Twelve Clubs Draw Indian Tournery Bids

Twelve teams have been selected to play in the annual Klamath Reservation All-Indian Invitational Basketball Tournament to be held at Chiloquin March 19-22 tournament, officials announced this week.

One local team will join with 11 outside entries in making this year's tournament the finest field ever assembled for the annual event.

The 1956 and 1957 winners, the Nez Perce tribe from Lapwai, Idaho will be back to defend their title along with other teams who walked away with honors last season. The Blackfeet from Browning, Montana who were runners-up in 1957, will also be in the starting field when the tournament play opens.

Lodge Grass (Crows), Montana and Ft. Washakie (Shoshone-Arapaho), Wyoming will be back after winning third and fourth place trophies last year. Other "outsiders" will be the Yakimas from Toppenish, Washington; Putes from Fort Bidwell, California; Sioux from the San Francisco Relocation Center and Pite, Digger and Wasco tribes from Reno. All these teams have entered in this tournament before.

Two newcomers will join the above teams in completing the field of 12. Fort Yates, North Dakota will field a team comprised of Standing Rock Sioux. The other club will be members of the McKaw tribe at Neah Bay, Washington.

The winner of this game will meet the Coos Bay - North Bend winner for the right to enter the four-team state tournament two weeks from now. The winner of the state tournament will draw a berth in the regional playoffs and a right to seek a spot in the AAU nationals to be held in Denver. Last year's district winner was Great West Life of Klamath Falls.

Heiss Wins 3rd Ice Skating Title

PARIS, Feb. 16 (AP) — Carol Heiss of Ozone Park, N. Y., Miss Personality of the ice, skated off with her third world figure skating championship Saturday with a perfectly executed freestyle exhibition.

The New York miss added to her lead in the final round after having built up an almost insurmountable advantage in the compulsory figures which were completed earlier Saturday.

So precise was Miss Heiss' skating Saturday that she turned the 12,000 spectators in the Paris Sports Palace into a cheering, foot-stamping mob.

"I'm so happy, I'm so happy," she said after her victory as she skated into the arms of her coach, Pierre Brunet of New York, with tears streaming down her cheeks.

The critical and eagle-eyed judges also thought that it had been an amazing and seldom-seen performance.

Judging is done on a scale in which six represents a seldom-achieved perfection. Not one of the nine judges rated Miss Heiss at less than 5.7. Three of the judges gave the 18-year-old ice queen a rating of six.

David Jenkins of Colorado Springs, Colo., also got extraordinary high results from the judges Friday night when he won the men's figure skating championship. But Jenkins commanded only one accolade of six.

Ingrid Wendt of Austria assured herself the second position with a polished, pleasing free skating performance. She drew high marks from the judges, but not quite as high as those accorded Miss Heiss. Miss Wendt, European champion, had finished second in the skating of compulsory figures.

Hanna Walter of Austria was awarded third place.

The Jayhawks brought their league record to 5-2 as Wilt Chamberlain hit for a total of 34 points.

Seattle U Ace Holds Lead Spot

NEW YORK, Feb. 16 (AP)—Elgin Baylor of Seattle is scoring like he never heard NCAA statisticians who say this is the lowest scoring basketball season in six years.

The 6-6 Seattle junior passed the Valentine Day mark Friday with an average of 34.4 points a game for 19 games. Only Frank Selvy and Darrell Floyd of Hurm ever reached the holiday of hearts with higher averages.

Baylor has averaged 47.6 points in his last five games for a 654 total, NCAA figures showed Saturday. They were complete through Friday night.

His closest rivals are Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati with 633 points and a 33.3 average and Wilt Chamberlain of Kansas, 466 and 31.1.

In 1954, Selvy hit Valentine's Day with a 37.7 average and the next year, Selvy showed up with a 35.5 average.

Team leaders in scoring and defense remained the same as last week. Team figures are complete through Feb. 10.

Marshall continued to lead the scorers with an 88.7 average and San Francisco stayed a point ahead of Oklahoma State with a 48.7 defensive average. Oklahoma State has held opponents to 49.6 points a game, Oregon State was ninth defensively with 56.5 points a game.

The West Virginia scoring leaders were pressed by Cincinnati (87.5), West Virginia (86.0) and Seattle (84.0).

Tom Hawkins of Notre Dame led his club to ninth in scoring as the Irish averaged 98 points in three games last week. They had been 16th. In the past month, Hawkins has lifted himself from 24th to eighth among individual scorers.

Other individual leaders: Alex Ellis of Niagara, rebound percentage, 26.1; Ralph Cross-wait of Western Kentucky, field goal accuracy, 6.25; and Gerald Myers of Texas Tech, free throw accuracy, .886.

NCS Defeats Maryland, 69-64

RALEIGH, Feb. 16 (AP) — Fired-up North Carolina State defeated Maryland 69-64 in a triple-overtime basketball thriller Saturday.

State, playing without the services of Whitey Bell, the team's No. 1 scorer, rallied in the last 10 minutes of the regulation to overcome a 13-point deficit and force the extra periods.

State is now 9-3 in the Atlantic Coast Conference and 15-4 overall. Bell was declared ineligible Saturday morning because of scholastic difficulties.

Improving Your Bowling: Today's tip comes from Mel Robinson who explains the correct fundamentals on your approach. Says Mel: Choose a position on the approach 12 to 16 feet from the foul line. A comfortable stance with weight divided on both feet. The four or five step approach are the most popular deliveries.

Your ball should start with a push forward or upward in coordination with your first step. Let the ball swing freely straight back and then straight forward on your release, with the ball being placed well over the foul line after the release. At the end of your approach you should be bent forward with your left knee (if you are right handed) bent slightly and your shoulders parallel with the foul line.

The thumb should come out of the ball first with the fingers furnishing the lift at the moment of your final release and then continue on up with your arm straight through which is proper for a good followthrough.

Disputed Knockdown Aids Kerwin Verdict

NEW YORK (UP)—The International Boxing Club hopes to stage a return bout because of the dispute over welterweight Gale Kerwin's "Chinese" knockdown and his split-decision victory over previously unbeaten Stefan Redl.

Canadian Kerwin, now living at Valley Stream, N.Y., was awarded the split verdict Friday night after his 10-round TV fight with German Redl, now residing at Passaic, N.J., before 3,500 at Madison Square Garden.

Kerwin, weighing 142 1/2 pounds to Redl's 145 1/2, snapped Stefan's victory string at 17 straight; but he received an assist from referee Larry Napp, who credited Kerwin with a knockdown in the sixth round.

Without that knockdown ruling, which influenced all three ring officials in awarding the sixth session to Kerwin, Redl might have won the fight.
