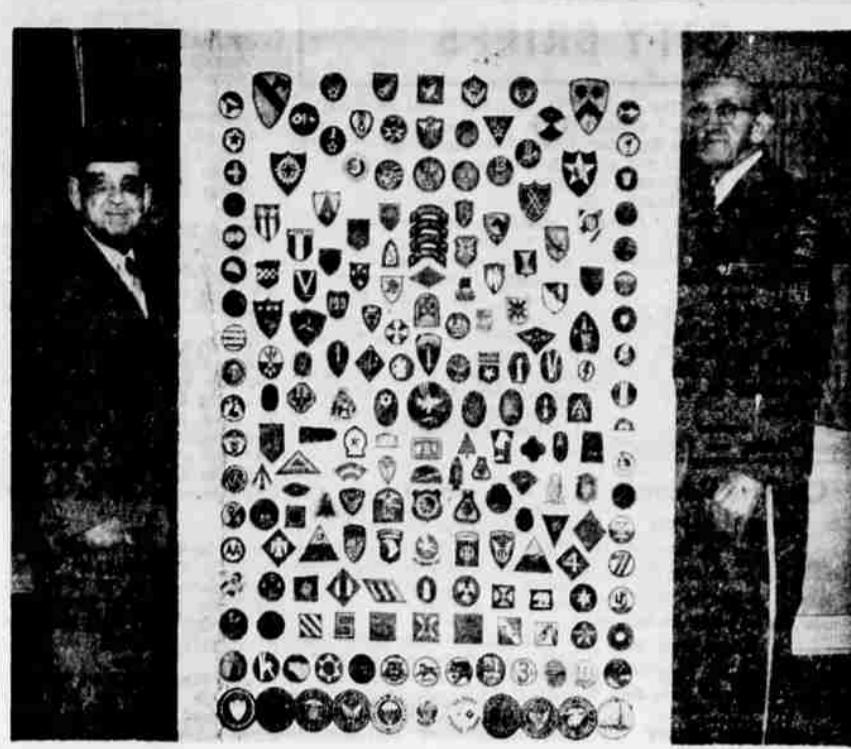


Boy Scouts Hold Campout

Teacher surveys within the city and the county school systems indicate that the majority of the instructors are not in favor of modifying the school year opening date as recently requested by a group of Klamath Falls residents.

County Superintendent of Schools Carrol Howe said Tuesday morning that the survey of county teachers is nearly completed and that the great majority of staff members favor retaining the present schedule whereby school opens the day following Labor Day. More than 200 persons had signed a petition requesting the change.

Hearings Set For Ousted School Students In Gotham

NEW YORK — Students suspended last week from the city's schools as troublemakers will get individual hearings to decide what is to be done with them.

Thirty-two assistant school superintendents will help decide whether each pupil is to be returned to school, sent to a special school for problem children or confined in an institution.

The hearings program was worked out by Mayor Robert F. Wagner and leading school and city officials.

The mayor and Gov. Averell Harriman scheduled a meeting for tomorrow to discuss what assistance the state can offer.

Each student's parents, school principal, teacher or teachers involved in the complaint, representatives of the Attendance Bureau and the Bureau of Child Guidance and a probation officer if one is concerned are to attend the suspension hearings.

Severity of the offense, the student's attitude and the measure of cooperation which the home is able and willing to provide will be important factors in determining whether the pupil goes back to school, a City Hall statement said.

Schools Superintendent William Jansen said the usual five-day limit in which a suspended student is entitled to a hearing will be extended indefinitely in the present crisis.

He said no more children will be suspended at the moment except in serious cases. Academic high schools are excepted, however, he added.

In elementary, junior and vocational high schools 544 students were suspended last Friday. A third of the academic high schools reported about 100 suspensions. Figures for the others were not made available.

Jansen said there will be more suspensions in the academic high schools this week.

The suspensions followed a wave of rape, assault, knifing and vandalism in or near schools. Both white and Negro students were involved.

Beck Denies Funds Trouble

SEATTLE — Dave Beck, former president of the Teamsters Union, last night denied that the union is faced with a financial loss because of the way he managed its funds.

In an interview with the Seattle Post-Intelligencer, Beck said: "The Teamsters are in marvelous financial position, both as to net assets and liquidity. Certainly they can't possibly be in bad shape when they have several million dollars drawing higher interest rates than they would pay for borrowing."

At Miami Beach, Fla., James R. Hoffa, Beck's successor as president of the union, said the executive session of the Teamsters' Executive Board was largely occupied with examining union funds investments.

It was reported that Beck had tied up most of the union's 35-million-dollar assets in long-term mortgages and other investments, but that the union was left with relatively few liquid assets.

Beck estimated the union has "six or seven million dollars" invested at a higher interest rate than it would be required to pay for borrowing.

"The union has a reserve of over a million dollars in cash right now," he said. "There is no immediate need of borrowing and no foreseeable need of borrowing."

"The union had 14 million dollars more in assets when I left office as president last month than when I went in, on Dec. 1, 1952, and 400,000 more members." Membership of the union is 1,400,000.

Roaring Blaze Guts Building

MILWAUKEE — Wind-whipped flames roared through a two-story business building in a South Side shopping district in near-zero weather last night, falling 20 firemen and causing an estimated damage of more than \$400,000.

Fire Chief Edward Wischer said the damage would total "in excess of \$400,000." He said the cause of the spectacular extra-alarm blaze had not been determined.

The fire, watched by an estimated 25,000, raged out of control from about 7 p.m. to about 10 p.m.

Flames, fanned by northwesterly winds, shot 100 feet in the air as 150 ice-clad firemen battled in temperatures ranging from 2 to 3 degrees above zero.

Deputy Chief Clary Ehlers was knocked across the street by an explosion that blasted a wall from the building on the corner of Mitchell and 9th streets, about 1/4 miles from the downtown district. He returned to action after treatment of burns and bruises.

Nineteen other firefighters were treated for smoke inhalation, minor burns, frostbite and bruises. Most of them returned to duty.

No one was reported injured seriously.

The building's first floor was occupied by a jewelry, restaurant, camera shop, barber shop and tavern. A second-floor clinic was operated by four physicians.

Party Finds Crash Victim

ALERT BAY, B. C. — A six-man rescue party climbed 1,500 feet up the side of a mountain Monday to reach the wreckage of a light aircraft which crashed Sunday in fog with two men aboard.

They found one of the two huddled under a shorn-off wing of the aircraft, badly bruised and shaken up but otherwise in good condition. The other was dead in the wreckage.

Dead was K. G. Mainwaring, 37, pilot and owner of the float-equipped Piper Super Cub, Lloyd Helsden, 29, was hospitalized.

Both were employed as mechanics at a woods operation near Alert Bay.

The two were returning from a 50-mile flight to Zebias, on the west coast of the island, when they ran into bad weather Sunday.

The crash occurred about 10 miles from Alert Bay, which is on the northeast coast of Vancouver Island.
