Ambulance Goal Set By Chiloquin

CHILOQUIN — A goal of \$3,000 for a new ambulance for the upper Klamath County district was set by a large group of interested adults who met Thursday evening at the Chiloquin City Hall. Clyde Leake was elected chairman of the fund raising campaign, with Henry C. Smith as co-chairman; Roger Wright, secretary - treasurer; and Lewis Pohl, publicity director. The campaign will work in connection with the volunteer firemen who direct the operation of the ambulance currently in use in the district.

A recent report shows that the cost of operating has been increasing as the car had had repairs and is in need of overhauling. There have been breakdowns which could be serious if the car was hauling a critical case.

Everyone in attendance was in favor of purchasing a new vehicle as soon as possible and keeping the present one for disaster work or secondary use. Most of those at the meeting represented some organization and were speaking for a large number of the persons.

Each person was asked to contact his group to see what aid they would give and to report next Thursday evening at an 8 o'clock meeting at the city hall. The Klamath discussion group has already made plans for a food sale to raise money for prizes which will be awarded at a talent show March 28, all of the proceeds of which will be donated to the campaign.

A thermometer to record the progress toward the \$3,000 goal will be placed in the Indian Education Office and any group planning a benefit is asked to clear the date through that same office. The desired ambulance could carry four stretcher cases in an emergency, as well as two ambulatory patients, the driver and a medical assistant.

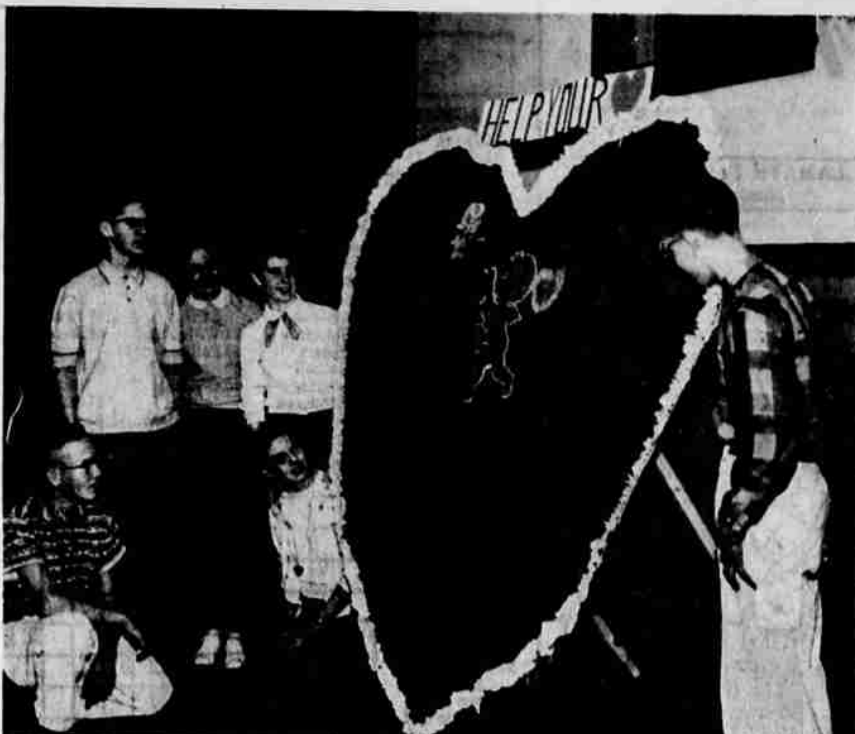
Merrill Group Lends Chair

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Fog Hinders Plane Search

NAPLES, Italy — Fog and heavy clouds over the south Italian mountains and the Ionian Sea hampered the search today for a twin-engine U.S. Air Force transport missing with 16 military personnel aboard.
Despite the fog, more than 15 American search planes took off from bases in the Naples area. Italian seaplanes from Syracuse and Taranto, British planes from Malta, and ships of the U.S. 6th Fleet joined in.

Officials said the possibility that the plane had been forced down in Communist Albania could not be excluded. There were unconfirmed reports that the United States was trying to check with the Albanians.

The C47, on a flight from Ramstein-Landstuhl Airport in Germany to Turkey, carried a crew of seven and nine passengers.
It landed Saturday night at Naples to take on fuel and passengers. Thirty minutes after taking off for Athens it radioed that it had reached 6,500 feet and was switching to the Rome radio control. It never contacted Rome.

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
