County Clerk Hopeful Files

YREKA — Latest candidate for the post of county clerk of Siskiyou County, is Loyd Johnson, Yreka life insurance man, who announced his candidacy for the job last week. He will compete with Mrs. Rachel Cordes, incumbent county clerk, who has announced her intent to seek election to the office to which she was appointed to complete the term vacated by the late Waldo Smith.

Born in Montana, Johnson received his education there, and after graduating from high school attended Montana State College at Bozeman. Later, moving to Los Angeles, he spent many years as an automobile salesman and dealer until the outbreak of World War II. Johnson then closed out his business and was employed by the Standard Shipyards at San Pedro as a material expeditor and coordinator.

After the war, Johnson and his wife, Dorothy, moved to Yreka where they established their residence. Mrs. Johnson resumed her work as a teacher, and he took up the work of handling livestock supplies, and the buying and selling of livestock. From 1948 until 1955, he held a half-interest in the Siskiyou Sporting Goods Store, working as co-manager until he sold out. He then became a special agent for the Paul Revere Life Insurance Company.

Johnson is an active member of the Yreka Lions Club, with a 10-year-perfect attendance record. He has served as Lions Club president, zone chairman, and deputy district governor. He is also an active member of the Masonic Lodge, and its other affiliations, having held prominent offices in most of them. Johnson has also been a director of the Yreka Chamber of Commerce, and at present holds the post of president of the Siskiyou Consolidated Sportsmen's Association.
