

Tucson Open Led By Hebert

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP)—Conservative golf gave Lionel Hebert of Lafayette, La., the championships of the \$15,000 Tucson Open and sent him to the San Antonio Open this week richer by \$2,000.

Playing his shots with caution after taking the lead on the second hole of the final round, the PGA champ came home with a 66 for the par-70, 6,434-yard El Rio layout. He had a 72-hole total of 265, 15 under par.

Putting played a big role in his first medal play win of the PGA circuit. For several weeks before, putting had been troubling him.

Don January, Eastland, Tex., one of the bumper crop of promising youngsters, lost the one-stroke lead he held at the start of the final round when Hebert took a birdie 3 on the first hole. January went two over par on the No. 2 hole. He finished with 69 for the round and a total of 267, 13 under par, for \$1,500 second-place money.

Three bogies didn't rattle big John Barnum, Grand Rapids, Mich. Six birdies, including one on the 18th when his approach was behind a heavy clump of trees, brought him home with 67 and a 72-hole total of 269, good for third-place money of \$1,200.

Jay Hebert, Sanford, Fla., the winner's older brother, birdied five of the last nine holes to finish with 65 and a total of 272. Ken Venturi, San Francisco, winner of the recent Palm Springs, Calif., and Phoenix opens and the pretentious favorite, Dow Finsterwald, Tequesta, Fla., the defending champ, and Stan Leonard, Vancouver, B.C., were also tied at 272. Each earned \$862.50.

Hebert, playing in the three-some ahead of January, took a par for the 450-yard No. 2 hole.

"For three days I hadn't been near a fence," January said afterward. "Then I drove off the second tee and 'wham,' it went into the fields. Right then I got scared. In a few holes it got so I couldn't control the ball."

Werner Fails In Crown Bid

BAD GASTEIN, Austria (UP)—Disappointed Wallace (Bud) Werner of Steamboat Springs, Colo., figured he had "failed" today in the world ski championships, but no one else saw it that way.

The crew-cut, 22-year-old Werner gave it one whole of a try in the downhill race that wound up the championships Sunday until he hit a big bump that knocked him out of contention and resulted in his finishing 36th—on one ski.

Austria's talented Toni Sailer, announcing he would compete in no more races this year and reported to be considering a movie career, made it a memorable finale by winning both the downhill race and the overall "Alpine combined" title.

Sailer averaged a near incredible 53 miles per hour for the two and one-eighth mile course, winding up two and one-tenth seconds ahead of his nearest rival in 2:28.5.

Werner was seven-tenths of a second behind Sailer's pace at the halfway mark but then picked up speed and was about even with the Austrian ace when he reached the last scuss leading to the finish. That's when disaster struck, however.

At the last gate, Werner crossed close to the right hand pole and hit a bump that other competitors had avoided by crossing on the other side. Captivated into the air, the young Coloradoan hit the snow about 15 yards farther down and skidded down the slope another 50 yards, rolling over several times.

"I've never felt so bad in my life," said Werner, who was closed in 2:48.7. "I've failed. It was that darned bump that ruined it all. It threw me into the air like a ski jumper. Usually, I like bumpy courses, but that bump was just too big for me."

Dave Gorsuch of Climax, Colo., finished best among the American entrants. He was in 16th place with a clocking of 2:39.4 while Marvin Melville of Salt Lake City, Utah, wound up 19th in 2:40.9.

Delany Pointing For Mark

NEW YORK (UP)—Ron Delany, speaking in a soft Dublin brogue, admitted today that maybe he'd like to break the world indoor mile record after all.

The Villanova senior came close Saturday night in the 51st annual Millrose Games at Madison Square Garden with a 4:04.6 performance after Burr Grim of Maryland had set a fast pace. Delany, registering his 19th consecutive indoor mile triumph, said he might have smashed the record of 4:03.6 if the pace hadn't been "just too fast."

It was a turnaround for the slender, dark-haired Delany, who had maintained that he was interested only in winning.

"The reason I don't try for the record," he said recently, "is that if the truth be known, I'm just another lazy Irishman."

But Delany, who had ignored the pleadings of the crowds, now felt that "it would be nice if I broke the record because this is my last season in this country and I would like to leave something to remember me by."

Delany's best indoor mile was a 4:03.8 last year in the Chicago Daily News meet. This season, he has run 4:05, 4:08.1, 4:05.3 and 4:04.6. He will wind up the indoor campaign in the New York A.C. meet Saturday night, the national AAU championships Feb. 22, the ICA meet March 1 and the New York Knights of Columbus games March 8, all at Madison Square Garden, and the Chicago Daily News relays March 14.

Jim Grelle of Oregon, a 4:07.1 miler outdoors, makes his indoor debut against Delany in the New York A.C. meet but doesn't figure to be a challenger because of his lack of experience on boards.

What Delany needs for a record attempt, by his own calculation, is a 50-second quarter, a two-minute half and a 3:02 three-quarters.

Rogers Favors Anti-Trust Bill

WASHINGTON (UP)—Attorney General William P. Rogers has expressed a "favorable reaction" to a House anti-trust subcommittee's bill to put the business aspects of pro sports under anti-trust laws.

"We have to study it and there may be some corrections or suggestions we will have to offer," Rogers told Rep. Kenneth B. Keating (R-N.Y.) Sunday on a television program. "But I think the idea, the basic idea, you have is a very good one."

