

Special Senate Committee Probes School Suspensions

NEW YORK (AP) — A Brooklyn school official told three staff members of a special U.S. Senate subcommittee on juvenile delinquency yesterday that he opposes the Board of Education's mass suspension policy.

Dropping troublesome children from the schools en masse is no solution to crime in the schools, said Joseph C. Noethen. He is an assistant superintendent in charge of two Brooklyn school districts. "The mass suspensions were a treatment of the symptoms and not the cause of the problem," Noethen told the staff members. He said the Board of Education's action was more political than professional.

The staff members came here with James Sullivan, chief counsel of the investigating subcommittee, to determine whether a congressional investigation should be made of the New York school situation.

Acting on a wave of violence in some schools, the Board of Education last week ordered the suspension of at least 644 pupils. Rapes, knifings and assaults have occurred on and near school property. Both white and Negro students were involved.

Noethen said suspensions should be left to the discretion of the principals or superintendents involved. He appealed for more funds for psychiatric and social staffs and special schools for problem children.

After the hearing, a reporter asked him whether racial conflicts are a factor in student crime.

"My best integrated schools is the one for delinquent boys," he replied. "There is no racial conflict at all."

In another development, City Council President Abe Stark urged that abandoned school buildings be used to instruct suspended children.

The city's five special schools that handle maladjusted pupils are filled to their capacity of 1,200. Six additional special schools are planned.

UF Report

Now, what does United Fund actually do? The constitution says that the objects of this organization shall be:

(a) To develop cooperation between agencies functioning in the Klamath County area, both with

respect to their financial support and the most efficient planning and execution of the social service program within the area.

(b) To coordinate, sponsor, supervise, manage, oversee and conduct fund and money raising efforts, campaigns and programs in the Klamath County area, for agencies or organizations rendering international, national, state-wide or local service in the group work, health, welfare and related fields.

(c) To investigate the various agencies, or organizations, corporate or otherwise, desiring to raise funds in the Klamath County area, and to disseminate information with relation to fund-raising efforts and campaigns in behalf of recommended and approved agencies and organizations through the Klamath County area.

That's United Fund's obligation to the community. I've heard the question expressed, "What's United Fund sticking its nose into that business for?" Please note the word "investigate" in the obligation above.

What are the benefits of such a federation of agency effort? Here are some of them.

One is Service. More of our people, particularly the young ones, are being served by United Fund agencies than ever before.

It's a Package Plan. Twenty-seven agencies serve the commu-

nity through United Fund dollars. There would have been 27 fund campaigns and 27 annual meetings like this within the past year were funds not raised the united way.

It meets the Public Demand for a better way to conserve time and effort in fund raising through doing it once, for all members, once a year.

It conserves the Givers' Time. Every person's time is important to him. The one drive meets the needs of all the agencies that will cooperate and saves the time of those who only give, as well as of those who donate time to United Fund as well as dollars.

It does Save Dollars. Through the united way, a greater percent of the donor's dollars go directly to human services than is the case with individual drives. There's just

one fund raising and administering "overhead."

There are No Gimmicks. Funds are raised by one direct contact; no gimmicks are used to put the supporter on the spot time and again.

There's Payroll Sharing. Payroll plans for contributions are available, or can be made available, in most every organization in Klamath County. Agencies need operating funds the year around. Through payroll plans a small amount each month adds up to a substantial amount of support.

The contribution dollar does the Most Good. The members of our Admittance, Budget and Quota Committee actually have spent hundreds of hours this past year conferring with agencies, and together, to most equitably allocate the funds contributed by our citizens.

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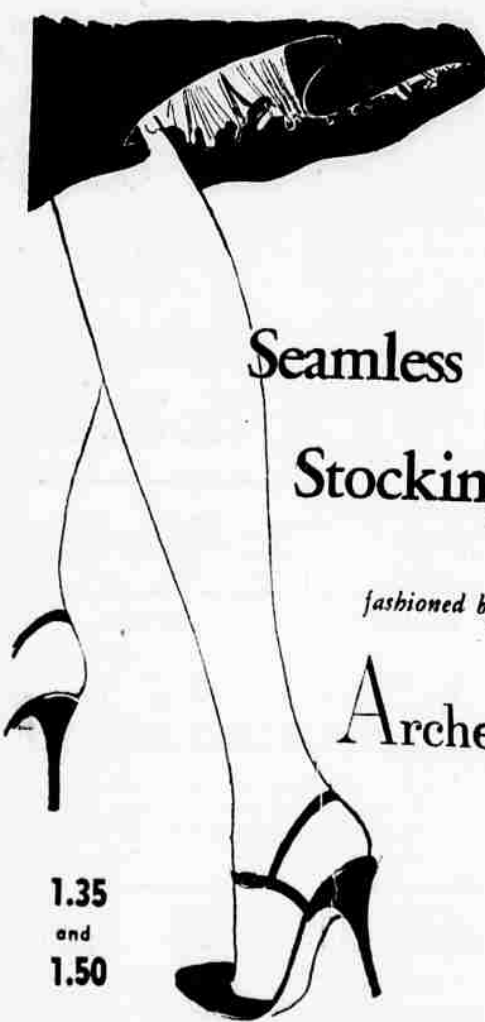
