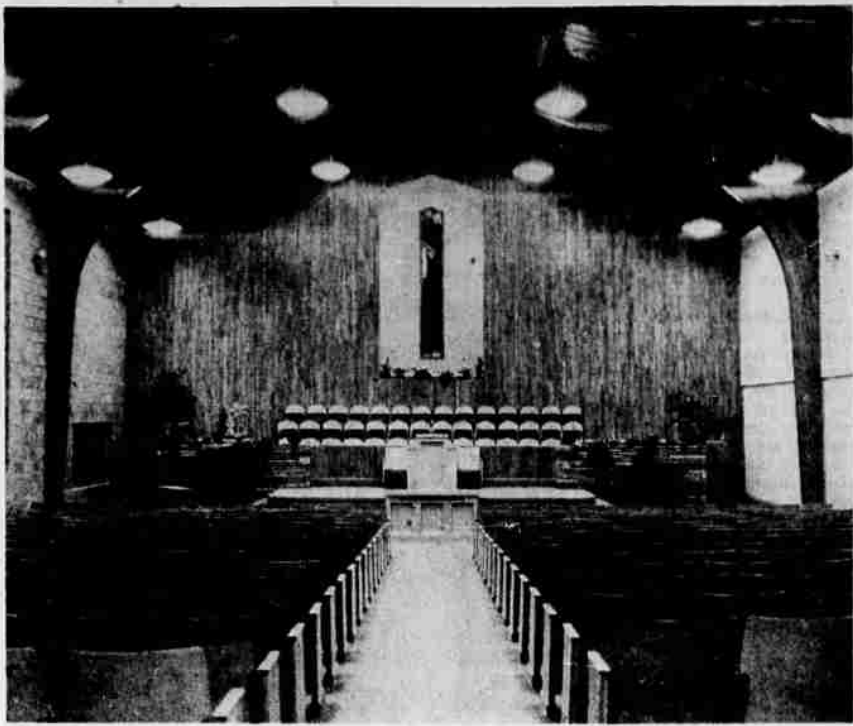

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Three Draw Liquor Rap

WEED — Sentences were meted out by Judge Kenneth T. Stone of the Weed Justice Court Saturday, February 8, for three McCloud residents for violations of the alcoholic beverage code.

The three, Curtis Leon Wilkins, 26, Arnold Leroy Thompson, 19, and Edward Chalmers Baker, 19, received 90 day jail sentences which were suspended for one year under summary probation.

Terms of Wilkins' probation require him to serve 14 days in the Weed jail which will be served on weekend periods. He was cited for drinking alcoholic beverages on school property.

Thompson and Baker drew like probation conditions requiring them to serve six days each in the Weed jail on weekend sessions, crediting two days per weekend. They were charged with illegal possession of alcoholic beverages by minors and drinking on school property.

A 16-year-old youth was arrested with Wilkins, Thompson and Baker on Saturday night, February 1, by Weed police officers at the Weed High School grounds. The juvenile was certified to the Siskiyou County Juvenile Court and will answer to Judge Allen.

The gallon and quart of wine in their possession were claimed to have been purchased by one of the 19 year olds from a Dunsmuir merchant who is now under investigation by the Liquor Control Board.
