

Frank Lane Proposes Anti-Winter Ball Plan

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., Feb. 22 (AP) — Frank Lane, angered by the failure of Cleveland's Latin-American contingent to agree to terms, said today he would sponsor a resolution barring \$15,000-a-year performers from playing winter ball.

The general managers of the Indians made specific reference to only one of his three south-of-the-border athletes — outfielder Minnie Minoso — but it was clear he also was referring to Indian shortstop Chico Carrasquel and second baseman Bobby Avila. The three are confirmed holdouts.

"At the next baseball meeting, which should be sometime between now and the July All-Star game," said Lane, "I'm going to propose that all players making \$15,000 or more, whether they are

The Trojans had stormed to an eight-point lead and appeared to have the rough, foul-scattered contest in hand, until Stanford turned Paul Neumann loose. The junior jump shot artist rang the bell on four straight shots from around the free throw line and USC's lead was gone.

In the final minutes the Trojans contributed to their own downfall by fouling repeatedly in an effort to get the ball, giving Stanford frequent opportunities from the free throw line.

Baylor Compared To Jekyll, Hyde

SEATTLE (AP) — Elgin Baylor is two people. Off the basketball court he's a tall, mild-mannered young man, gentle voice and amiable. But when the whistle blows his Jekyll runs to Hyde.

Don't misconstrue: there's no meanness in the Baylor bones. The Seattle University basketball star and nation's leading scorer draws very few fouls and never complains of being roughed by opponents. Matter of fact, roughness and jostling rarely bother him.

(Sighing into the air on a driving layup, Baylor was punched in the shoulder by an enemy guard. The blow was enough to knock the average player into the bleacher seats. It didn't even throw Baylor off line and he made the basket with such nonchalance the officials never bothered to call a foul.)

Baylor is 22 years old, 6 feet 6 1/2 inches tall, weighs 225 pounds. He is a junior at Seattle U. and he makes him hard to push around so opponents try to block him away from the basket on rebounds. He merely goes above them and scoops in the ball.

"At College of Idaho I turned out for the track team," recalls

Elgin. "I high-jumped 6-3 when I started hurting my wrists on the landings I quit. Didn't want anything to interfere with basketball. I passed up football for the same reason."

"I was introduced to basketball when I was 14, in junior high school. I really liked softball and touch football better then, but now it's nothing but basketball for me. I hope I can make the grade as a pro."

One of the great worries at Seattle U. is whether Baylor will become eligible for the pro draft "make up my mind in the summer." Coach John Castiglioni believes—and hopes—his ace will be eligible for his senior season.

Baylor came west out of Springville High School in Washington, D.C., to enroll first at College of Idaho in Caldwell. A coaching shakeup there after his freshman year prompted the switch to Seattle. As a sophomore last year he made sufficient impression to earn the No. 6 spot on the All-America team.

"Undoubtedly the greatest player ever to perform in the Pacific Northwest," says the Seattle

Frosh Cager Moves Into Scoring Picture

NEW YORK, Feb. 22 (AP) — There's a rumbling in the ranks immediately behind the light three-man race for the country's college basketball scoring leadership.

Kelly Coleman, a Kentucky Wesleyan freshman, has advanced from 13th place to fifth place among 13th place to fifth place among major college individual scorers, National Collegiate Athletic Assn. bureau figures showed today. The figures are complete through Friday.

Coleman scored 113 points in three games to boost his average from 24.4 to 26.1 points per game. He also raised his total to 600, making him the highest scoring freshman in major college history. He bettered the 555-point record set in 1952 by Cleo Littleton of Wichita.

Elgin Baylor of Seattle continued to lead the country's scorers with a 33.9 average. He was followed by Cincinnati's Oscar Robertson, 33.8, and Kansas' Will Chamberlain, 31.4. Then came Bailey Howell of Mississippi State, 26.6, and Coleman.

Seattle's Baylor was slowed Thursday by Montana State which held him to 23 points — his lowest in a month.

Also making a bigger noise than ever is Notre Dame's Tom Hawkins. Three weeks ago he was 23rd on the scoring list. A week ago he was eighth, this week he is seventh with a 25.4 average.

Seattle Site Of Boat Race

SEATTLE, Feb. 22 (AP) — The 1958 National Inboard Racing Championships will be held here in August, it was announced today.

Five inboard class championships will be held on Lake Washington Aug. 2 and 3, the joint announcement by the Seattle Yacht Club and Greater Seattle, Inc., said. The dates are the first weekend of the 1958 Seattle Seafair celebration.

More than 100 racing boats will be here for the events. It will mark the first time the championships have been held in Seattle.

The inboard classes will include 48 cubic-inch inboards, 135, 136, 225 and 266.

Bob Schroeder of New York has already notified Jack Colcock, secretary of the American Power Boat Assn., that he will race his 135 and 136 class boats, Ray Gassner, St. Petersburg, Fla., will be here to defend his 266 cubic inch hydro class title.

Other defending champions include: Bob Hamilton, Fort Lauderdale, Fla., 135 class; William Rittner Sr., Willow Grove, Pa., 225 class; and Bill Stenfield, Malvern, N. Y., 136 class.