The bill would affect pro football, basketball, baseball and hockey. It has been approved by the anti-trust committee of which Keating is a member and is awaiting action by the parent committee, the House Judiciary Committee.

Kerwin Throwback To Oldtime Boxers

NEW YORK (UP)—Gale Kerwin is a throwback to the old-time boxers — who knew they were good and proved it.

This handsome, brown-haired, baby-faced young man meets an unbeaten Hungarian hammerer in the televised main event at Madison Square Garden on Friday night. His opponent is accordion-playing Stefan Redl.

But Kerwin has convinced all concerned that, at 8 to 5, he is a double-dyed cinch.

"I'm a terrific puncher and I know it," Kerwin smiles angelically. "If I say so myself, I'm pretty good."

This makes Kerwin, the son of a Canadian real estate man, the first pop-off puncher to come down cauliflower canyon in quite some time.

Most of the current pugilistic crop makes apologies for its talent. They seem to figure that modesty is an attribute in a sport built on violence, as if Emily Post

was casting the deciding ballot in a match where the two judges had voted a split.

"I CAN IF..." "I hope I can win, if I'm lucky," the majority of the bobby boys will say with a coy smirk, simpering like debutantes caught bawling in the powder room.

"Me, I'm a great fighter, and it's gonna take a lot of man to whip me," Kerwin says with the confidence of a man hunting mice with an elephant gun.

This puts him in a clouting category along with such as Archie Moore, Max Baer, Tony Galento, Lou Jenkins and Rocky Graziano.

I remember Graziano sitting in his dressing room just before he whipped Tony Zale in a real blood-letting and piping:

"Listen, I want you to get a load of this. I got a guy here who can play 'The Sidewalks of New York' on a mou' organ he blows wit' his nose. Zale? Ah, fr cryin' out loud, I'll murder 'im."

COULD TALK UP Another brot of a boy who had the copyright on "I'll murder da bum" was Two-Ton Tony Galento. The man who was built like a barrel figured he was taller than the Empire State building and twice as tough as King Kong. He belittled Joe Louis so badly before their set to that the Brown Bomber wanted to annihilate him — and did only after an extreme struggle.

Baer touted himself as "the body beautiful" and, if he hadn't tried to convince all of the opposite gender in the world that he was, might have been the most gifted box fighter of all time. Jenkins barred nobody, including Jack Dempsey, while Moore waged a national campaign to get a bout with Marciano in which his most raucous cry was that Marciano was "afraid" to face him.

Gale's claims are rather invisible in view of the fact that he has flattened only six rivals in winning 25 of 31 bouts. Redl, on the other hand, has won all 17 of his pro bouts — after a 130 - bout amateur campaign — and stowed away 13 of his opponents by knockout.

Gale Kerwin and Stefan Redl, two youngsters with big ambitions, top the Friday show at Madison Square Garden. Redl is just back from service. Kerwin, a Canadian who now lives in Valley Stream, N.Y., has captured the fancy of fans in recent bouts with Johnny Busso and Jimmy Archer.

Kerwin, 23, stepped in against Busso on short notice as a sub and dropped a decision in a close fight. In his first Garden main event under his own steam, he whipped Archer Dec. 20.

Redl is unbeaten with a 17-0 record including 13 knockouts.

Joey Giardello, the No. 4 middleweight contender from Philadelphia, keeps busy while he waits for Carmen Basilio and Sugar Ray Robinson to finish their business. Giardello takes on Franz Suzina of Germany in a Wednesday show at the Philadelphia Arena. It's a rematch, in 1956 at Milwaukee. Giardello won a decision over Franz.

California's Bears return home and UCLA journeys into the Pacific Northwest the coming weekend as the two teams seek to defend their first place tie in the Pacific Coast Conference basketball standings.

The deliberate Bears were bounced out of a share in the lead last Friday night then waded right back in the next night as they stalled UCLA's fast-breaking attack 61-58. Friday the Bears lost 58-48 to Southern California.

UCLA battles at Washington State next Friday. Idaho Saturday and Washington on Monday — a schedule that could prove difficult.

Cal rests Friday and then meets Southern California in a return engagement Saturday and traditional rival Stanford next Monday.

Idaho plays at Oregon State Monday night.

Southern California is at Stanford Friday and Oregon is at Washington Saturday.

The ball-controlling Bears grabbed an early lead over UCLA, outplayed them during the first half, moved further ahead in the second half and then squelched a desperation rally in the final minute with one of their own.

Bear scoring honors went to Al Buch with 15. Don McIntosh with 13 and Earl Robinson with 11.

Southern California tripped Washington State 54-49 and Oregon defeated Idaho 62-75 Saturday.

The Idaho loss, second in two nights, dropped the Vandals from third to fifth in the PCC rankings.

Southern California and idle Oregon State moved into a tie for second.

The Trojan-Cougar game, played as the first half of a twin bill with the UCLA-Cal tilt, started as a WSC show. After scoring only one field goal in 8 minutes and 20 seconds and trailing 10-5, the Trojans came alive to jump ahead 23-21 at the half. They remained ahead thereafter.

Oregon's Charlie Franklin, a Los Angeles product, poured in 35 points to lead his mates past the Vandals. After the Ducks trailed 36-33 at the half, the 6-foot-3 Franklin sparked a second half rally that carried the game.

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
