourt scorer, rebounder and feeder pro coaches will tell you could become another Bob Cousy.

Rodgers had the 10th-ranked Owls rolling Friday night with 26 points in a limited appearance in one of two games involving members of The Associated Press' top 10. In the other, eighth-ranked Maryland kept in the running for the Atlantic Coast Conference title, defeating Virginia 67-66.

Dartmouth won its sixth straight in Ivy League competition, whipping Cornell 58-43 at a 15-1 record, and the jumbled situation in the Skyline Conference race was eased somewhat when Wyoming thumped Montana, 62-62 and Brigham Young spilled New Mexico 66-53. Montana dropped out of a share of first place, leaving Wyoming and Brigham Young tied with 5-1 records.

The Citadel, only team within shouting distance of West Virginia in the Southern Conference, upped its league mark to 6-2 with a 77-63 decision over VMI. Washington and Lee, with Don Flora scoring 28, celebrated with its first Southern loop victory, 61-55 over Davidson. Army, touring the South, spilled Florida State 71-62, and Texas A&M turned back Baylor 60-51 in a match of Southwest Conference also-rans.

Among the little guys — enrollment-wise—Western Illinois made it 17-0, hitting 51 per cent of its field goal attempts in an 89-57 rout of Central Michigan.

Boston Celts Blast Lakers In 114-88 Tilt

It wouldn't give the Minneapolis Lakers one bit if they never saw the Boston Celtics again.

They have concluded their season series with the defending world champions of professional basketball and the record between the teams today shows:

The Celtics, who now show a 7½ game lead in the Eastern Division of the National Basketball Assn., thus became the first team to sweep a season series since Fort Wayne won all eight of its games against Baltimore during the 1953-54 campaign.

The latest humiliation the Celtics heaped upon the hapless Lakers was a 114-88 decision in Boston Friday night. After breaking a 9-8 tie at the four-minute mark, the Celtics ran away with the game.

Tommy Helms scored 30 points for the winners and was aided no little by Bob Cousy, who tallied 18 before being tossed out for bench-ruling in the final minute. Dick Garmaker had 23 points for the Lakers.

Syracuse defeated the New York Knickerbockers, 105-102 in the other half of the Boston double-header, while in Philadelphia, the Cincinnati Royals snapped a six-game slump with a 103-100 verdict over Philadelphia and the Detroit Pistons triumphed over the St. Louis Hawks, 125-107.

George Yardley, the league's leading scorer, posted in 37 points to lead the Pistons to their victory over the Hawks.

Sooner League Drops Operations

MUSKOGEE, Okla. (AP)—The class D Sooner State Baseball League has suspended its 1958 operations.

The announcement Friday by C. J. Magoto, league vice president, brought to an end the ten-year career of the only class D league west of the Mississippi River and made it the third circuit to call it quits for the coming season.
