Klamath Falls High School and a high school in Texas are the only high school choirs in the country to be honored with bids to perform at the MENC national convention.

Depending upon the amount of money raised and the time available in Los Angeles, students in the choir will be taken to points of interest as well as some of the outstanding concerts, of which there will be plenty available if they can be fitted into the schedule. En route to Los Angeles the group will probably stop over at Modesto, California, and on their return trip it is hoped to bring them back over the coast route, stopping in San Francisco one night. Parents are contributing to the limit of their ability toward the expenses of the trip and Walter Wiesendanger heads the Citizens' Committee to acquaint the people of Klamath Falls with the necessity for receiving voluntary contributions. It is hoped that several thousand copies of a brochure will be prepared for distribution at the convention and will contain pertinent facts about Klamath Falls, the
