

Youth Hurt In Rocket Blowup

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Michael Newey, 13, was in a Sacramento hospital today because a homemade rocket blew up in his face.

The boy, a junior high school student, and a companion were stuffing match heads into a metal cylinder yesterday when the device exploded and scattered pieces of metal.

Two of young Newey's fingers had to be amputated. He also suffered body cuts. He is the son of Ray C. Newey, Sacramento.

Police said Newey and Robert Langner were loading the rocket in the latter's garage when the explosion occurred. The Langner boy was not hurt, police said.

GI Insurance
Plan Related

An easy-stage method of converting GI term insurance to permanent plans is available to any of the 3,200,000 World War II veterans who cannot afford to convert the full amount of their term policies at one time.

Charles Langdon, manager of the Portland Veterans Administration Regional Office said the law and VA regulations permit these term policyholders to convert as little as \$1,000 the first time, then any amount thereafter they desire, in multiples of \$500.

By converting portions of the total amount, Langdon pointed out, the annual dividends may be used in the process to reduce the cash outlay to the policyholder at the time of the conversion.

The decision to convert is for each policyholder to make, Langdon said, since it is based on his need for permanent and future life insurance, his ability to pay premiums and his family status.

For some veterans, Langdon said, term insurance is preferable. For others, permanent plans are indicated.

Permanent plan policies available to World War II term policyholders who wish to convert under this easy-stage method are ordinary life, 20-pay life, 30-pay life, 20-year endowment, endowment at age 60 and endowment at age 65.

Langdon said there are 31,620 World War II veterans in Oregon holding term policies only, while 19,380 hold some form of permanent GI insurance.

Full information on insurance conversion may be obtained from any VA office, Langdon said.

PROPOSED SALES OF TIMBER

KLAMATH INDIAN RESERVATION, OREGON
Sales of tribally-owned forest lands and other types of property on the Klamath Indian Reservation will be made pursuant to requirements of Public Law 362 of the 80th Congress, amended by Public Law 85-132 of the 85th Congress. The anticipated sales program will provide for sales of the forest property in economic timber units, as the present law unmodified during the second session of the 85th Congress, the sales will start during the late summer of 1958 and altogether will include a total volume of timber that may be as much as three billion (3,000,000,000) board feet of sawtimber and 1,200,000 cords of pulpwood. The law requires that the sales program be completed and payment made to the beneficiaries on or before August 13, 1960. The sawtimber volume is predominantly ponderosa pine, with associated sawtimber species comprising a minor part of the total volume. The pulp volume consists primarily of relatively low grade lodgepole pine. The sawtimber species will be sold in units of various sizes that will be classified either as reserve stand located in areas which have been cut over under a selection type harvest or virgin timber stand on areas which have not been cut over. The sizes of economic timber units will be classified as: 1) small economic timber units will be those between 5,000 and 25,000 acres in size, and 2) large economic units will be those exceeding 25,000 acres in size. The total sawtimber volumes for the economic timber units will range from a low of approximately 50,000 board feet to a high of approximately 300 million board feet. The sales will include both forest land and timber located thereon. The terms of sale will be for cash payable within 90 days from the date of the date of notice of acceptance of bid. Although purchasers will be urged to operate the property purchased on a sustained yield basis, the sales will be made to the highest bidder regardless of the intent for which the purchase is made. The primary requisite of the sales program will be to obtain the highest price possible for the beneficiaries of the program. Further information concerning the sales program, including information on sizes of units, volumes of timber, characters of stands, allowable annual cuts under sustained yield management and rates of growth can be obtained from the Klamath Management Specialists, 139 South 7th Street, Klamath Falls, Oregon. Advertisement of specific economic timber units will be published in the local newspapers.

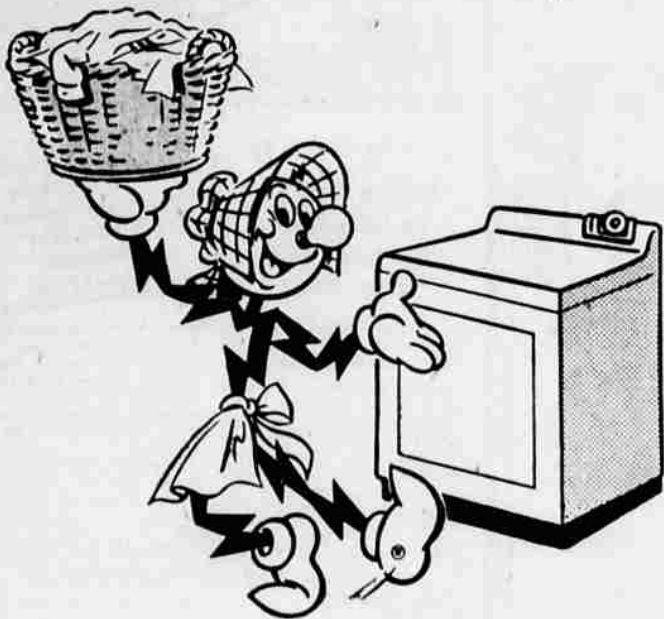
