Water Fluoridation Row Puzzles Dental Expert

WASHINGTON (UP)—The head of the government's Dental Research Institute said recently it is a mystery to him why the value of fluoridating public water supplies should still be a controversial question in hundreds of American communities.

"Continuing scientific studies have demonstrated beyond the shadow of any reasonable doubt that fluoridation is a completely safe, inexpensive and every effective method of preventing tooth decay," Dr. F. A. Arnold Jr. said in an interview.

"I know of no other public health measure which is backed up by such an overwhelming body of proof."

According to the U.S. Public Health Service, 1,556 cities and towns now have water fluoridation programs. Their combined population is 32,730,856. In addition, there are 1,903 communities, mostly small towns, whose water supply contains natural fluoride. These have a combined population of about 7,000,000. Thus about one quarter of the U.S. population is drinking fluoridated water.

The number of communities adding fluoride to public water has risen steadily. It was 790 at the start of 1953, and 1,487 a year ago. The list includes Washington, Chicago, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Milwaukee, Minneapolis, San Francisco, St. Louis and Buffalo.

New York City's Board of Estimate is currently considering a fluoridation proposal. In New York and elsewhere, proposals to fluoridate municipal water supplies have run into strong public opposition.

At least 70 communities, including Akron, Ohio, and San Diego, Calif., have abandoned fluoridation programs after they were launched. And scores of others, including Portland, Ore., Cincinnati, Ohio, Seattle, Wash., Syracuse, N.Y., Fort Worth, Tex., and Hartford, Conn., have rejected fluoridation.

Opponents of fluoridation have advanced a wide variety of arguments, ranging from the claim that it is a Communist plot to soften the brains of American citizens to the rumor (circulated widely in Boston) that it is a birth control measure. The most common battle cry, raised in New York and dozens of other cities, is that fluoridated water is "poisonous."

The National Institute of Dental Research, which Arnold heads, is a branch of the U.S. Public Health Service. It has investigated both the beneficial effects and all of the alleged harmful effects of fluoridation.

"This is not a matter on which we have to make carefully hedged, qualified statements," Arnold said. "Every scientific evidence points the same way."

Poland Seeks Nuclear Ban

WARSAW (UP)—Poland is reported to be pushing its plan for banning nuclear weapons from central Europe by adding proposals for inspection and control. Lack of any control provisions was a major Western objection to the plan, first advanced by Polish Foreign Minister Adam Rapacki at the United Nations last fall.

During the last few days Rapacki has called in envoys of the Western Big Three and other nations to present them with a new memorandum on the plan. The note was said to have been cleared with the Soviet Union in talks between Rapacki and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko last month.

The heart of the Rapacki plan is a ban on production and storage of nuclear weapons in Poland, Czechoslovakia, Communist East Germany and West Germany.

Informed sources said that the new note:

1. Proposed that the Big Four work out arrangements for the zone, to get around Western refusal to recognize the East German regime.
2. Called on the Big Four to promise not to use nuclear weapons in the zone in case of war.
3. Suggested that inspection teams work from special bases in and around the zone. There was no suggestion on members of the team, but Poland generally favors "neutral nation" groups—the same setup which has failed in enforcing provisions of the Korean armistice.

The six-page Rapacki note probably will be pushed in a few days. It was received in Washington and London, but the U.S. State Department would not comment until it had a chance to study the note.

Reds Get Ike's Summit Memo

MOSCOW (UP)—U.S. Ambassador Llewellyn E. Thompson drove through a heavy snowstorm to deliver President Eisenhower's reply to Premier Bulganin's latest note on a summit conference.

Thompson made no public comment on the message, which he handed to Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko. In the past such notes have been brought to the Foreign Office by messenger.

Embassy sources said Thompson's meeting with Gromyko was relatively brief and added he had no further appointments with Soviet officials.

This appeared to remove the possibility that the two diplomats had any time today to begin talking about a summit meeting.

Westerners here speculated that Eisenhower's note may remove the last major block to negotiations for a summit meeting.

Politicos Ask Polar Rulings

WASHINGTON (UP)—A group of congressmen who visited Antarctica was reported today to have recommended that the United States claim sovereignty over part of the continent and discuss joint administration of other areas.

The exact recommendation of the six-man House Commerce subcommittee made to President Eisenhower by letter Jan. 17 was kept secret.

