

# DeSpirito Returns To Track

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Tony DeSpirito, a daredevil rider whose list of injuries over the past four years reads like a chapter from Gray's Anatomy, is back in the saddle again.

The 22-year-old Lawrence, Mass., jockey who set an American record of 390 winners in 1952, had his first mount since September at Hialeah Park yesterday. He has mounts in the second and ninth races today.

DeSpirito didn't win on Pong-free in the fourth race but he staged such a head-and-head duel with John Dick, the hot favorite and eventual victor, that the 21.26 fans gave him a rousing ovation.

He gave the 3-year-old gray colt a tremendous ride before losing by a short neck in a photo finish.

"Gosh, I can't tell you how wonderful it felt to be riding in a race again," he said. "It's just great, that's all."

It was a personal triumph for the gritty youngster who has been down and almost out of his chosen profession several times, beginning with a slipped disc in the spring of 1953.

He also had a bad leg infection that year but finished out with 311 winners to rank third in the nation.

In September 1955, he received a fractured jaw and brain laceration when a mount fell with him in the Beldame at Aqueduct.

He was the leading rider at Bowie in the spring of 1956 but on May 1 he was hauled off the track with multiple internal injuries. Three horses had pounded over his body. His spleen, a kidney and a rib were removed and it appeared his career would end there.

Last spring a horse fell leaving the gate and DeSpirito came out of it with a vertebrae out of place. He was in traction for a week. Aslan flu grounded him after a brief comeback attempt last fall.

DeSpirito opened a restaurant and lounge at Saugus, Mass., and it is doing very well, but riding was his life and he had to get back to the track.

"I didn't know what to do with myself when I wasn't riding," he said. "It means more to me than anything."

# Small College Cagers Honored

NEW YORK (UP)—Dick Kross of American International (Mass.) College and Rudy Finsderson of Brandeis (Mass.) University headed the weekly All-East small college basketball squad selected today by the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference.

Kross, who scored 34 points against New Britain State last week to bring his career total to 1,588, was named to the ECAC team for the fourth time this season. Kross lives in Watertown, Conn.

Fensderson of Cliffside Park, N.J., scored 51 points for Brandeis in two games last week to boost his career total to 1,549. He made the weekly all-star team for the third time this season.

# Extra Benefits Give Venturi Good Start On '58 Golf Year

TUCSON, Ariz. (UP)—The official records for 1958 show that young Ken Venturi, San Francisco golfer, won slightly less than \$3,000 during the first six tournaments of the year.

Unofficially the talented young club swinger has collected a total of more than \$12,500—because of golf's most important item: "fringe benefits."

Nearly every golfer on the tour is collecting royalties of one kind or another and the so-called sideline money has become more important than the amount collected for winning a tournament. Very often it exceeds the size of the first-place purse. The catch is, of course, that to get the sideline money, the player has to make a name for himself by winning tournaments.

Venturi, during January, won two tournaments. In each first prize was worth \$2,000. But in one of these he also got a prize of a new \$4,500 automobile; and in the other he collected \$1,500 because he used a special golf ball (U.S. Royal).

There is some foundation for reports that, in his hey-day, slamin' Sam Snead was making about \$30,000 per year with a major sporting goods manufacturing company (Wilson's) through endorsements.

# Ranger Star Breaks Into NHL Leaders

MONTREAL (UP)—Andy Bathgate of the New York Rangers today cracked the Montreal Canadiens' long-standing monopoly on the top three positions in the National Hockey League standings.

The New York ace picked up three assists against Detroit Saturday for a 52-point total that eased injured Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion out of third place. Dickie Moore's lone goal of the week was enough to keep the Montreal wing on top with 66 points and leading in the goals scored category with 30. Teammate Henri Richard was second with 63 points.

Geoffrion, whose ruptured intestine had improved enough to let him out of the hospital during the weekend, was in a fourth-place tie with Boston's Bronco Horvath. Each had 50 points.

Detroit's Gordie Howe returned from the sick list to pick up one goal and one assist in weekend play and hold his sixth-place standing with 47 points. Howe's teammate, Alex Delvecchio, and Vic Stasiuk of Boston were tied for seventh with 44 points.