Colcock said the two-day regatta will include heat races for 200 cubic inch and 7 liter class boats.

The following week, Aug. 10, the Gold Cup race for unlimited hydro boats will be run.

Ex-Sox Star Works Martin

LAKELAND, Fla., (AP) — Johnny Pesky, former Detroit Tiger and Boston Red Sox shortstop, has taken on his third pupil—Billy Martin, a key figure in Detroit's hopes for a higher finish in the 1958 American League campaign.

Tiger Manager Jack Tighe assigned Pesky Friday to teach Martin how to cover the vital infield position. Pesky now is a manager in the Tiger farm system.

Martin, obtained in the big trade with Kansas City this winter, never has played shortstop on a regular basis. He was a second and third baseman with New York and the Athletics.

Tiger players coached in the past by Pesky include shortstop Harvey Kuenn who is moving to centerfield this season, and third baseman Reno Bertoia.

Robertson Hits 36

CINCINNATI, Feb. 22 (AP) — Oscar Robertson's 36 points and big Connie Dierking's 31 provided most of the offensive punch tonight for an 86-71 Cincinnati basketball victory over stubborn Tulane that settled the Bearcats more comfortably in the Missouri Valley Conference driver's seat.

Aussie Shatters 4 Records

MELBOURNE, Feb. 22 (AP) — John Konrads, Australia's human fish, bettered four more world records tonight and Dawn Fraser smashed two global marks as the Australian National Swimming Championships closed before 5,500 frenzied fans at the Olympic Pool.

Konrads, 15-year-old Latvian-born youngster who now can claim 10 world freestyle records, was timed in an amazing 17 minutes, 28.7 seconds for the 1,650 yards and 1,500 meters.

On the way he was caught in 9 minutes, 17.7 seconds for the 880 yards and 800 meter distances, also bettering the old marks. The listed 880 mark is 9:34.3 set by Aussie Murray Rose at Sydney in 1956.

ALL WORLD RECORDS

If the International Swimming Federation recognizes Konrads' times, it will mean that Australians hold all of the men's world freestyle records. Seventeen world marks were bettered during the meet which began last Saturday.

Konrads easily surpassed American George Breen's record of 17:52.9 for 1,500 meters set in the 1956 Melbourne Olympics and the 17:59.2 standard set up by the International Federation for 1,650 yards.

After the race Konrads was assisted from the pool but quickly recovered. He had predicted he would swim the 1,650 in 17:40.

"You ask, was I tired?" he replied to a question. "Oh, boy, I was more than that. I felt myself weakening over the last six laps (of the 30 laps in the 55-yard pool) and when I heard that whistle go at the last 110 it was the most beautiful sound I ever have heard. And I can tell you those last five yards were the most glorious five yards I ever swam."

The 1,500 meters is 1,640.5 yards. He was clocked passing the 1,500 meter mark in 17 minutes, 23.8 seconds but this will not be recognized as a world mark, which must stand at his full 1,650 yards distance.

NATURALIZED AUSTRALIANS

Konrads, whose parents now are naturalized Australians, won the 1,650 yards by 110 yards from Gary Winram, who was timed in 18:45. Third was Murray Garretty in 19:02.8, and several competitors were 220 yards behind at the finish.

Earlier Dawn Fraser sliced three seconds from her own world 220-yard freestyle record. She was timed in 2:14.7, and set up a new world 200-meter mark at the same time.

The Olympic 100-meter freestyle champion won by 10 yards from Lorraine Crapp, another Olympian, who finished in 2:22.

World record holder John Devitt won the 100-yard freestyle time in 55.9 seconds, seven tenths of a second under his record.

Brian Wilkin won the men's 110-yard butterfly stroke in 1:04.4, and 13-year-old Ann Nelson created a new Australian record when she won the women's junior 110-yard backstroke in 1:14.8.

Ilsa Konrads, John's 13-year-old sister, failed in her quest for the junior women's 110-yard freestyle title, finishing third in 1:06.7. Sandra Morgan, 16, won the event in 1:05.2 by a touch from Alva Colquhoun, who was timed in 1:05.4.

'Best To Win Big One': Ford

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla., (AP) — Whitey Ford, "stopper" ever since the departure of Allie Reynolds and Vic Raschi, has no particular urge to become a 20-game winner, the ambition of nearly every major league pitcher.

All Ford wants to do is to continue to win the "big ones," a specialty of the little southpaw ever since 1953 when he became the mainstay of the Yankees' pitching staff.

"Of course it's nice to win 20," the 29-year-old towhead remarked Friday after signing his seventh contract as a Yankee, at a reported \$32,000, a sum that equaled his 1956 salary. "But I'm satisfied going along the way I have been, winning 17-18-19 a season, with 12 or 13 of these victories over the contending clubs."

Ford's signing left nine Yankees still outside the fold. The hold-out brigade is led by Mickey Mantle, who is expected to leave the ranks within two or three days and sign a contract calling for \$75,000.

Others still balking include pitchers Bob Turley, Bob Grim, Tom Sturdivant, Tommy Byrne and Johnny Kucks; and infielders Bill Skowron, Andy Carey and Marv Throneberry, a rookie.
