DUNSMUIR — Management organization and interviewing of applicants for key positions will be the major business at the board of directors meeting of the Mt. Shasta Ski Bowl Corporation at the forest service headquarters in Mount Shasta Monday evening.

The grand opening date of the lodge and chairlift will also be set, George Schrader, executive secretary, said. This will probably be early in September.

Carl R. McConnell of Redding who has been given authority to build the \$186,000 lodge and lease it to the corporation has announced he hopes to begin construction in April, with completion contemplated in midsummer.

The last segment of the John Everett Memorial Highway is scheduled for surfacing by the last of August paving the way for full use of the new winter sports facilities at Panther Meadow next winter, Schrader said. Skiing conditions at the bowl are ideal at present with 10 to 12 feet of snow.

The training session with Monte Atwater of Squaw Valley, avalanche expert, has been deferred by stormy weather but he is expected this week, Schrader stated.
