Phoners Work On Projects

Telephone men are taking to the hills in Oregon this winter as part of a \$2,300,000 program to provide more circuits for long distance calls.

Here in Klamath County, according to Pacific Telephone Manager Dick Bailey, Western Electric installers are working in a one-story reinforced concrete building atop 6,500-foot high Haymaker Mountain near Keno.

The men are installing radio-telephone relay equipment for the new Klamath Falls-Medford microwave relay system. Similar work is going on also at the other two relay station sites in the system, at Chestnut Hill, east of Ashland, and at Mount Baldy, southeast of Medford.

Although winter weather has been relatively mild in some parts of Oregon, travel to and from the relay stations in the Klamath Falls-Medford system has been difficult.

A Sno-Cat is being used to traverse the snow-covered access road leading to Chestnut Hill, and another cat may be brought here for use at the Haymaker site. At Mount Baldy, the access road has been kept clear and four-wheel drive trucks are being used for daily transport of men and equipment.

The new Klamath Falls-Medford system will provide a "telephone skyway" over the mountains starting in July. It will also serve as an alternate route to connect eastern Oregon points with western Oregon, Washington and California.

Polio Campaign Results Revealed

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DON FALES

Fales Wins Bank Award

Don Fales, a member of the 1958 graduation class of Klamath Union High School, has been selected for the Work-College program sponsored by The United States National Bank and has started his training at the bank's Klamath Falls branch, according to L. C. Offield, manager. Under this program, Don receives a \$1,000 college scholarship and a guaranteed position with the bank after college graduation at a starting salary of \$4,500 annually.

The selection is made on the basis of teachers' and principal's recommendations and final interviews and tests given by the bank.

Don has already started learning the job which he will fill on his graduation from high school. After his graduation, he will work a year before entering college. At that time he will enroll at an Oregon college or university of his choice. The bank will pay to the school the amount of the tuition fees in effect at the University of Oregon or Oregon State College for Oregon residents. The bank will also give him \$50 each college phase as a textbook allowance.

Other college expenses will be paid from his savings which have been accumulated under a mandatory saving plan. He will attend college four terms and then alternately work a year and attend school for a full year until college graduation. The program normally takes six years to complete. Don will be carried as a full-time bank employee for the entire program, being considered on leave of absence during the time he attends college.

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Old Landmark To Be Razed

DUNSMUIR — Demolition of the Corral Resort, a longtime landmark in north Dunsmuir, will begin soon to prepare for construction of a 12 unit shopping center plus parking area.

The fixtures, bar and restaurant equipment, were sold at auction on Monday and the directors of the resort say they have an offer for the building which they will probably accept.

The property has a 232 foot frontage on Park Avenue adjacent to Highway 99 freeway just north of the Sacramento River bridge.

The corporation directors, all Dunsmuir businessmen, are Reg Thom, Victor Petrovics and Sam Tallero. They say they have eight commitments for occupancy of the proposed shopping center but should these plans fall through, a deluxe motel development is possible.

The corporation took over the assets of the Corral Resort on January 15 and hopes to have the huge dance hall, bar and restaurant razed by mid-spring.

Development of the area included plans for a modern restaurant and bar at the northern end of the property with a second floor grill providing a view of Mt. Shasta.

Bill Leachman, Elk Grove auctioneer, conducted the auction and buyers were given 48 hours to remove their purchases. A crowd of several hundred attended. The Corral has been closed for several years.

Rotary Club Hears Sheriff

MONTAGUE — Approximately 87 per cent of juvenile arrests made by the Siskiyou County sheriff's office are mainly outsiders, most of whom have resided in the county less than 30 days.

This was a portion of the talk by Sheriff Al Cottar, who was introduced as guest speaker to the Montague Rotary Club by Harold Hooten, program chairman, at a dinner meeting held on February 17 in the clubroom of the Montague auditorium.

Cottar covered the juvenile program as seen by the sheriff's office and the costs of operating the sheriff's department, and he quoted figures or percentages as compared to other budget figures of several of the major county departments.

Cottar stated that compared to 89 juvenile arrests in 1955, with 175 made in 1957, which consisted of 144 boys and 31 girls, 59 were local and the remaining 116 were outsiders. The heaviest age brackets were between 15 to 18 years of age with the highest percentage being runaways, and the rest divided between burglaries, violation of parole, car thefts and petty thefts. He also stated that there is no aggravated problem in juvenile delinquency in the area, and he commended the present youth program being conducted by Mount Shasta.

He further stated that parents of delinquents fail to recognize their responsibility to their children, expecting the schools, churches and police to assume the responsibility of watching them day and night. He also stated that the parents are responsible for their children, whether they want to be or not.

In covering the functions of the sheriff's office, Cottar stated that people "could have any kind of law enforcement, but good law enforcement must be paid for." In the U.S., crime cost 20 billion dollars and for every dollar spent on education there was \$1.46 spent for crime, and for every dollar spent in church, \$13 went for crime.

Prior to Cottar's introduction an announcement was made that E. M. Martin will be in charge of next year's program for the foreign students.

RC Campaign Goal Revealed
WEED — Judge Kenneth T. Stone, Weed, 1958 Siskiyou County Red Cross campaign chairman, announced the figure of \$11,163 had been set for the county 1958 campaign quota.

During the years of 1956 and 1957 a total of \$115,000 was spent in Siskiyou County alone for fires and floods, and a total of 458 people received disaster aid from the Red Cross.

The Siskiyou County office in Yreka is maintained five days a week and the paid staff is on 24 hour call for seven days a week. There are 30 volunteer home service workers in the county; one paid staff in the office, and 15 members on the county Red Cross Board.

One of Europe's contemporary composers, Munich-born Carl Orff, is represented by the "Court of Love" (Part III) section of secular songs, "Carmina Burana" Rounding out the program is the "Walpurgisnacht" of Felix Mendelssohn.

Soprano star of the first De Paur Gala was Inez Matthews, who returns this season to recreate the role of Irina in Weill's haunting "Lost in the Stars." She will also be heard as Mehitabel, the sly alley cat of "Archy and Mehitabel" and in the soprano solo of "Carmina Burana." Baritone McHenry Boatwright, appears

opposite Miss Matthews. Narrator for both "Lost in the Stars" and "Archy and Mehitabel" is Paul Westbrook.
