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LDS Church Meet Slated

A conference of the Klamath Stake of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (Mormons) will be held in Ashland and Medford Saturday and Sunday, February 15-16. Saturday meetings will be in the Ashland Ward Chapel on Iowa Street, Ashland. The general conference is scheduled for the Medford High School on Sunday.

Among the speakers will be Elder Hugh B. Brown, assistant to the Council of Twelve Apostles and Stewart B. Eccles of the General Welfare Committee both of Salt Lake City. The general conference session, open to the public will be held at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Announcement of plans for the meetings was made by Carroll W. Smith, Ashland, stake president.

Five wards (local congregations) are included in the stake, Ashland, Grants Pass, Lakeview, Medford and Klamath Falls. Each ward is self governed by lay members who serve voluntarily, the world-wide missionary program is also self supporting and the churches are not only a place of worship but a source of recreation, education and cultural development. It also provides stricken members with food. The Mormons operate the largest church-sponsored university in America, the welfare plan maintains farms, plants and warehouses and a world-wide youth organization sponsors athletic tournaments, drama festivals and exhibitions of music and dance.

Unemployment Issue Eyed By Local Officials At Meet

The possibility of having city and county employees qualified to receive unemployment benefits was discussed Friday morning by members of the Klamath County Court, city officers, school officials, road employees, and representatives of the state unemployment compensation commission. Noncontractual school employees such as bus drivers, janitors, and cafeteria workers could also be qualified.

Powell A. Turner, field examiner with the unemployment compensation commission, said the last session of the state legislature approved action which permits county, city, school and other municipal employees to come within provisions of the unemployment compensation program. The county court, the city council, the school boards or the directors of other agencies would determine whether the employees under their direction should become a part of the program.

Turner pointed out that if any of the agencies elect to become a part of the program, the cost to the county, city or school districts would be on a reimbursable basis, and not determined in the same manner as with private businesses. The basic cost of the program to a private employer is 2.7 per cent of the gross wages paid each quarter.

It was pointed out that under the program employees could be entitled to 26 weeks of unemployment compensation, with the weekly amounts ranging between \$15 and \$40, depending on the prior earnings of the employee. A

portion of the outlay would be borne by the agency or municipality where the employee had worked.

Although school teachers could not qualify, it was explained that such personnel as school cooks, cafeteria workers, bus drivers, janitors, clerical help and other school employees on a noncontractual basis could apply for unemployment compensation if not employed during the summer months of school recess.

By the same token, some of the county and city road department employees who are normally released during some of the winter months would qualify for unemployment compensation if other work was not available at the time of their release.

A. G. McElroy, auditing supervisor for the commission, explained that elective and appointive officials, as well as school teachers, could not be covered under the plan. Firemen and police officers would be covered.

Participation in the program would cost the individual employee nothing. The entire cost of participation would be financed by the county, city, or school boards. In addition to the commission
