On February 8, 1908, in Miami, Oklahoma, Charles N. Poteet, a native of Missouri, claimed Iowa-born Mabel Kendall as his bride. He was 22 and his newly wedded wife was a year younger.

Many Golden Wedding Anniversary stories start that way. This one did.

What's different about the Poteet story is that the bride and bridegroom stepped across the matrimonial threshold as foster parents to three orphaned children. A girl and two boys.

The girl was a niece of Mabel Kendall, and the boys were her nephew and youngest brother.

The niece became a member of the Kendall household when she was 3 days old, after the death of her mother, the wife of Mabel Kendall's brother. The nephew was the son of another brother.

When Mabel was 13, she had already assumed much of the routine care of the niece; and in that first teen-age year (her mother was bedridden) — Mabel had complete care of her niece and brother. They and the nephew were her responsibility when she accepted Charles Poteet's proposal of marriage.

With the nuptial vows the Kendall youngsters became a shared responsibility, that continued through the years along with five children of their own — three of them living. All are residents of the Klamath Falls—V. R. (Bob) 734