Montreal's Jacques Plante still led the goalies with a 2.07 goals per game average — 91 goals in 44 games. He also led on shut-outs with eight. Lou Fontinato of the Rangers had most penalty time, 132 minutes. The Canadiens had the highest team total with 694 minutes.

## YANKS WIN

PAISLEY, Scotland (UP)—Roger Christian of Warrado, Minn., and Johnny Mayasich of Eveleth, Minn., scored two goals each Monday when the United States team "turned up" for the world ice hockey championships with a 4-2 victory over the Paisley Pirates. The world championships are scheduled for Oslo, Norway, Feb. 28-March 9.

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# Kaline, Bengels Sign Pact

DETROIT (UP) — Al Kaline, "anxious to be the best ball player in the league," has signed for 1958 with the Detroit Tigers.

The 23-year-old outfield star "signed on our terms," General Manager Johnny McHale said late Monday. Kaline immediately left for a visit with relatives in Baltimore before heading south for the Tigers' early camp at Lakeland, Fla. It was believed he received neither a raise nor a cut from his plus-\$20,000 salary.

"He said he was very anxious to get started," McHale said. "And he's a very serious-minded young man which makes us happy."

"Al said he wanted to get to the early camp so he can make a good start this season in contrast to his past two years when he's been troubled by a sore arm and a generally slow start," McHale said.

Kaline, after a phenomenal 1955 season when he hit .340 and became the youngest player ever to win the American League batting championship got off slowly in 1956 but wound up strong with a .514 average, 27 home runs and 128 runs batted in.

Ted Williams, the last major leaguer to hit better than .400, last summer predicted Kaline and Mickey Mantle of the New York Yankees have the capabilities of reaching that peak.

"I appreciate the compliment," Kaline said. "I just wish I were as sure of it as he is, though."

In addition to Kaline, pitcher Paul Foytack and rookie outfielder-first baseman Larry Osborne returned signed contracts Monday.

# Piston Gains In NBA Race

NEW YORK (UP) — George Yardley of the Detroit Pistons averaged 35-points in his three most recent outings to gain slightly on Dolph Schayes of the Syracuse Nationals today in the National Basketball Association's individual scoring race.

Yardley scored 105 points in the three games to lift his first-place total to 1516 and his average to 27.1. Schayes, who scored 98 points last week, has 1434 points and a 25.6 average.

Bob Pettit of the St. Louis Hawks ranks third with 24.5 and Clyde Lovellette of the Cincinnati Royals and Bill Sharman of the Boston Celtics are tied for fourth at 23.3 each.

Bill Russell of the Celtics leads in rebounds with an average of 21.8 per game; Dick McGuire of the Detroit Pistons leads in assists with 335, and Jack Twyman of the Royals leads in field goal percentage with .451.

# Video Group Recommends Same TV Bill

KANSAS CITY (UP)—The NCAA's committee on televising college football games has recommended another round of the same fare for the armchair fan next fall — nine national "Game of the Week" telecasts and four Saturday's set aside for regional games.

The 492 voting members of the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. must approve the proposal in a mail referendum by a two-thirds majority. Proposals by the committee have carried easily ever since the NCAA took control of college football telecasts.

Walter Byers, executive director of the NCAA, announced Tuesday the committee's plan for 1958.

It differs only slightly from the pattern of the past three seasons. The committee suggested authorization for a limited number of closed circuit and subscription telecasts for experimental purposes. This takes into account the possible development of pay-see television.

The second modification provides not more than six colleges from any one of the NCAA's eight geographical districts may appear on the national "Game of the Week" telecasts. Last year the Big Ten had teams in seven of the games.

The committee specified five of the nine dates for national telecasts: Sept. 20, Oct. 4, Nov. 27 (Thanksgiving Day), Nov. 29 and Dec. 6. The other four dates will be determined by the sponsor or sponsors.

On the four Saturdays set aside for regional games, member schools may make their own arrangements, subject to some limitations.
