POE VALLEY - OLENE

The Poe Valley-Olene Extension Unit held a regular meeting at the Poe Valley Community Hall Tuesday, February 11, beginning at 10:30 a.m., with the project lesson, luncheon at noon and discussion and the business meeting from 1:30 to 3 p.m.

Project leaders, Mrs. Paul Breithaupt and Mrs. Wilbur Reiling, gave an interesting and informative demonstration on "Preparing and Freezing Combination Main Dishes." Frozen foods should be thawed in the refrigerator, and not on the drainboard at room temperature as the foods thaw from the outside, and will deteriorate before the center is thawed. Care should be taken to use the proper containers, not re-using waxed cartons that other food came in, as some of the bacteria might remain, and give the food an off flavor. Plastic, or waxed containers are recommended.

The members divided into four groups, each group preparing one recipe, with the leaders supervising. Potato Puffs, Hamburger Roll, Chicken-ala-King, and Meat Sauce, were the recipes used. The food was cooked and served as the main dish for the luncheon at noon, with dessert added. Twenty members, two guests and five children were present.
