Lodge Plans Fund Drive

ALTURAS — Northern Rebekah Lodge No. 206 has appointed Mrs. Charles F. Demick to head the organization of the lodge members collecting funds for the Heart Association in Alturas on Heart Sunday, February 23.
Northern Rebekah Lodge will enlist volunteers from the lodge, and others interested in making a door to door canvass for contributions to the Heart Association's local, state and national program of medical research, community service and education.
"Heart trouble touches more families in Modoc County than any other disease," Mrs. Demick said. Of the 83 people who died in Modoc County in 1956, 45 died because of heart disease.
"A contribution to the Heart Association is the way we can join in combating this health problem," Mrs. Demick said. She noted that Odd Fellow and Rebekah lodges throughout the state would be participating in this Heart Sunday collection for the second year.
The Heart Fund has been endorsed by the Grand Lodge of IOOF and Rebekah Assembly of California as "an outstanding public service dedicated to the better health of the American people."
Mrs. Demick, who was appointed at Friday night's meeting of Northern Rebekah Lodge, will work in cooperation with John Ennis of Cedarville, general chairman of Heart Sunday activities.

Weed Police List Action

WEED — The local police department answered a total of 365 calls during the January reporting period compared to 337 during December. The patrol car traveled 403 less miles than the previous period with a total of 2,303 miles.
Traffic citations issued were less by 24 with a count of 19 personal moving tickets, 12 parking and five warning, a total of 31.
Two felony arrests (burglary), and three misdemeanor arrests (petty theft) were made during January. There were no felony arrests in December.
David L. Dawson, Weed police chief, stated the department investigated two vehicle accidents and assisted the California Highway Patrol with one.