In a formal report to the House, the subcommittee said only "we are of the opinion that the time has arrived for a re-evaluation" of the position on Antarctica the United States has maintained since 1924. This position was that the United States recognized no territorial claims of other countries in the far southern continent and made none of its own, but reserved all its rights.

In 1924, the United States was well ahead of the rest of the world in antarctic exploration. Many other countries have entered the field since then.

New Zealand, Australia, France, Norway, Argentina, Chile, Great Britain and the Union of South Africa have asserted territorial claims in Antarctica. The Soviet Union, Belgium, Japan and the United States have operated scientific stations there in connection with the International Geophysical Year but have asserted no claims.

Berkeley Pair Recall Early China Days On New Years

BERKELEY, Calif. (UP)—Mrs. Buwei Yang Chao was a rebel against old China traditions when she married in Peiping in 1921. Now, 37 years later, she thinks that Chinese youngsters growing up in the United States should learn and remember a little of the customs and foods of their ancestors' home land.

Today, the eve of the Year of the Dog, 4556 in the Chinese lunar calendar, her husband says he too feels a leaning toward the old festival customs for the Chinese New Year.

"I guess this is how it is," says Dr. Y. R. Chao, Oriental language department chairman at the University of California. "After you are secure in knowing you will not be enslaved and ruled by rigid traditions, then you are willing to follow them a little."

Now, after 10 years of campus life in Berkeley and World War II years of wearing work teaching American GIs the Chinese language in a war pressured hurry, the Chao enjoy indulging in some New Year festival customs of their home land.

There is irony that the Chao, young rebels in Peiping 37 years ago, should now know this nostalgia.

Their marriage, without a wedding, made Peiping front pages under headlines — "New Style Wedding for New Style People."

The Chao conformed to legal requirements of obtaining a marriage certificate and paying for a 50-cent tax stamp. The necessary two witnesses were invited as guests to a simple dinner, prepared by the bride.

The guests, Hu Shih, later ambassador to the United States, and a girl classmate of the bride, ate the dinner and signed the paper. "Thus Chao Yuenren and Yang Buwei were married," Hu Shih wrote.

Mrs. Chao, the bride who cooked her own marriage dinner, achieved in the United States a reputation as an expert in Chinese cooking. Her book on "How to Cook and Eat in Chinese" is now in its ninth printing.

Mrs. Chao says Chinese cooking is no good for a small family—too many leftovers.

So when the Chao now want something special in eating, they go out for pizza.

Crescent City Fire Kills Trio

CRESCENT CITY, Calif. (UP)—A lighted cigarette was blamed for the death of three persons and injury of four in a fire that destroyed an entire business block of this northwestern California lumber town yesterday.

One person still is missing. Damage was estimated at 1½ million dollars.

The casualties occurred at the Bay City Hotel, where the fire started from a cigarette on a mattress in a third-floor room, Police Chief Bill Burke said.

Burke identified the dead as Bobby Booker, 22, stationed at Requa Air Force Base near Klamath; Elmer Wasankari, 53, Crescent City; and William Maughan, a logger.

George Schrader, 72, and George Pittman, 23, were seriously injured in leaps from upstairs rooms.

Mrs. Marjorie Sharp, 38, a hotel guest, has not been located. Nine business houses were devastated by the blaze.

AF Tells Need For Bases

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Air Force says there is a "strong military requirement" for the bases it is building in Spain.

This was the Air Force's reply to a report by the General Accounting Office which said some of the bases involved in the half-billion-dollar construction program are of doubtful military value.

The GAO report was made Jan. 31 to House Speaker Rayburn (D-Tex.) and Vice President Nixon, the Senate's presiding officer. The GAO functions as a watchdog for Congress over government spending.

In its report, the GAO said construction was continued at San Pablo when there was no operational need for that base. The agency said this was done because stopping the work "would have had an adverse effect on Spanish-American relations."

The Air Force said the construction at San Pablo "provides for increasing both our striking and our emergency recovery capability."

The GAO said a base site was chosen at Torrejon chiefly because Spanish officials wanted an air defense post near Madrid and a show place for jet fighters.

In reply, the Air Force said the Torrejon base "is satisfactory from a military point of view and benefits from excellent community support from Madrid."

TYPHOID IN KOREA

SEOUL, Korea (UP)—Four persons have died and at least 117 others have been stricken in an outbreak of typhoid fever in the South Korean town of Mukho. Health authorities reported today.

The Ministry of Health and Social Welfare said more than 30,000 residents have been vaccinated by an emergency medical team rushed to the area.
